You know, it'd just tickle me to death, if a Cholla Club member becomes the first one to get his (or her) name engraved on the 'Fishing's Big 10' Trophy.

It ain't gonna be easy. The fresh water fish are going to be one helluva challenge to me. I've caught maybe three Bass in my lifetime that would hit the scales at five pounds, I've caught one Rainbow that measured 16½ inches that might have weighed one and one-half pounds sopping wet, and never have I caught a Brownie (Trout — that is). The biggest channel Cat I ever caught was a seven and one-half pounder on the Verde one night, that gave me absolutely the strongest fight I've ever had from a fresh water fish.

The salt water group, God love 'em, are all tigers. A lot of people questioned our wisdom when we included a 50 pound shark. Let me tell you something, there is absolutely no meaner fish that swims, than a shark, and anyone who lands one 50 pounds or over, really earns him.

I hate the darn things with a purple passion, and will kill one every chance I get, but, I've had some of the most exciting battles on a Rod and Reel I've ever experienced on large sharks. This old boy just flat out-snookered me when he flipped a bare hook right back at me 5 seconds after closing his boney jaws around a Mackerel that I'd sewn a hook into so elaborately that there was absolutely no way for a fish to strip the bait free without hanging up on it. Ha!

The Cholla Bay area definitely can produce the Dolphin, the Sailfish, and the 25 pound Corvina (White Sea Bass) and Shark! The Marlin and Yel-

In January of 1956, Wayne became Landscape Supervisor in charge of Roadside Development with the Arizona Highway Department. In this capacity he has aided in up-grading and increasing the number of Roadside Rest Areas from 65 to over 240. He has also promoted and obtained designation for two parkways, the Pinal Pioneer Parkway between Tucson and Florence and the Joshua Forest Parkway on Highway 93 towards Kingman.

Wayne was a charter member active in the Arizona State Parks Association which obtained enabling legislation creating the State Parks Department. His current pet endeavor is billboard control legislation as sponsored by the Arizona Roadside Council.

As a child in Florence he learned a pretty good grade of "pidgin" spanish, and is a devoted admirer of Mexico and her people.

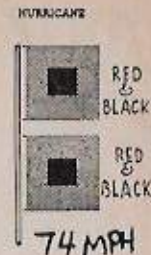
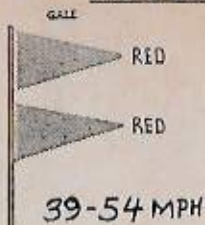
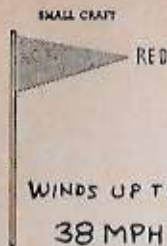
