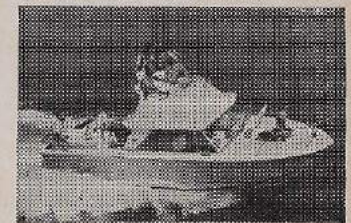
Also remember that your insurance stops when dues are not paid.

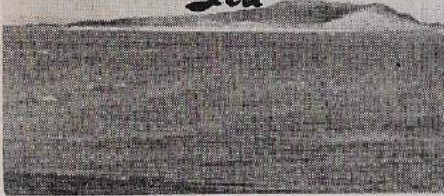

The weekend of January 16th will long stand out in my feeble memory for many reasons. Three unforgettable things happened to this old boy that will be forever etched deeply on my hot little brain.

The first thing, and probably the most impressive — was the awesome sight of the largest grouper these blood-shot old eyeballs of mine had ever beheld in over 35 years of salt-water fishing. This monster came gliding up off the bottom of the gulf to inspect a 12 pound grouper that Bill Hammer was trying to wrassel within gaffing range. He was so huge, he made that 12 pounder look like a tiny rock bass in comparison to his mighty bulk. Without exaggeration, we estimated his weight to go between 300 and 400 pounds. He was no black sea bass either — just a big tremendous spotted grouper! Bill had hooked the 12 pounder on a freshwater bass rod, jigging — we all heaved a big sigh of relief when the Goliath, for some strange reason, refused to inhale Bill's fish — which from the size of it, wouldn't even make a respectable tidbit. Gad, that thing was huge!

The second, and probably most nauseating, was the miserable fact that Hammer beat me at my own game — namely, jigging and rock hopping for yellowfin. I went to the trouble and expense to have Al Ellis, the best Rod Builder in the business, build me a jigging rod to my exact specifications and was just dying to hook into something large enough to test its mettle — but try as I might, in two days of hard no let-up fishing, all I could hand into with that beautiful stick, was bocoup rock bass and one little four pound pinto. Sunday, the 17th, Bill and I along with Bill Cox from Tucson, were heading out of Cholla on a westerly course to try and locate a grouper reef. We were about 7 or 8 miles out when I spotted a white object bobbing gently up and down on the lazy swells. Being naturally nosey as heck, I pointed it out to Hammer and he swung the "Misty Keela" over to investigate, thinking it might possibly be someone's

This is as good a month as any for a home project on the "Olde Garbage Scow." No one especially me, likes home work. But if we plan to enjoy our hulls this spring to their fullest we ought to spend a small bit O time with them now in the carport or back yard, besides, I have to work on them so why can't you!!

Because the manufacturer of different engines have their own specifications and instructions to go by concerning their motors we can only offer a very general rundown here. If you plan to use this checklist, add the knowledge you already have of your own motor and a little common sense and the end results can be both gratifying and worthwhile.

Any time you are in doubt concerning a change or repair, LEAVE IT ALONE until you check the book or with an authorized shop service man. Neglect couldn't be much worse than a full scale S.N.A.F.U.

This is not intended to dampen your "do it yourself and make your own mistakes" spirits tho, so read on and check that rig. This list of items should be checked twice yearly at least —

(1) Check the grease level in the lower unit gear housing. If water is present in large quantities, drain and refill to the proper level with a lubricant recommended by the manufacturer of your motor.

(2) Check visually the condition of the propeller. Large nicks should be repaired, not just filed off. Badly bent or worn blades on a propeller is sufficient cause to replace it with a new one regardless of what the lil' wife says. Be sure propeller is of the correct pitch for your individual rig.

(3) Lubricate all zerk fittings with a non-soluble grease.

(4) Check steering cables, pulleys, and tension of rope.

(5) Check remote throttle and shift levers, they should work properly and easily.

(6) Check electrical wiring harness for breaks, chafing or damage.

(7) Check condition of battery terminals, water, etc.

(8) Check spark plugs — regap to engine spec. Use a torque wrench when replacing them. Always replace plugs with burnt down electrodes.

(9) Replace fuel filter element in glass bowl on O.M.C. engines.

(10) Last but not least, check all fuel tanks, hoses, fuel pumps, connections etc. for gasoline leaks and repair them before starting the engine. Don't borrow pilikia.

December was a frustrating month as far as fishing was concerned. We were unable to get down over the holidays as planned but according to reports of those that did, shore fishing just wasn't producing.

The closest I got to fishing was practicing fly casting in the front yard and nearby canal. To my estimation, fly casting offers more challenge and potential than any other type of sport fishing today and is once more gaining in popularity after years of lying dormant.

I have tried several times in past years to learn fly casting, but due to mis-matched outfits and lack of skilled instruction have given up each time in disgust. The turning point was when Bill Valentine introduced me to local rod builder Al Ellis. Al not only makes a fine line of custom rods, but is also an accomplished fly caster.

In the conversation, I happened to mention my frustrating experiences to Al and he suggested bringing my fly rod, reel and line over so he could see what I was doing wrong. He took one look at the heavy mis-matched outfit I had been using, snorted in disgust and tossed me one of his feather weight rods mounted up with a single action reel and matched line. With a few minutes instruction, I was getting out 30-35

feet of line and for the first time had that "right" feeling that goes with a coordinated controlled cast.

This experience with Al points out one of the most important requirements to good casting. Whether using a bait casting, spinning, or fly casting rig, you must have matching equipment — the rod must be of good quality and have the right action for the type of fishing you will use it for; the reel must be the right size, type and weight for the rod; and the line must be of good quality and the right size or test for the lures you are planning to use. If you don't know or aren't sure how to match up your gear, put reliance in a reputable, experienced dealer who is interested in satisfied customers. And don't expect to find this balance in a cheap outfit!

For those who are interested in learning fly casting, the local Arizona Fly-casters Club is starting a series of free instruction classes in late January. The classes will be held on Wednesday nights at the lagoon in front of the grandstand at the State Fairgrounds. Expert fly casters such as Ed Adams, George Vlassis, Walter Lambert and Al Ellis will be on hand to instruct and answer questions.

The next three months are generally unproductive for surf fishing at Cholla so why not take advantage of this opportunity to learn fly casting. Think what a ball you can have next Spring with a streamer fly when the trout and pompano move in close to shore.

Many people have asked about the art work used to head up this column the past three issues. I'm proud to say it is the creation of my son John with the encouragement and advice of Bill Valentine. All I can say is I didn't pose for the picture.

Your Treasurer's report is complete and all bills are paid with the exception of the December mailing of the Chatter, about \$35.00, and the commission we owe our nice Chatter Editor for collection of our past due accounts receivables, of about \$120.00. Our bank balance could probably have been about \$1,000.00 had the Phoenix and Tucson Treasurers turned in the money collected on the dues paid for 1965 in December, 1964.

This brings up the problem of dues distribution. Each Chapter now has about \$1,000.00 in each bank account and with the kind of operation we had this last year each Chapter seems to be more than solvent.

Our Club was originally for several purposes, (1) to promote our fishing interests (2) to assist our friends in Mexico and (3) representation when necessary. These are vague terms and mean little unless you have followed our progress over our years as a group. True, we are fishermen first and this last year we have been just that. My point which you may now recognize by this time is that we have progressed slowly this last year. Several years ago we organized in Puerto Penasco a children's play ground; we secured polio shots for Penasco children; we brought down furniture (desks) for the schools; we organized clothes drives; we helped buy and equip an ambulance; we were closer to our friends who provide us with our place to relax and enjoy ourselves. This last year we did just that: relax! Our one claim to progression was Tom Sharp's Clean-Up Program which, of course, was splendid.

Our Tucson Chapter put on one of the finest Derbies we have ever had. Phoenix stood by and let them do it!

Probably no one will speak to me tomorrow or next week, but I think we have all laid down on the job; and that's probably my fault as I was one of the organizers of the Council, and our present way of life.

The Council will not be a success unless the Tucson and Phoenix Chapters can be co-ordinated as one working organization. Now Tucson and Phoenix Chapters pay 80% of their dues into

the Council. The Council assumes all the responsibilities and work. They pay all the bills and if things don't go right there doesn't seem to be much assistance. This year, as you can see by the statement, we were frugal in our expenditures. We out-bluffed the road, we bought a new radio and generator and we assumed a deficit in our Chatter. However, the generator we did purchase is still in Lukeville at this date and no definite plans are made this time to get it over the Border. This is what I mean by lack of assistance from both Chapters.

I, as your past Treasurer, number one, having no portfolio as of this date, have several suggestions:

1. Lower the retained dues percentage through a change of by-laws to 10% to each chapter. (They bear no expense and 10% is pretty good beer money.)

2. The Council should be only a controlling body to see that the work gets done through each Council member heading a committee from the Chapters to assist our functions; such as (1) radio, (2) Chatter, (3) membership. Let the Council member see that it is done with his co-operation, not have him do it alone!

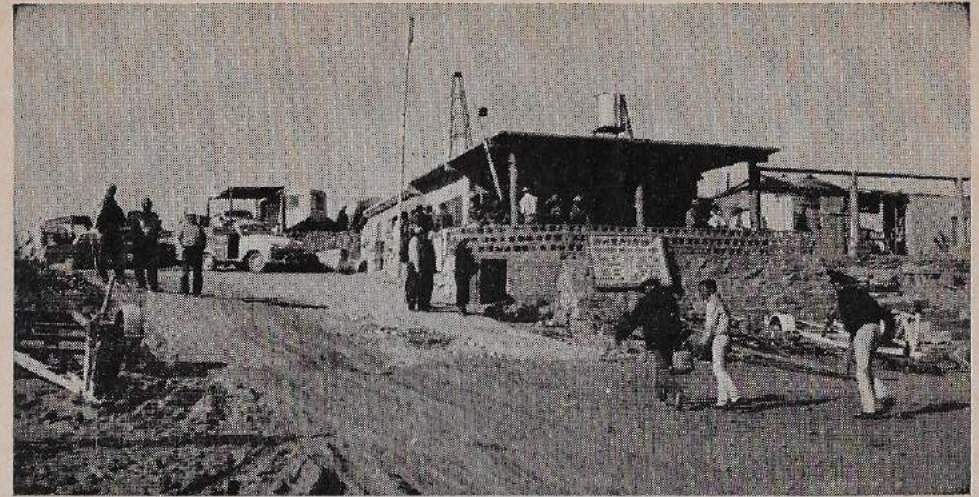
