CHART-MAP PLANS REVEALED!

I am pleased to report that your Chart and Map Committee has had its first meeting and has planned a course of action. We are fortunate to have obtained an outstanding chairman for this committee. He is Rick Bell of KTAR-TV. Many of you will remember him for the fine program he presented at one of our meetings this year. Rick's plan for producing a good accurate detailed chart for our Cholla Bay area are as follows: first, a good base map of the area will be obtained or made from available maps or charts. Second, several sources of aerial photographs will be checked to see if any additional photos will be needed. These are the kind of black and white photos that aerial map makers call "verticle" photos. They are taken thru the bottom of an aircraft. Thirdly, Rick will take "oblique" color pictures of the coast line at low tide. This will record many underwater features that can't be seen from a boat.

We would appreciate hearing from anyone who would be willing to fly Rick down to Cholla for this purpose. We have several aircraft owners and many pilots in the club — so step forward! By the way, Non-commercial flights may now be made directly to Puerto Penasco. You must, however, still clear customs at Calexico, Yuma, Nogales or Tucson — upon returning.

Fourth, at the appropriate time or phase of the preceding steps, Rick Bell will organize and train the rest of us to take and record bottom sounding on a five mile grid from the Sand Dunes to Bird Island. This will require approximately 600 miles of sailing for boats with fathometers. While Rick is doing this, Paul Skogland, chairman of the Sand Buggy Committee, will organize his group to provide the information for the land area. We all enjoyed Paul's presentation of his trip down Baja and back — at our last meeting. We have already obtained some good leads and information to help us in this effort. Much of it has been from unexpected sources. EVERYONES help is needed.

There is a little hump of solid rock about six miles off the northwest tip of Tiburon Island called "Isle de Pato" (Duck). It is but one mile clear around the shoreline, and there are more hungry fish concentrated here than any other area we visited on our shrimp boat cruise last month.

We were anchored there for two nights aboard the "Luisita" and during the daylight hours, we'd circle this miniature Bird Island in our outboards, trolling Accetta spoons and bone jigs, and at night, using Mackerel for bait, we'd fish deep for meat fish.

Never in all the years I've fished the Gulf, have I ever come across bigger, meaner Mackerel! The smallest one we boated in the "Queen" was about 2½ or 3 pounds, and the largest ran as high as 12 or 13. Betty Lou Hammer nailed one of the largest — these bloodshot old eyeballs of mine ever saw. She was fishing in a little 14' boat skippered by her hairy husband Willie. The toothy monster would go 15 pounds easy!

You won't believe this, and if I hadn't seen it myself, I doubt if I'd believed it myself, but these Macks were so savagely hungry — that when I threw an empty Mexicali beer can overboard, they knocked it all over the surface of the boiling water — striking at it. Man, if a guy ever fell overboard there, he'd come out weighing a helluva lot less than when he went in.

This was the only area we fished on our whole 8 day trip — where I was too chicken to use my spinning rig. Those Macks were just too big and mean!

Hector Monro, who has taught me

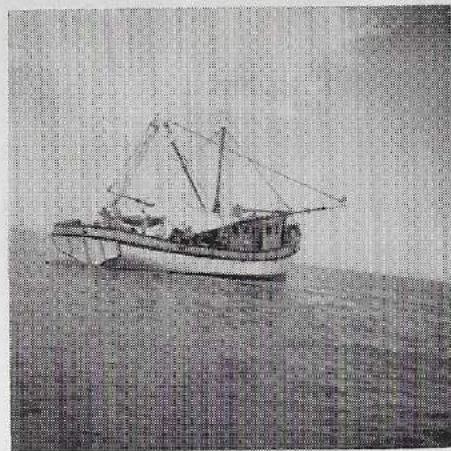
many fascinating bits of wisdom about the Gulf, taught me another strange trueism. The area was lousy with trigger fish of all sizes and shapes, which would strike anything at all that was slow moving. The few fishermen who stayed aboard the "Luisita" to bait fish, while us sporty outboarders roared around the island, went "nutz" trying to get a hunk of bait past these bait chopping, slab sided brutes, trying to get a morsel to the bottom for the big Grouper living there. It was impossible! Hector told them to wait till dark, then try bait fishing. This I never knew — that Cotchis evidently sack out, and won't bother your bait after dark.

Man oh man, how he proved this to us! After a delicious dinner aboard the big boat, we split up in small groups and armed with coleman lanterns, a sackful apiece of Mack bait, bottom fishing rigs, and a honk or two of Tequilla — we scooted about a half mile offshore in the outboards — to meat fish.

I was equipped with a heavy outfit and a small jigging outfit. The Grouper, Sardineros and big Pargo were just waiting for us. Along with the biggest Mackerel, this little "Duck Island" had the largest Pargo I'd ever seen. Also, Jessie, my wife, caught one that was a good 25 pounds and while she was struggling with it, I hooked a 20 pound Grouper on my jigging rig. Wotta ball we had till we finally phooped out!

Our four Mexican compadres, while we were rod and reel fishing for fun,





were busy with hand lines, — and did they ever load up! Our largest fish would weigh maybe 30 pounds, while their smallest was that big. These guys really know their business when it comes to meat fishing. I'll never forget the remark our Mexican skipper, George, made as he was watching me struggle with a Grouper I'd hooked on a spinning outfit. George watched me for about 15 minutes as I'd gain a little then lose a lot, (this was at another location — off Angel Island). The other crewmen, Hector, Marco and Frank, were busy hauling in 30 to 60 pounders at the stern of the Luisito. He pointed to his boys and said, "Bill, you *maybe* land one fish while they catch five."

There's a moral here, I think.

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Permiso de Pescando

During our last several meetings of the Council, Phoenix Board and our regular Phoenix Chapter meeting, the cost of fishing permits at Puerto Peñasco has been a topic of discussion. Apparently several changes have been made creating a great deal of misunderstanding.

The undersigned, at the Council's request, had a conference with Señor Roberto de Uslar, Inspector Fiscal; Señor Naude Cordova, Inspector (they both being assigned to the "Oficina Fiscal de Pesca at Puerto Peñasco); Señor Borbon and Jesus Martinez. Señor Borbon represented Señor Bernardo Bravo, the Chief Fiscal Inspector at Peñasco.

The following charges for fishing permits are now as follows:

1. Three (3) day permits purchased at Cholla Bay, 80 cents American. The official will be in front of our Club House from 5:00 A M throughout the day as long as he is needed.

2. Three day permits purchased at Señor Bravo's office at Puerto Peñasco during the hours of 9:00 A M to 2:00 P. M. not open Sundays) for six (6) pesos or 50 cents American. The application is secured and filled in at Señor Bravo's office, inspected at the Inspector Fiscal's office and the money paid in Mexican currency (no other accepted) at the Treasurer's office.

3. Full year permits can be purchased at Señor Bravo's office, in the same manner as outlined in paragraph 2 for 50 pesos or \$4.00 American. You will need two photos for each license purchased.

If you stay and fish over three (3) days, you are expected to purchase another 3 day permit. This includes shore fishing, the same as boat fishing.

Señor Borbon admits the 30 cents differential is to reimburse his travel expense and time in spending some 10 to 12 hours per day each weekend at Cholla. He lives in Sonoita and has the territory of Cholla Bay, Lobos, Puerto Libertad and points in between.

The advantageousness would seem to be to our advantage.

Minutes of the CBSC Council

Meeting in Casa Grande,

July 29, 1964

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

Financial report was submitted to each member present with comments and explanation by the treasurer.

Motion was made by Eddie Smith to commend the Tucson chapter for the fine job of spear-heading the derby. Seconded by Bob Taylor and carried.

Bob Taylor moved that the council buy the trophy for the first Dolphin of the year. Eddie Smith seconded and carried.

Republic and Gazette gave a trophy for the first Sail Fish of the year.

Prior to council meeting, it was agreed upon for Ted Bergen to take a letter to the Port Captain in reference to registering boats at Cholla Bay. A letter was delivered to the Port Captain written in English. A letter was received in answer which was written in Spanish requesting a letter be returned and written in Spanish. A return letter was forwarded to the Port Captain in Spanish as requested. No answer as yet.

Report by Lois Sanderson. She stated that she would be willing to handle the advertising as well as the editing. Suggested that a percent be agreed upon for advertising that she sold above the expense of publishing the Chatter. Bob Taylor recommended that Lois make a

report on Chatter as to cost and advertising. This was presented and the council was informed that no billing for the Chatter advertising had been mailed out since April. It was agreed that someone who was directly responsible to the council instead of just to one chapter — should be in charge as this is the only means of supporting the cost of the Chatter. The Chairman and the Treasurer agreed to contact the Advertising chairman and acquire the past records of advertising and accounts receivable. Motion by the Treasurer and seconded that Lois will be made advertising manager and all advertising be billed and the agreement between Lois and the Chairman be submitted to the council at the next meeting.

Parts of the amplifier were not returned to the lender at the derby and a bill was submitted to the treasurer for \$61.18. Motion to approach Matt Cubitto to make unit operative and also to pay the bill.

Wes Douglas asked permission to use our mailing list to submit to each member a complete list of benefits and insurance cost to members for insurance while in Mexico. Agreed that a letter be reviewed by the council before granting him permission to mail.

Letter from Jesus asking for two months pay in advance due to his daughter's illness. Payment was sent and a letter of appreciation was received and read by the Chairman.

Meeting adjourned at 10:00 PM.

Minutes of Board Meeting, Phoenix Chapter, Aug. 3, 1964

The meeting was held at 8:00 pm — 3412 West Montecito, Phx. Those in attendance were Dick Gardner, Charles Reed, Bill Hammer, Frank Claver, Ray Sanderson, Tom Sharp, Marge Claver, Doris Earley and Wayne Earley.

It was moved by Dick Gardner, seconded by Charles Reed, that two recent strip lists be purchased to expedite club business.

Ray Sanderson reported on membership. At this date we have a total of 451 members consisting of 275 single, 141 wives and 35 sponsored.

Doris Earley reported that Lyle Rogers was unable to attend because of illness. Motion was made, seconded and passed — that the board wishes for a speedy recovery be conveyed to Lyle.

Dick Gardner reported that the August program will be Mr. Paul Skoglund with films of his sand buggy trip down Baja California, Mexico. Gene Henry and Frank Claver will coordinate the display of sand buggys at the meeting. Dick Gardner will arrange publicity. All sand buggy owners are invited to display their equipment.

Tom Sharp reported on the new love of his life — his new boat. Mr. Sharp also reported on the undesirable, odoriferous condition of the Cholla Bay dump grounds and then generally untidy littered condition of the Cholla area. The motion was moved by Frank Claver and seconded by Ray Sanderson that a "Keep Cholla Bay Beautiful Committee" be formed to investigate and initiate proper action toward cleaning up the Cholla area. The motion passed unanimously. Two immediate possibilities were discussed. They were to see about creating a sanitary land fill type of garbage disposal and the erection of English-Spanish signs with anti-litter messages. Also the signing of directions to the dump was discussed. Mr. Sharp graciously accepted the chairmanship of this committee and will report on his investigations at the next meeting. Council approval of this project is requested.

Bill Hammer reported on the Council meeting held in Casa Grande the last of July. It was difficult to make a full report without minutes, but he did recall that the committee had purchased the amplifier used at the derby. The council also discussed changing the set-up for the Chatter advertising rates, organization billing and the editor's status. An announcement of the actions taken will probably appear in the next Chatter.

Dick Gardner moved and Tom Sharp seconded, that the council be requested to investigate and clarify the Mexican fishing license fees and publish them in the Chatter. Motion passed. This course of action was taken upon the recommendation of Bill Hammer after discussion of other alternatives which included initiating correspondence with Mexican officials in Hermosillo and Mexico, D.F. Some action is considered necessary because of the numerous and flagrant over-charges being made for fishing licenses.

Meeting adjourned at 11:30.

Quiz Yourself on Boating Basics

Regardless of how much experience you have had on the water, it's a good idea to occasionally review your knowledge of boating basics — the things every boatman should know. Here is a short and simple true and false quiz supplied by the Evinrude Boating News Service. Even novice boatmen should score a hundred per cent on this one. The correct answers appear at the end of the quiz.

1. If a boat powered with an 18 horse power outboard goes 25 mph, it should go at least twice that fast with a 40 horse power job.
2. A round bottom boat is usually faster than a V-bottom boat.
3. The number of passengers a small boat can safely carry is indicated by the seating space available in the boat.
4. All life preservers are approved by the U.S. Coast Guard.
5. When making a landing approach with the wind or current.
6. Nautically speaking, trim refers to the way a boat is painted.
7. To anchor safely, the length of the line should be about twice the depth of the water.
8. Tilting the motor away from the transom will tend to bring the bow of the boat down.

9. When one boat is overtaking another, the one doing the overtaking has the right of way.
10. When two boats meet at a right angle, the one to the left of the other has the right of way.
11. Boats coming out of slips or piers have the right of way over boats already in the pattern of traffic.
12. When two boats meet head on, each should bear to the left.

The correct answers to all the questions is "false". If you slipped in a few "trues", chances are you could use a little brushing up on boating basics.

PREVENT THAT FIRE!

Everyone always says, "It won't happen to me." But it sometimes does — if proper precautions aren't taken when refueling. Portable gasoline tanks should always be removed from your boat when they are refilled. A little prevention could keep you from a damaging fire aboard.

The gas pump nozzle should be in contact with the rim of the tank opening when filling. This prevents generating a spark that might ignite the gasoline!

CHECK THRU THE ADVERTISERS

EVER LOSE YOUR LINE?

Extra lines come in handy when you are on a cruise. It's a good idea to make up a spare line or two before embarking on your next boating enterprise. A bow, stern or anchor line may be lost or used for some other purpose — just when you need it the most. That's when a spare comes in handy. It's better to have too much — than too little!

How can you make fishing more enjoyable? Fishing, like any other sport, is much more enjoyable when you learn what equipment to use in a particular situation and how to use it. And, as in most sports, proficiency in fishing comes through years of observation, study and practice.

I was raised in a family where fishing was just as much a part of living as breathing. My Dad came from the Buffalo River area of Arkansas and he and his brothers were all skilled in the art of trot lining, gigging, and taking catfish and bass with worms, grasshoppers and other forms of natural bait. Up until about ten years ago, I was content with these tried and true methods. We nearly always caught a mess of fish and I just couldn't see how you could improve on this type of fishing.

The best thing that ever happened to me, next to marrying that sweet gal of mine, was meeting J. E. Ross. Jay is rated by those who have fished with him as the finest top water fisherman in the State. It was on a trip with him to Roosevelt Lake in 1953 that I caught my first bass on a surface popper. Catching that fish was 100% pureluck as at that time I couldn't hit the side of a barn with a cast and knew nothing

about popping a plug. It gave me the biggest kick I had ever got out of fishing and convinced me there was more sport to be had in catching fish on lures.

This first trip with Jay made me realize there is much more skill than luck involved in successful fishing. His accuracy with a casting rod was unbelievable. He could pinpoint casts into little pockets along the shoreline and back into clumps of brush without ever hanging up and dragged out a bass more often than not. As for me, I either had a king-size backlash or ended up a dozen feet on shore or in the top of a tree almost every cast. The one bass I caught either felt sorry for me or didn't know what it was doing.

At the end of the day's fishing I gathered up enough courage to ask Jay if he thought it was possible for me to learn how to cast and catch fish like him. He looked at me like he didn't think there was much hope, but avowed that if I was willing to take two years of cussing and to put in about three ours practice to each hour of fishing there was an outside chance.

Well, to make a long story short, it did take a good two years and I did take a lot of cussing, but at the end of that time, I was able to put my casts were I wanted them and catch bass. Most important, I was enjoying fishing like never before.

During the last three years I have taken up surf fishing at Cholla Bay. While not requiring the pinpoint accuracy of surface plugging for bass, proficiency in distance casting is a must. Just as important is learning what lures are most productive and how to work them. Most of what I've learned about salt water fishing I owe to Bill Valentine. This guy is every bit as good at surf fishing as Jay Ross is at top water plugging. You just don't find better fishermen or fishing companions than these two.

Recently my son John and I decided to take up fly casting. This is considered by many to be the most difficult casting technique to learn. Again, I was fortunate in meeting Al Ellis who is not only extremely well qualified in the use of a fly rod, but makes one of the finest rods produced in this country.

Thanks to Al's tutelage and encouragement, both John and I are making slow but steady progress. We have many hours of practice ahead of us, but come this Fall you can bet we are going to catch our first bass on a popping bug. If we have progressed far enough, we may even try to compete with Ed Adams and some of the other successful fly rod fishermen at the first estuary.

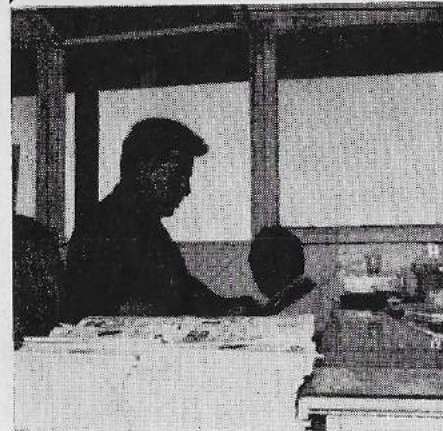

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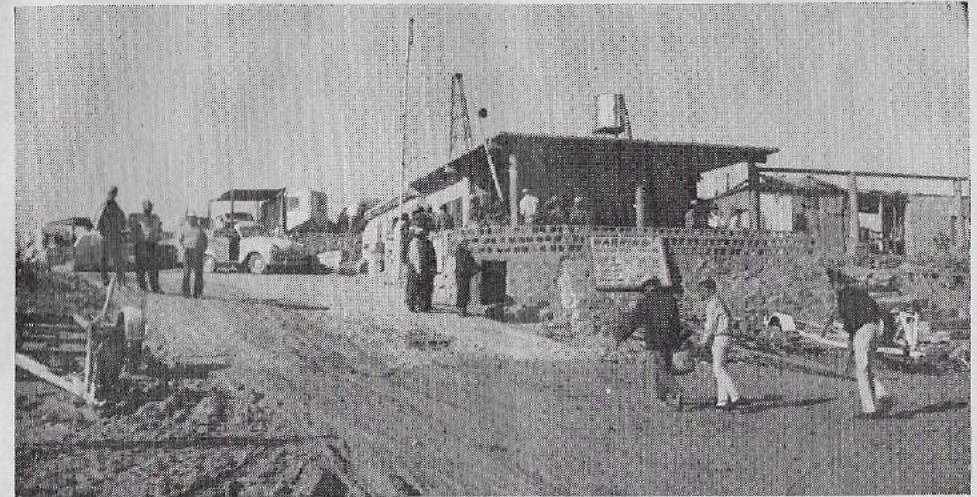
