
Betty Capen put the November, 1970 issue together in a few days and met the press date. In my humble opinion, it was interesting, taking us back to the first issue of the Chatter.

SANDCAST CANDLES

First, get all your items together such as box, sand, parafine, crayons to color your parafine, wick and your mold. Dampen the sand in the box, then press your mold into the sand until it is nice and firm. Remove the mold and set your wiek. Pour the parafine which has been melted and colored into the mold. When the parafine sets, push the sand away and remove from the sand. Now brush the loose sand from the candle with a soft paint brush and spray with plastic or varnish spray.

You can use your last years candles and proceed in the same manner. It's a lot of fun to experiment with different forms and colors. Also, one can scent the candles with pine oil. Only one word caution. Parafine gets very hot so be careful when you are melting and pouring.

glasses - something they had never hoped to have, but made possible through the generosity of Dr. Arnold Gullard and the Johnsons.



Many times I have been asked, how much pressure does the fuel pump on an outboard puts out. This has always been a point of uninterest in the past, as there was very little information on this. After a time we get to know how the pump is by the way its putting out or how the engine runs. Evenrude made some tests and this is what they came up with. The tests were made on engines 3 horse power up to 100 horse power and taken at different RPMs. See chart.

If you keep your boat at the bay, and come up with a no-charging problem, if its a O.M.C. with an alternator there is an easy test you can make, to tell if its your alternator or regulator.

Take a short jumper wire and short across the terminals marked A&F on the back of the alternator, only briefly, if the ampmeter needle jumps to full charge, the regulator is bad. If there is no movement of the ampmeter, your alternator is not putting out. This will tell you which one to take off and bring back with you, for replacement or repair.

Some don't about your O.M.C. and other charging system:

DON'T charge the battery with both battery cables connected to the battery: Disconnect the ground cable.

DON'T disconnect the battery while the engine is running.

DON'T reverse the polarity of the electrical system for any reason. Be careful when charging or using booster batteries.

The above readings are the minimum pressures the pump can put out and still have a normal running engine. The pump will put out more pressure than the chart shows. But they don't give us the high side of the PSI reading.

FINDING DEVIATION OF A BOAT'S COMPASS

Most methods of finding the compass deviation are based on taking bearings on objects shown on a nautical chart. I have three government charts of the upper Gulf and unfortunately landmarks shown on all three charts are not shown as occurring at the same place. There is a difference of from two to five miles on the various charts. (I' of latitude equals 1 nautical mile.)

Pinacate has been moved around less than either Pelican Point or Rocky Point (possibly because of its size) and since it is approximately twenty-five miles from Cholla Bay using it for finding deviation will not introduce very much error. Preferably the boat should be anchored, but it can also be done with the boat underway, but remaining in as small an area as possible while making the observations. By observing the bearing of Pinacate on the compass as the boat heads in various directions, the deviation can be obtained for each heading for which an observation is taken, by comparison with the magnetic bearing taken from the chart,

LAUNCH PERMIT

Just a note of reminder to all members and non-members that launch their boats at Cholla Bay. According to Mexican law, it is mandatory that you check out and in with the nearest Port Captain or his agent. The Port Captain at Puerto Penasco who controls all boating in the Cholla Bay area has designated the Club radio operator as his agent.

Be sure to check out in person by signing a launch permit at the Radio Shack and be sure to turn in the copy when you return. Please note that this applies to non-members as well as members. This also applies, if you launch your boat at Tucson Beach, Sandy Beach or elsewhere.

Also please be sure to tell the radio operator, if you are going to be out overnight - even if only at Tucson Beach or Sandy Beach. Otherwise the Search and Rescue Team will start looking for you when you don't return to the Radio Shack.

If you change your mind and decide to spend the night on one of the beaches, please send word to the Radio Shack where you are and whether you need assistance.



Merry Christmas - Mexican Style

A Mexican Christmas differs from a United States Christmas in various ways. Genuine enjoyment of holidays for the sake of holidays prevails. Anyone expressing the slightest interest is most welcome to join the festivities.

Decorations are profuse, imaginative, naive, ingenous and even startling. Conventional teams of reindeer, revolving mechanical Santas and fairy tales abound.

Each region has its special way of celebration but throughout Mexico there are three staples of the season: The pinata parties for children, the ceremony of posada, and the midnight Mass, accompanied by fire crackers, in every church on Christmas Eve.

The pinata, a clay pot filled with candies, nuts and goodies is decorated to resemble an animal, star, human, fish, etc.

a posada is an Andulusian custom now forgotten in the region of its origin, but transformed by Mexicans into a delightful re-enactment of the Holy Family begging for a place to rest so that the Child can be born. Every Inn. hotel. motel, restaurant, village, association and community holds a posada. The participating children divide into two groups. Those outside sing, "Yo pido posada," (I beg for rest) and those inside refuse, for "there is no room at the inn." The outsiders then sing lustfully "Yo soy

cansada," (I am tired) and the insiders begin to dicker until finally admittance is granted. The children are rewarded for their performance with cakes and candies. It will be no surprise to the tourist that many inns in Mexico are called posadas - place of rest.

In Mexico, as everywhere, Christmas has its special foods. There is a feast of sweets - honey cakes, cocoanut and ginger cookies and chocolate in all forms. Turkey appears with a spiced chocolate sauce. Meat-lovers will discover carne asado, a thin strip of tender beef grilled or charcoal-broiled and enjoyed at Christmas time with a seasonally brewed beer called Noche Buena.


