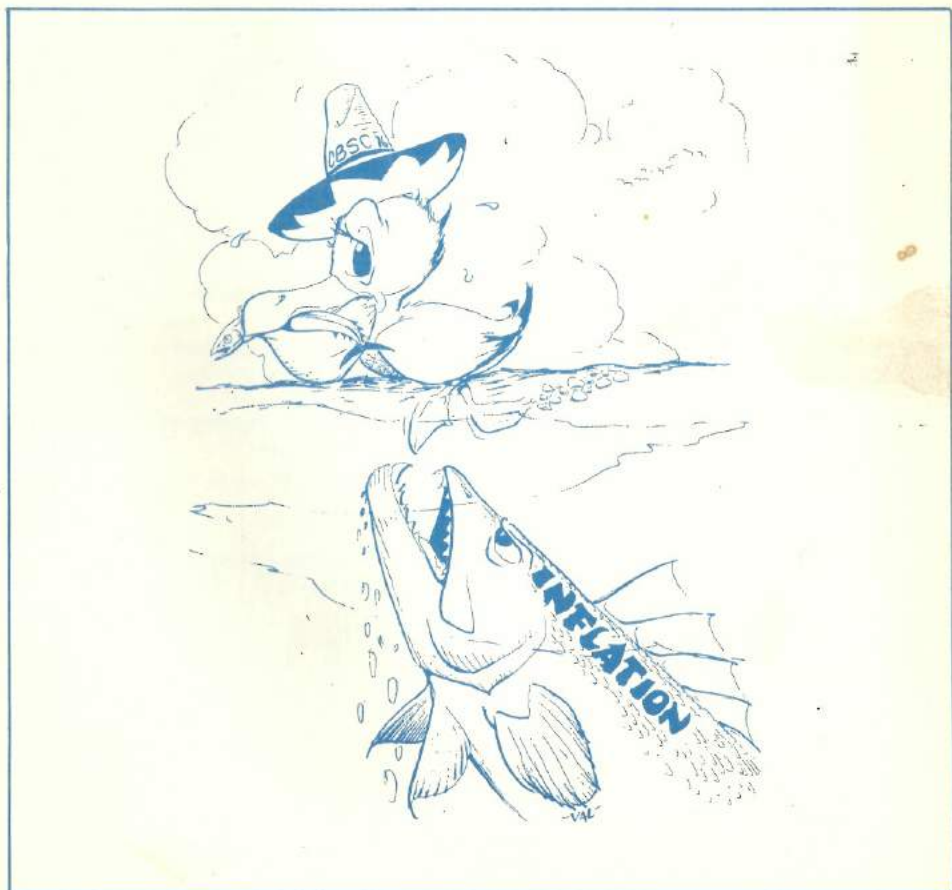

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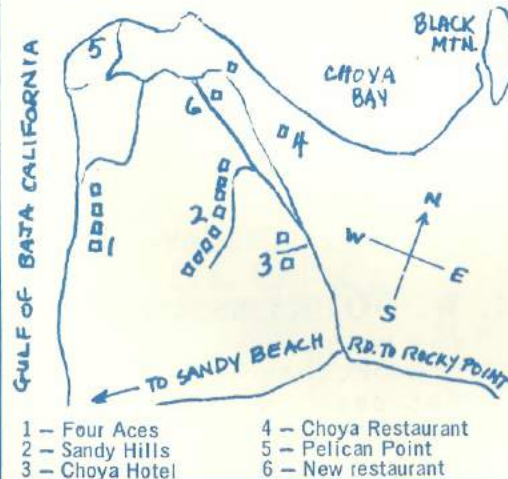
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PHOENIX - TUCSON CHAPTERS

One of the rescues was Harley Lisherness; Harley made a distress call to Betty Munro at the radio shack, that his boat was taking in water. (Can you imagine Hector on this boat?) Three boats came to his rescue, "The Margarita", "The Reel Ezy" and "Dondos". Our new chairman, Gordon Erickson was aboard the Dondos."

Fisherman: Check your drain plug to make sure it is securely tightened, and positioned so that a fishing line will not push it out.

Phil Hunzinker is working on a new system to correct and calibrate your compasses at the Bay.

Due to certain recent lack of communication and in cases of no radio on board, Search and Rescue will be putting out a new pamphlet with hand signals and distress signals. This will be of help to communicate in cases of emergency at all times. Pamphlets should be available at the radio shack within the next 30 days.

NEWS FROM THE LAUNCHING RAMP

To answer two of the most popular questions asked daily: "How's the weather?" and "How's the fishing?"

Weathers like summer, people on the beaches working on suntans and some, like Vi Schmerfeld, even swimming.

With the appearance of the first Black Sea Bass of the season, we can say fishing is exciting.

Steve Kawcheck, all the way from Colorado, and Cholla's fishing guide, Pete Salazar, proudly displayed 164 lbs. of a Bass we will call, "Active Agatha". (If hurricanes can have names, why not Black Sea Bass.) A couple of days later Cholla's Marcelo Salazar, brought in the little sister of Agatha, 130 lbs. of "Burlbling Bertha". The great grandmother of them all was brought in by Herman Balacio and Hector Munro, aboard the Manana Maybe. Bill Sander and party, from Phoenix, chartering the boat could not believe their eyes when they looked into the water and stared into the cup-sized eyes of 270 lbs. "Charming Charlene". When they reached Cholla, Hector had to radio in the Batico to bring out his launcher for Charlene. She was just too big for the dingy. Ed Gard believes in staying fairly close and it paid off when 2 miles from shore, he brought in 212 lb. "Dazling Diane", the biggest fish ever to ride in the Five Bar Flys. To beat the middle of the week drag, Merle Graber, brought his guests to Cholla for a fishing trip, aboard the Chapparral. Merle seldom goes out without his friendly fisherman, Ramon Perez, and sure enough Ramon took them to the spot. Cleve Stauffer, from Nebraska, hooked "Eager Ethel". Merle ran to assist Cleve. When he looked back, he saw his own pole bending. He reached it just in time, as it was leaving its holder. Result: Cleve's 57 lbs., and Merle's "Fancy Francis", 240 lbs. Ramon then showed them how to land one with a Mexican fishing pole, the famous, "Hand Line". His "Gorgeous Georgia" weighed 227 lbs. So far the fish totalled up to, 1,452 lbs. of exciting, enjoyable fun, and lots of good eating.

When a call came onto the radio from Hector Munro, who was guiding on the 24 ft. Harley Lishness, all listeners knew it was a real "May Day". Hector reported they were taking in water fast. With the bilge pump working, and all five men bailing, they could just barely keep up with the water. Their location was about 24 miles out of Cholla. Search and rescue crews were already in the Bay regarding the over-due sailboat. Bob bos, who was manning the radios at the time, dispatched Bob Jones, who was just coming into the Bay on his Reel Ezy. Don Barber and Gordon Erickson were on their way to Rocky Point, when they heard their call. They made a U-turn back to the Bay and the Dondos was launched. In the mean time Marcelo was fishing aboard the Randolph boat, the Margarita. Fortunately on their same frequency on C.B. radio, Marcelo and Hector in their native tongue, and common fishing experience, in the area, talked and went wide open, to the rescue. All three boats reached the sinking boat almost simultaneously. The tired, scared bailers were mighty glad to see help reach them. There were about 30 minutes of daylight left, and they were still 18 miles out. Mark Austin, one of the group on the sinking boat, donned his wet suit and plugged up the hole, thus enabling the boat to be towed in.

Everyone is excited about beginning a new year, and feel it is going to be one of the best yet. Much to look forward to. Plans already forming for the 1976 Fishing Derby. It sounds great to us here at the Bay.

When using the radio, remember the golden rule: "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." In other words: "Speak to others as you would have them speak to you."

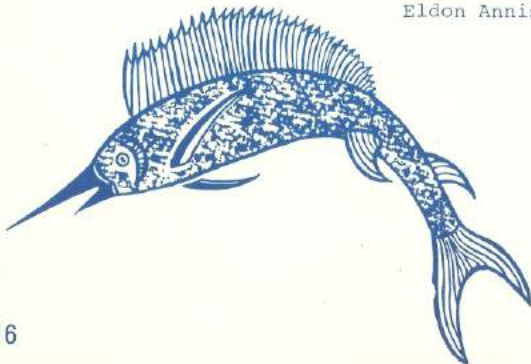
the younger generation set

HOW DO SAND DOLLARS MULTIPLY?

The sand dollar we find on the beach looks somewhat like a forgotten cookie. Actually, it is the limey, pasty, white skeleton of a living sand dollar that once nestled itself down in the damp sea sand. When it died, the skin and other living tissues were washed away. The flat skeleton, perhaps three inches wide, was left to dry on the sandy beach.

The sand dollar is related to prickly sea urchins and leggy starfishes. While most of the earth's animals favor a two-sided body pattern, these smallish sea dwellers are designed on a five-sided body plan. We see this in the five arms of the starfish. It is there also in the sand dollar, even though he seems to be as round as a pancake.

When you find a sand dollar skeleton on the beach, you will notice a design on one side. It is shaped somewhat like a flower with five pointed petals. This marks the region of his breathing tubes, arranged in the basic five-sides pattern.

The living sand dollar is covered with a leathery skin, which is crowded with tiny spines. These movable spines measure about one-sixteenth of an inch and look like velvet. Its color scheme is a mottled mixture of purples and grays.

As a rule, we find sand dollars along warm shores, where the tides do not disturb the sandy bottom. They share their watery world with a host of friends and relatives. Some will lie flat, covered with a thin layer of sand. Others will be half-buried standing on end. The sea brings their tiny wave scraps of floating food into their mouths.

When time comes to multiply, the adult sand dollars pour vast numbers of male and female cells into the sea. Most of them are devoured by fishes, sea anemones and other hungry sea dwellers. Some escape and pairs of male and female cells meet and merge to form fertilized eggs. Most of these are devoured. Now and then a lucky egg survives long enough to hatch into a larva, with a furry collar and a tiny waist. The minilarva swims around for a while and then settles down to grow into an adult sand dollar.

In the sea, the tiny creatures provide food for the larger ones. This is why sand dollars and other sea dwellers usually produce many thousands of eggs. Most of the eggs and free-swimming larvae are devoured. Among 10,000 sand dollar eggs, maybe only one escapes and lives long enough to become an adult.

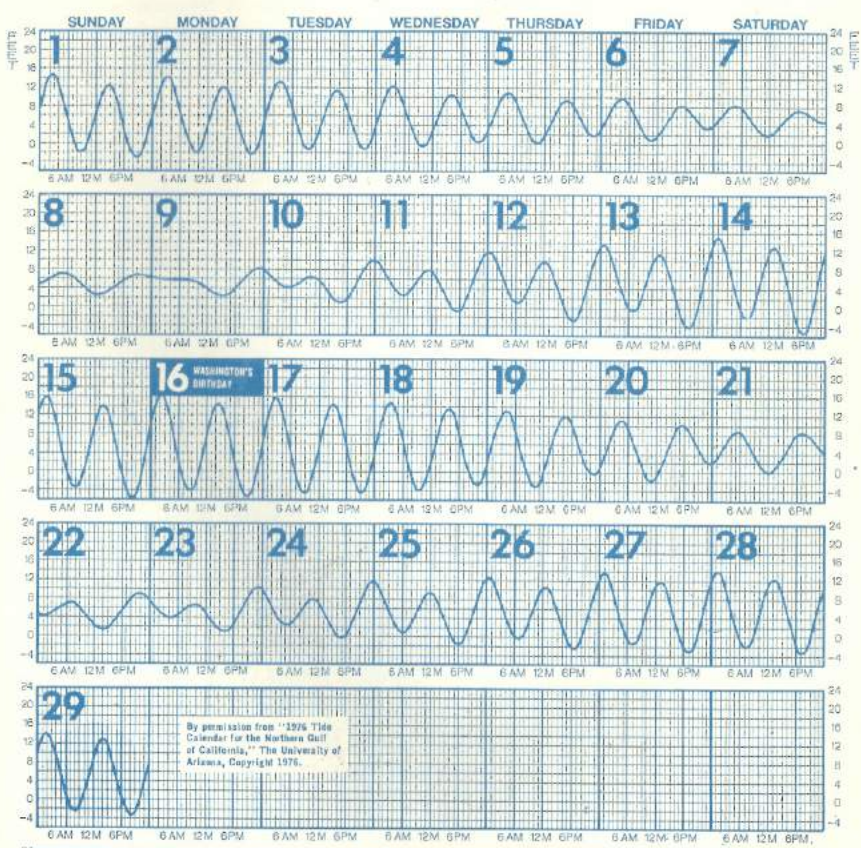
