

"They Were My Guests"

In the years since 1941 when I started going to Rocky Point and Cholla Bay, I have had many different types of fishing partners with me. I have had doctors, lawyers, dentists, mechanics, plumbers, painters, executives, city officials, government officials and building contractors. Each had a personality of his own, and I might add, I enjoyed fishing with each one of them, even though my patience wore thin at times. On most of our trips we would pool our money, so much was paid by each individual to cover expenses and one person would pay all the bills. This way everyone paid his share. The only thing we had to make sure that the treasurere didn't get drunk and get rolled by some thief.

There were some, that because of their high status in life felt they should not be required to help with the finances and a few who wanted to be the boss. They had never fished, but they knew much more about fishing than I did. They knew much more about where to go to fish even though they had only heard of the place. They knew more about how to handle the boat, "The Swan" than I did. These kind of individuals were so few that it is hardly worth remembering.

A Building Contractor and Painting contractor and young son went with me one time, and it turned out to be quite an event. The builder wore big heavy boots, the type you would wear on a hunting trip. They laced up almost to his knees, and were big and heavy. We went to the sand dunes to fish and almost immediately started catching big groupers. The painter had been in the Navy, so I gave him the ten foot of stringer rope with a wire on the end to run through the first grouper's gill and tie a knot in the rope. Then, as the fish was caught, just run the wire through his gill and let him slide down the rope. This way, they would stay in the water all the time. The only time you would take them out of the water was when you were going to move a mile or so. When you stopped, you would dump them in the water again.

This contractor was quite a boy, every time he would catch a fish, he and his heavy boots would do a Mexican hat dance around the motor cover in my boat. If you don't think a 230 pound man with heavy boots doing a Mexican hat dance around the motor cover in my boat will not shake you up, you are wrong. I thought he was going to break my floorboard in. Boy! what a man!

Okay...2:00 o'clock..everybody reel in..
time to head for the gray mountain called,
"Cholla Bay." "Let us see how many groupers
we have." Everyone counted on the tow line
twenty seven groupers. What a catch!

The painter's son was so happy, in his twelve years of life, it was the first time he ever went fishing and the first fish he had ever caught...he did catch some beauties.

I instructed him to pull on the rope line, then yelled, "Hey, the knot came untied on the first fish!" As the line was pulled it came right through each fish and as it did, each fish would swim away when he reached the end of the rope.

When he discovered all the fish were gone, he said to his son, "I am sorry, son." The kid said, "That is okay dad." I have often wondered if he ever told this story to anyone. This is the first time I have told it.



BLACK SEA BASS DIFFICULT TO HORSE ABOARD

With arrival of the Gulf of California giant black sea bass to winter grazing grounds around offshore Cholla Bay reefs, I thought it might be time to impart some theories how to best catch one.

Unlike grouper or pinto, or sardinero for that matter, a black once hooked will never try to take refuge between big rocks or a cave in the reef.

Instead, he'll just simply try to power out of trouble. And believe me, these dudes are all blessed with an overdose of power.

Of all the saltwater fish I've caught in more than 45 years of line wetting, I've never seen any species become so emotionally upset about being brought to gaff.

I had a little sub-teenaged 18 pounder nearly break my arm when I stuck a gaff into him. On another occasion, if I hadn't had foresight enough to have had a gaff caddy cruising in the near vicinity to toss me a superstrong gaff from his boat, I never would have landed an 85 pounder. When I finally wrassled him to the surface, he completely demolished the two gaffs aboard my outboard.

Off the Cholla Bay Rocky Point area, these giant sea bass meander along the bottom, inhaling anything resembling food, from about the middle of December throughout winter months until the water gets too warm for them in late spring and early summer. They move around quite a bit when feeding so they occassionally are lucked into shallow water (30 to 45 foot deep) meat fishermen.

When this happens, look out. A big black, hooked in shallow water, will make you crank up to follow him unless you happen to have a ton of 500 pound test line loaded on a Jeep winch mounted on a telephone pole, or, you're just plain lucky and the fish gods are smiling upon you.

The best way to arm yourself for battle with these brutes is to load a 6/o reel with line testing from 80 to 150 pounds, secure it to a short stout rollerguide rod, get a half dozen 9/o to 12/o forged steel hooks, and 8 to 16 ounce singers, then get a bucketful of mackerel, squid, rockbass, or chicken-entrails. After you gather all of this paraphernalia together, look up Hector Munro, Pete, or Marcello Salizar, or any one of the other first class Cholla Bay or Rocky Point fishing guides.

Personally, I prefer using 40 pound mono on a 4/o reel mounted on a limber fast taper rod, and my score of successfully landed black sea bass in a total of 30 years of Cholla fishing, is an 18 pound sub-teenager and one gaff breaking 85 pounder. Nuff said.

George Rodgers, President of the Phoenix Chapter of the Cholla Bay Sportsmen's Club, announced today that the clubs 600 voting members in Phoenix and Tucson will travel in convoy from both cities to Cholla Bay and Puerto Penasco in Sonora Mexico on the weekend of February 18, 1977.

Rodgers said this was the clubs way of demonstrating that travel to these Sonora communities was safe.

The Cholla Bay Spotrsmen's Club has, for many years, maintained a close relationship with Mexican officials there and felt strongly that a goodwill gesture by the club was timely in light of so many recent negative reports about travel in Mexico.

Although detailed plans are yet to be completed, Rodgers said that working in conjunction with Mexican and American officials, the staging plans for the boat/auto convoy were under way, and in addition, the club will host a no charge Chili Bean and Hot Dog Supper in Cholla Bay on Sunday, at noon, February 20, 1977, and the public is invited.

In related developments, the city of Puerto Penasco will celebrate a four day Mardi-Gras on the same weekend with parades and special events scheduled every day.

Rodgers said that the recent publicity concerning travel into Mexico has significantly reduced travel by Arizonans to this fishing and sunshine mecca. He felt that in light of the close relationship between the club and officials there, some show of support for their dilema was indicated at this time.

MEXICO - TO MINT NEW SILVER PESO

MEXICO CITY--Mexico is going to start minting "Strong" silver pesos again.

Sometime in early 1977, bright, new 100 peso coins will go into circulation; Treasury Minister Julio Rodolfo Moctezuma Cid announced recently.

Nearly an ounce in weight, they will be 72 per cent silver, making them probably the richest silver coins in general circulation in the world.

At the current floating peso-dollar rate of exchange, the 100 peso pieces will cost approximately five dollars.

The 20 grams of pure silver they are to contain makes them worth a few cents over three dollars for thier precious metal content alone.

According to the treasury minister's announcements, the new 100 peso coins will bear a three-quaters profile bust of Mexican independence on the reverse side. To the left will appear the words "Cien Pesos," 100 pesos, and on the right, the monogram of the Mexican Mint and the year of coinage.

At the bottom, there will be the words "Plata Pura 20 Gramos," pure silver 20 grams. On the obverse will appear the national coat of arms, with the legend "Estados Unidos Mexicanos," United Mexican States, which is Mexico's proper name.




