I've been asked how to tell where to look for the trouble if your board is heating. In case you don't know it, there are two different pumping systems in your 1/0. The pump in the out drive pumps the water up to the engine. You can tell if it's working by checking the water stream at the discharge outlet below the starboard (right side) of the outdrive trunnion cap with engine idling at about 500 RPM. See if it is a strong and steady flow. If so, then the pump in the outdrive is doing it's job, and the heating malfunction is somewhere in the engine. Heating trouble in the engine can be anything from an incorrectly timed engine to a defective elbow gasket on the manifold.

The other pump is your circulating pump on the engine, this pump could be leaking, corroded or have bad bearings. You can tell if it's leaking by checking at the hole under the pump body. There will be signs of rust on the pump body. At the same time check your belt that drives the pump, it could be loose. At this point if your outdrive pump is working, the belt is tight and the circulation pump is o.k., the next step is to see your favorite Outboard shop. If you're at the bay ther there is always Dominos or poker. For those that do their own spark plug installing, longer life can be had if you torque and the plugs to 20 ft. lbs. Too tight a plug distorts the gap or causes the plug shell to break, too low a torque and you have a hot burning plug due to poor heat transmission, to the water jacket.

If you strip out the threads by over torqueing the plug heli coils are not the answer because of the poor heat transmission. Replace the head.

You boys that run the outdrives with the red nut on the outdrive housing: If your steering is starting to tighten up don't forget what's under the red nut. You can't over grease it! Note, use only the little gun you screw to the type A. tubes of grease. Do not use (continued)

the snap-on type gun. You may end up with a grese gun dangling out of your outdrive. The hole in the outdrive housing isn't large enough to move the gun around to pop it off the fitting. You could pull the fitting out of the casting.

Speaking of grease, DO NOT use any type lubricant in your outdrive gear case of outboard gear case except type C. There is no substitute that I ever knew of or that OMC or Evenrude will reccommend. You guys running other type units should follow manufacturer's specifications. Lubricants used in the gear boxes of outboard and 1/0 are designed for very high speed running gear trains, and each engine manufacturer knows what's best for their units. It will pay to take their advice.



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
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# MIGUEL CARDERO

It sure is wonderful to belong to Cholla Bay Club and have such good friends to help in time of need and have such good relations with our Mexican Amigos when needed, they are there helping.

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
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### FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK



April 16th: Several club members and their families including, Vi and George Hamann, George and Helen (son of George and Vi), went out sand buggying. What fun!


April 17th: Marlene Sternberger had quite a gang over for her unforgetable spaghetti dinner, served with (continued)

AT TUCSON - ROCKY POINT JCT.






# THE BEAUTIFUL BEACH AT EL GULFO by Al Scott

As you pass through the town of Sana Clara one comes to Cemetery Hill Where you will go off the hill and on to the beach. This is one hundred yards of unbelievable sand that only a sand buggy or four wheel drive will go through with ease. Once on the beach, you have thirty five miles of one of the most beautiful beaches you will ever see. I am really living in the past years. Now there are so many people going down from Yuma now that the beach is not as it was in the fifties when Gene Smith and I went down so often. In those days the fish caught from shore was fantastic. I remember so well my first trip, a Mexican by the name of Sanchez ran the shrimp plat at El Gulfo, which is by the way one of the best in Mexico. The plant is stainless steel and really clean. His generators had gone bad and he bought a new part in Yuma, and wanted us to smuggle it in to Mexico. It was a huge plate for the generator. He put it in our pickup, and we were told to follow his son to El Gulfo. We asked him what we should say if the customs asked about it. He said to tell them it was a stove. About dark we went through San Luis, we had no trouble. We met his son in San Luis, and started for El Gulfo, after an hour of travel, he stopped and told us he was coming to the bad roads. He said he would go through a bad mile, stop and blow his horn. We could hear him going. He stopped and blew his horn. We started out, Gene had the throttle all the way to the floor board. By the headlights we could see what seemed like hundreds of side winders standing in the two ruts the youn Sanchez made. Gene's pickup was in and out of the road most of the time. We finally came up on Sanchez. He yelled cautioning us not to get out of the truck, that there were too many rattle snakes. We were to wait there until we heard him stop again. This continued until about sunrise. We came upon the small sleepy town of El Gulfo. We were exhausted. We put our cots up and tried to sleep, but the sun was too hot. We fixed breakfast, and walked down the beach with our (continued)

fishing rods. We went to the first rocks and caught large sea trout like we used to catch at Cholla Bay. The beach at that time was very crusty. As you walked As you walked the beach you would sink down through the crust about six inches. That afternoon, we met young Sanchez again, and he took us through the shrimp factory, it was beautiful. He informaed us we would take a different route back to San Luis. This road was along a high cliff, and very narrow. When we arrived at El Doctor we stopped to pick up a collection of petrified wood. At that time there was tons of petrified wood in every direction. In later years the Mexican Government came and hauled all remaining away. Now you can only find small pieces when the wind blows the sand. We finally arrived on the American side, and needless to say we were two tired fishermen. We were glad our first trip to El Gulfo had ended. In this year of 1976 I am afraid it is not a beautiful beach anymore. Over the years with hundreds of people on the beaches every weekend with their sand buggies. This has changed all the beauty that Gene and I saw and enjoyed on our first trip to El Gulfo.

Some experts think that it also can test the salty chemicals in seawater. When the starfish loses an arm he can grow a new one. Almost always he remembers to add a new eyespot.

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
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
