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

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"The

Incredible Oscar"

Oscar was a Mexican National who hung around the immigration office at Sonita. He wore a taxi-type cap with the lettering, "Official Guide of Mexico". I never knew for sure if he was a guide, but he said he was. You couldn't believe anything he said, or leave anything around that he could steal, yet he was excellent to take along as a guide to Rocky Point. He spoke good English, had a cocky personality, and would fight anyone who crossed him, including law enforcement. He was of medium stature. He wore a glove on his right hand at all times, and the fingers were curled into a fist, he only used the left hand when he was in a fight. I only saw his right hand one time. He had been injured at sometime and his hand was black, and had turned to stone anyway, so it seemed. He never spoke of the accident and I never asked.

The year was early 1942, and my first trip to Rocky Point. A group of men from Litchfield Park and Buckeye planned a fishing trip, and I was invited to come along. There was a group of sixteen men, and we were to ride in the back of a truck they used to haul cotton pickers. The boss of the trip had a new 1942 Chevrolet Pickup. We were to follow him. We met in Buckeye and each paid \$25.00 for expenses of trip. Ralph, a well known business man in Buckeye, was to act as treasurer. We all climbed in the back of the truck, and with our trail boss in the lead, started for a wild trip to the fabulous fishing in the Gulf of California.

About one hundred feet out of Buckeye the first bottle of Seven Crown started to make the rounds, as it was passed to each they would take a big swig and pass it on. When it came to me, since I am a non-drinker, I would pass the bottle to the next man. I do not recall how many bottles were emptied before we reached the border, but it must have been several, as the group was really high by the time they reached the border. (continued)

The immigration office at that time was in Sonita, and this is where I met Oscar. When Oscar spotted this group of fishermen, he knew what he could get from this bunch. Oscar was hired and we went to the cafe in Sonita where each ordered a big steak of horse meat-suppossedly beef, but we all felt sure it was horse meat. After the luscious meal, we headed for Rocky Point. Oscar rode in the back of the truck with us and enjoyed sharing the bottle with the boys.

Fourteen miles north of Rocky Point, the clump of trees on your right is where the gravel road ended and the sand road began. The road went in between those trees. The place at that time had a cantina, windmill for water, and a few knick knacks. This is the place where you took a deep breath because the next fourteen miles were to be a bugger, and it really was especially with fifteen drunk men and myself trying to push a big truck out of one sand hole after another for fourteen miles.

We finally pulled up in front of Rocky Point Hotel. The only building besides the hotel at that time was the two story fish house, one cantina, drug store, and that was it. The hotel did not have a roof on the rooms so the sky was your ceiling. We took a couple of rooms and camped out in front of the hotel. The number one room in the hotel was a very large room, so we set up card tables as everyone wanted to play poker.

I figured I could hold my own playing poker, besides I was the only one that hadn't been drinking. That was wrong thinking. We all sat down at the various tables. It was one dollar ants, Jacks or better to open. Sounded good to me, as I had experience in this before, so I thought, deal the cards boys. I had the first chance to open. I couldn't so I passed. The next guy said. "I'll open for \$50.00." I never played for this kind of money, so I thought to myself, I better stick to Hearts. I threw my cards on the table and walked out the front door of the hotel. Just as I reached the porch two policemen walked into the room and arrested the group for gambling.

At that time, and I suppose it is still true, gambling was not allowed in the State of Sonora, Mexico. They took Ralph and our money, as well as the rest of the men who were gambling and all their money. After a heavy fine they were released. By this time my friends had quieted down considerably. We all took our bed rolls and bedded down for the night. The night watchman came by and assured us all would be well because he was on the job. Oscar didn't have a bed roll, so he slept in the cab of the truck I wanted to tell the night watchman about Oscar, but they seemed to get acquainted.

The night was hectic. I awoke with a start when I heard a gun shot, and a body fell close to where I was sleeping. The night watchman had cought a young Mexican boy stealing some of our equipment. He said "I tell him to stop, he no stop, so I keel him". Needless to say I did not sleep anymore that night. I was still awake when the sun came up over Rocky Point Mountain. We brought plenty of food, but asked the lady who managed the hotel to fix us a good breakfast. She was from Los Angeles and spoke perfect English which helped us a great deal. Since we couldn't depend on Oscar it was nice to have someone to translate for us.

We chartered a big shrimp boat and it was ready at the appointed time. The water was fair, a bit rough, but not bad. The captain headed southeast from Rocky Point, where he said the big fish would be waiting. The boat was scarcely out of the harbor before the dice came out, and they did roll. Ralph in all his excitement rolling dice, and a little drink now and then, fell overboard, but was rescued about the time he hit the water. By this time we were about fifteen miles out and the water was very rough. The men all became seasick, one by one they would put their feet against the railing, and the Seven Crown was really boiling. At last the captain turned back. Everyone was deathly sick with the exception of the captain and me. The water became worse. I stood in the doorway of the cabin, and watched the water above this big shrimp boat. I was looking at the aft of the boat, when I saw a sight I shall never forget. A big herd of porpoise came past the boat, what seemed to be hundreds of them! As far as the eye could see there was a solid body of porpoise going west. At last and with a sigh of relief we rounded the Rocky Point into the safe water of the Bay. So ended my first trip in

the Sea of Cortez.

We couldn't find Oscar, but after some searching we found him drunk in jail. The boss bailed him out and he promised to be good. The water did calm down and we did get a couple of days of good fishing in. I suppose I could say I enjoyed the trip, but it was good to get back to Buckeye.

For the next few years we launched out boats at Rocky Point, and the fish we caught on those trips were unbelievable. We took Oscar with us many times but we finally got to where he was undependable. Oscar fell in love, and got married. He built a home at Rocky Point. The only thing wrong was he didn't know whose land it was. When the police came and told him the house was not built on his property, and they told him to move his house because it was on government property, there was trouble. That fist of stone went into action. Why they didn't kill him I will never know. He at last gave up, and moved back to Sonita. In the years that followed, we old timers would gather on the porch of the Rocky Point Hotel and talk about the good old days.

I lost track of Oscar, but did hear that he was a highway patrolman in another state in Mexico. One day I happened to be in Rocky Point, and saw Oscar astride a motorcycle with a highway patrolman's uniform on, and two big guns strapped to his body. I asked him how come the police didn't kill him. He said they were afraid of him, and I believed him. I noticed his right hand didn't have a glove on as before, and asked about it. He said he didn't know what happened, but someone told him to go see a certain lady in a green house, and he did. He spoke with her and the hand was soon normal again. This seemed amazing to me.

I never saw Oscar again, but heard he was killed while chasing a speeding car. His motorcycle went out of control. This is the way Oscar met his maker, and if you never knew Oscar you missed an incredible character.

HOW ABOUT GIVING SEARCH AND RESCUE A BREAK? USE A CHECK LIST.

A worthwhile degree of safety afloat can be achieved if certain actions are taken routinely before departing. If it is to be an extended cruise, most of these items should be done each day. The following items are of general applicability; and all may not be needed, and others will need to be added.

- 1 All safety equipment is aboard, accessible, and in good working condition.
- 2 The bilge has been checked for fuel fumes and water. Ventilate or pump, as necessary.
- 3 Horn and all navigation lights operate satisfactorily.
- 4 All loose gear stowed securely.
- 5 All guests aboard have been properly instructed in safety and operational matters, both do's and don'ts.
- 6 Check oil levels, both engine and reverse/reduction gears, and water in closed cooling systems. After starting engine, check overboard water flow of cooling water.
- 7 fuel tanks have been checked for quantity of gasoline or diesel. Know your fuel consumption at various RPM's. Make sure there is enough fuel aboard for cruise and a reverse if you must change your plans for weather or other reasons.
- 8 A second person aboard who is capable of taking over if the skipper is disabled or fatigued.

Before departing, a very responsible person should (continued)

know where he intends to cruise and his time of return; making sure this person has a good description of the boat.

An excellent means of accomplishing the foregoing is through use of a "Float Plan" (called a "Launch Slip" at Cholla). A Float Plan is a must anywhere in the Sea of Cortez and all major waterways. A Float Plan is to be filled out COMPLETELY and CORRECTLY. The Port Captain is in complete command so don't get caught without one! It is up to the skipper to do this. To new boaters in the area: don't be afraid to ask questions, any "oldtimer" will be glad to help you.

Just remember, if you get in trouble, that Float Plan is all we have to go on for your safe return.

Here is my version of the ordeal. About 9pm Ajo Red brought Ed and Terry to our home to report their buddies John and Dave had boarded the 6ft. raft about 3 that afternoon to do a little fishing in the bay. On board they had with them a little fishing tackle, maybe one coke and a few tequilas inside their bellies, and one little oar. They were last seen drifting toward Black Mountain area. When they were reporting (Continued)

this, they were not only concerned about their safety but at 7:30 am the following morning the missing pair would be AWOL. Realizing there was nothing we could do at that hour and seeing no signal of any sort, on the beach or the immediate area and also ver optimistic the pair would be hiking in to camp any minute, we agreed to meet at the radio shack at daylight and group our forces if a search was needed.

Daylight arrived and so did Terry and Ed, still no sign of their companions. We took our problem to Phil Hunziker, bless him for being a Choya resident and helping out with S&R. Ed Perez was sent to Penasco to call the base so the boys wouldn't be in worse trouble with their Commander and Terry joined in the land search. Phil dispatched two sandbuggies, Ajo Red and Ben Gay, in one and Phil's nephew Kenny Burns and Terry in the other. Radio communication was kept with the buggies and by 10:30 Ajo Red had searched as far as Soltelos and no sign of the men nor their raft. Vidal Gomez had his Mona Lisa gased up so he loaded up some of his guests and in case a nurse was needed, Vi Schmerfeld was included and last but not least, Hector Munro headed out.

As soon as Ben Gay and Ajo Red returned from ground search, Ben launched his Jokesha. His crew, Ajo Red of course, Pablo Pineda and Ben's son Kevin Gay.

3:10 Vidal radioed they spotted the raft. It was pulled up high on the beach. No sign of the Naufragos.

3:20 Vidal radioed they had the boys spotted moving at a snail's pace down the beach. At this time we heard Eddie's voice saying "All together now 1-2-3-" and then a big shout. Next we heard all sorts of yehs-wows-whoppers, etc. Later we were told the reason. John and Daye were so weary having been in the water approximately 23 hours, their thirst buds were crying for water, their parched skin was crying for relief, their stomach walls were crashing into each other and their feet were feeling as if they were wearing cemento zapatos that Dave said he was actually talking to his feet. "Lift yourself up, move forward, put yourself down...now the other one, etc". Vi said when they finally turned and saw their buddy, Ed and help they just plunged into the water. Fortunately, they were in the right waters and the tide high enough, they could get them aboard with very little effort. (Continued)

Jokesha was notified the boys were found and on the way back so they headed back for Choya. 4:45 everybody back on shore and celebrating their safety. Vi was gracious enough to offer the boys (I don't know why I keep calling them boys when I know anyone serving in the U.S. Airforce has to be a man. I guess by now these four had become all our sons. Everyone who was here at the time had a special interest in this foursome.) a shower to get the salt water off their aching bodies and get some medication on. Then we all stood around and listened to the different reactions. As Dave was drying his shoulders off, he remarked how the soft towel felt like industrial sandpaper to him. Someone said they hoped the Commander would understand and be gentle with them, when Dave took another little puff on his pipe and quipped, "You guys just have to face the Commander, I have to face the Commander plus a wife".

The next day Hector, Kenny, Vi and yours truly, went in the sandbuggy and picked up the raft. It is now gracing our porch and we are thinking of offering it to the Davis Base Hall of Fame - Leaks and all!

There have been fewer and fewer people since the 4th. We have peace and quiet. Fireworks and motorbikes none of us miss.


We have lost two of our ospreys in the last few days. One was shot off his perch near Pelican Point. The other broke his leg diving for a meal. There is no way he can survive without diving with both legs. He could hardly fly, the dangling leg affected his balance.

No bingo games now, just not enough people for it to be fun. The big gathering place now is in Town at the laundramat. We gossip there, and it's air conditioned. So you can see we move at a slower pace, mostly to keep from dripping. Small diversions are always at hand.

There are even three or four coyotes that have been hanging around in our area. They play with the dogs and are not remotely afraid of humans. Yells and rocks don't faze them. Can't say I'm very comfortable with a coyote standing about ten feet from me.

There has been some sprinkle, lots of thunder and lightning, and many, many, shooting stars.

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Just about every time I take a carburator apart and that carburator is off a boat with a built in gas tank, and if I find water in it then there has to be water in the gas.

My next move is to the boat to see where the fuel tank vents are installed thru the hull. It is surprising sometimes where you'll find the vent. Boats with bow tanks will have the vents installed on the flair of the bow, in a two foot sea the vent would be under water half the time.

At 3500 to 4500 RPMS the vent tube to your fuel tank becomes a vacume line. Any water getting close to it will be sucked into your fuel tank. So check your vent, if its where water can get to it move it. If for some reason it can't be moved, covering it with a small clam shell will help.

You boaters running the big outboards that use the surface firing spark plugs, L19V, L77V, L76V, etc, etc..they have a new one for you. Its big number is L76J4. This one just may stay with you a little longer. Its big feature is that you can gap this one and the gap is .040. If you are always fouling the surface plug, try this one.

Something new in gear lube has come up on us, it is O.M.C "Hi Vis". Its big job is lubing the new high-speed lower units on the 1973 and newer big big outboards. It has a higher viscosity than the sea lube does, and will stand up much better under the high speed gear strain. "But", it has one draw back, if you have electric shift lower units such as O.M.C. outdrive or evenrude or Johnson outboard, 72 and older you can't use it because it will affect the shifting. If you do your own servising, be sure you get the right lube. (continued)

How long has it been since you have pulled the prop off your engines or outdrives and cleaned and greased the prop shaft before it salts up so tight you can't get it off. See if there is any fish line wrapped behind the prop while you're at it,
