STORY OF A DISASTER AND ONE GREAT LEARNING DOINT

The morning of October 22,1976

It was 0300. My crew was asleep on the beach. I was anchored with a short anchor line and light anchor just behind the point of the sand spit at the south end of Bahia di San Jorge (Lat 31°-3'N, Long 113 -7' W) in the Gulf of California. It was a spring tide and I was not much suprised when at maximum ebb, the anchor dragged and I started to drift out to sea.

I started the outboard and started back to the beach near my anchorage. In the hurry to get the trip going, I had failed to chain the outboard to the transom. Suddenly, with a mocking roar, the engine jumped from the transom into the sea. For a moment I was too stunned to think. Then I decided that I would be an awfully stupid sailor to drift out to sea without even a sail to help direct my course.

I climbed on top of the cabin, wrapped my legs around the mast and started to bend on sail. I found that my crew, (now "safe?" on the beach) had really tangled the halyards when they took the sails down. From time to time I glanced over my shoulder and tightened my legs around the mast. The seas were getting bigger. It must have taken 15 minutes to straighten out the halyards in the dark.

The next operation was to ship the rudder and tiller which I had taken aboard when I beached the boat. Some crazy hunch caused me to take a hitch on the rudder and then on the tiller and secure the line to a cleat. (continued)

I had hardly put the rudder overboard when the rudder and tiller came apart at the hinge point and started to float away separately. Happily, with the securing line, I hauled the rudder & tiller back aboard. A big beautiful stainless steel bolt was missing. Perhaps it was aboard. Perhaps I could find it. Look! There was nothing else on board big enough to do the job. Then, as I started my hopeless task I remembered the bolt we used to secure the mast for trailering. I looked in the trailering gear. The bolt was almost perfect. Soon I was sailing.

After perhaps half an hour of beating towards my early anchorage, I found I was in shallow water. Assuming that I was on the left side of the channel, I turned right. Immediately I was in ankle deep water and found bare sand a dozen yards ahead. I was beached hard in a still ebbing tide. I crawled into my sleeping bag and went to sleep.

At daylight I found that I was beached on the sand spit 300 yards from my original anchorage and my crew.

The following are comments on the coast of Mexico. To a degree, I think it is rather presumptious to comment with so brief an introduction to the upper gulf. On the otherhand, much of what I said came from study rather than personal experience. However, I do believe that I picked some of the worst tides and a bit of rough weather. From my point of view, that is much better than had we had a light breeze and sunny day and had jumped from Laguna to Laguna. Then, I might have thought that the upper gulf was docile and kind.

Since I really blew this bit of research, I should be quietly sitting on the beach. You know, that would never do. The boss called up this morning, he plans to have me come to Monterey in two weeks and pick up a 42 foot ketch and sail it to Cabo San Lucas, to Mazatlan and then on to Manzanillo and return.

All I can say is: It looks like a Christmas in Mexico for me. I just hope I have my wife with me. Right now, it looks like she will go to San Diego and then fly home. Later, if we can work it out she will fly to Mazatlan or someplace futher south. It sort of looks like I might have my two sons for crew on the return trip. This would be pretty interesting. One son is 33 the other 30. I can see some arguments in a situation like that.

he Goast Of Mexico

by Harry & Edna Johnson

The coast from Punta Penasco to the spit on the south side of Bahia de San Jorge is a low sandy beach pierced by the entrances to Laguna Moruda (sp?) and Laguna Salada. Due to the shallow waters, winds and seas are simultaneous. When there are no seas, the lagoons may be entered and boats may be beached almost anywhere along the coast although care should be taken to avoid the black lava rock which occurs in many places. When there are seas, there is a continuous line of breakers. Neither of the lagoons may be entered and boats can not be beached.

It is more comfortable to cruise this area in the period of neap tides when anchoring is easier and currents are weaker. When the currents are strong and against the wind, seas become sharp and uncomfortable.

At low tide, when the wind is from the southeast, there is an almost continuous line of breakers from the tip of the sand spit at the south end of Bahia de San Jorge to Isla San Jorge (Bird Island). At mid tide, shrimpers skirt the end of the sand spit and head south.

About 6 miles south of the tip of the spit, a narrow bay runs about 4 miles to the south. All by a little bit of water at the entrance to the bay bares at low water.

GENERAL COMMENTS ON THE UPPER GULF OF CALIFORNIA

- 1. The upper Gulf of California is shallow and a 25 knot wind soon builds a rough sea.
- 2. Tides are high (20') thus requiring and extra 1 100 feet of anchor line to compensate for the rise in tide.

- 3. Due to high tides, flood and ebb currents are very strong, thus requiring good anchoring technic. When flood or ebb current is against the wind, the waves become sharp and steep.
- 4. There are no lights (no dependable lights). Thus, running at night must be avoided.
- 5. Secure anchorages are often 45 miles apart. Thus, boats should be able to run 45 miles in 9 hours.
- 6. Currents induced by tide and wind make dead reckoning very difficult.
- 7. Boats should not be beached at high tide. In spite of tidal predictions, the next high tide may not reach high enough to reach the boat. On a gradually sloping beach it might be impossible to move the boat back into the water.

God love'em, the conscientious Cholla launchers were awaiting his return in complete darkness and snugged his poor soaked outfit onto his trailer.

The reason Don and Karen have mixed emotions is because the day before nature got so upset, Karen nailed a 45 pound grouper, her mother, Selma, got a 35 pounder. Don caught a mess of big Pinto and, for frosting the whole bunch hooked and landed white sea bass.

Greedy "Triggers" Full Of Fight

I'm quite a mouther-offer about the relative fighting qualities of various finny inhabitants of the Gulf of California.

One tough little customer that practically is ignored by most sportswriters, yet can outfight fish almost twice his heft, is a mean, ugly old bucktoothed tiggerfish.

The Mexicans have aptly named him "cochi". Translated, it means pigfish. This name fits this everhungry scavanger, because the only time he'll knock off his nibbling is when the sun goes down.

If they ever grew in size to 40 or 50 pounds, I sincerely believe it would take tuna tackle to subdue one.

The largest that I have caught would have to strain to weigh 10 pounds. But before I finally got a glimpse of his slab-sided shape, I was convinced I was wrestling a 20 pound fish.

They are shaped much like a freshwater bluegill.

And when they turn sideways on the end of a fishing line and attempt to bore down to deeper water, they will put a bow in even the stoutest of fishing rods.

You hang into one of a freshwater bass rod, and it's nip-and-tuck as to who will land who.

They're equipped to tear up almost anything with meat on it in a most remarkable fashion. Their small mouth is just loaded with sharp canine teeth backed up with jaw muscles stout enough to nearly chop a pair of pliers in half.

With such a small mouth, they sometimes are hard to hook, driving a fisherman half crazy trying to figure out what in heck is ripping bait to shreds.

If you want to make a dedicated fisherman out of a kid, just equip them with a light action rod, a small reel loaded with 15.to 30 pound test line, a two ounce feather jig with a small peice of bait on the hook, and free spool it to the bottom anywhere in the Rocky Point-Cholla Bay offshore water.

These fish roam all over the place, and are liable to be caught almost anywhere. Like a shark, they seem to smell a piece of bait no matter where it is.

Not being a fish eater, all I can say is that some fishermen actually fish on purpose for these tigers, liking the fleecy steaks you can fillet off of each side, while other fishermen throw them back to the water in disgust, considering them trash.

If you don't want your fingernails trimmed clear up to your elbows, don't for gosh sakes, stick your pinkies anywhere near their greedy mouth.






