They left Guaymus early that morning for Melege then on to Loreto, Escondido Bay, Agua Verde Village, Napolo Village and then La Paz. They returned on the 25th with a good sun tan and many pleasant memories.

They had a bang up good time with lots of excitement. They didn't run out of gas except one day while traveling up the river at Mulege in their dingy their little engine ran out of fuel and they had to row back to the boat.

The Markets in the towns carry the basic foods that we have here in the States, but who wants to buy it when they can get the good Mexican food. Clams, Scallops and Oysters are in abundance if you can take the time to go out and get them.

The beaches are beautiful with very clear, clean warm water. The day time weather is between 80 and 85 degrees and the nights around 70.

There were no gas stations along the water front. Gas had to be brought in by truck in barrels and syphoned out with a garden hose into the boat. At one point, gas was hauled 18 miles down the road from Loreto to Escondido.

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Killer Whale Dead Ahead

You may recall in my last story we stopped outside Puerto De Lobos to have a sandwich and a drink. We each said we would be back. The ice house furnished us with some ice but we had so much fish we had little room for ice. We thought we would get more ice in Corborca. Because of our greed and being inclined to brag a little, we did not fillet our fish but kept them whole, so we could show our friends what big fishermen we were.

After going through a fine dust bowl, we came to a big wash, one road went right and one left. We took the road to the right (a mistake). After going eight miles over bad roads, we came to a ranch and a deadend. We came back and took the road to the left and at last arrived at Corborca. It was nine o'clock at night and everything was closed--no ice. We just made the border before they closed--and still no ice. We made Phoenix at four o'clock in the morning and went to bed. Next day the fish were too far gone to save. So we took them out to the desert and buried them. We had learned a lesson.

It was not long, however, before we were planning another trip to Puerto De Lobos. We replenished our fishing reels and larger rods. We also had wire line on our reels. So with permission from our wives, we three headed for Puerto De Lobos again. We are familiar with the laws of Mexico, so had no trouble except the road from Sonoyta to Corborca. We found you have to dodge the cattle and Mexican buses. We are also wise as to what road to take, as there are many to choose from. We had no trouble except we had to stop and dig the mud out from around the clutch, as Bill couldn't work it. We arrived at Puerto De Lobos late in the afternoon.

We were absolutely astonished to find there was not one single person in Puerto De Lobos. All the people had vanished. There was rubbish and paper plates scattered everywhere. We took the first adobe shack on the left as you go in. We unloaded so we would be ready the next morning to go fishing. We decided to camp on the outside of the house under the ramada, due to the scorpions. They had taken over the inside. After an early dinner, we settled down to play poker and at last to bed. We were very puzzled about how everyone could have disappeared in one month.

The next morning we went straight out to the big red snapper beds. We wanted to try out our new rods and reels there before we tackled the big groupers and the kelp around the point. The red snappers in those days were big and there was always plenty of them. After we tired of that, we went over to the white cliffs and trolled for groupers. We noticed birds diving in and out of the water a few miles off shore. Thinking it might be Sea Bass we went out to where they were. We thought of the rule: the birds will tell you where the fish are. We didn't have any luck, so headed for shore.

On the way in a big KILLER WHALE surfaced right in front of us. Bill turned the boat around and made a big, big circle and ran the inboard right up on shore. Chet was a little unhappy with Bill for running his inboard on the sand, but fortunately no harm was done.

We filleted our fish and got them on ice. I had the charcoal just about ready for the steaks when a small plane circled over head and landed on the beach. It was Dick Bonham, a Navy flyer. He had his wife and a small girl with him. He said he had spent two

years flying supplies back and forth for his cabin which was above the ice house. He rented it from someone in Corborca. It was the first time his wife had accompanied him. We checked in his apartment and everything had been stolen. We shared our bedding and food with them. The next morning they left to report the theft to the police. (Dick Bonham in 1962 helped search for the Davis boy who drowned at the Bay.

The next day Bill, Chet and myself fished around the point, but didn't catch any big groupers. The water was getting a little nasty and as we came ashore, we noticed another boat coming toward us. He informed us he couldn't start one of his motors and had drifted over to where the fish shacks are now, and as he pulled the starting rope, he pulled the motor off and it fell in the water. We dragged the water everywhere in the area, but we couldn't hook the motor on to anything to bring it up, so the ocean took one more. We took care of our fish and got ready for dinner. The next day the wind was really blowing, so we loaded up and headed for Phoenix.

When we arrived at Bill Blair's Garage in Phoenix, we saw a guy who said you guys should go to Puerto De Libertad. OH BROTHER HERE WE GO AGAIN!

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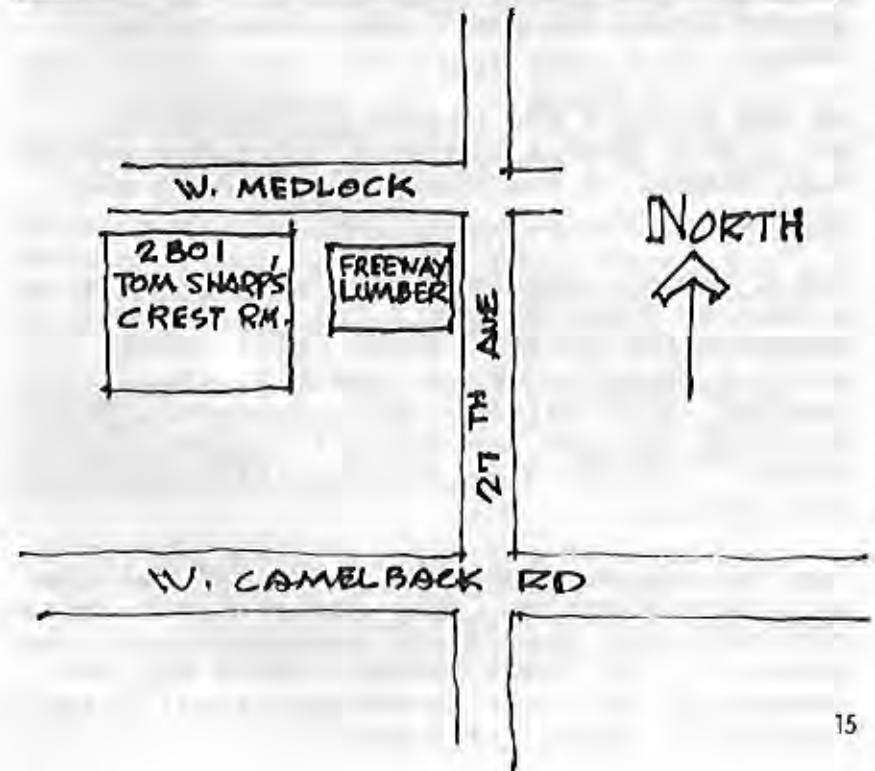

Recipe For The Month

GALLEY CHICKEN DINNER

There are several good recipes for chicken, trouble is, fresh chicken doesn't keep well in an icebox. Here is a recipe calling for canned chicken that will win you fantail raves, yet is very easy to fix on the top of a galley stove. Use a deep skillet or cast iron fry pan.

SAUTE 1 medium size chopped onion in 2 tsp butter.

ADD can of chicken soup plus 1 tbs mayonnaise.

ADD the 2 cans of boned chicken or turkey, and a can of peas, liquid and all.

SPRINKLE in 1 cup of crushed potato chips and 1 can drained pimentos.

COVER with skillet lid (or aluminum foil) and heat over medium burner about 10 minutes or until bubbly.

UNCOVER, SPRINKLE 1/2 cup crushed potato chips over top.

HEAT 5 minutes more to thicken. Serves 4, stretch to serve 6 by ladling over toast.
