



The Osprey is one of the largest of the hawks. He also goes by the name of "The Fishing Hawk". His average length is 22 inches with a wing span of 54 inches. He flies with a conspicuous crook in the long wings. This and the black wrist mark are good for identification at long distances. The young and immature birds have the same markings. The plumage is dark above and white below. His beak is curved and strong, his eye fierce and eagle-like.


To the newer visitors and residents of Cholla, the Osprey can be seen regularly sitting on Nacho's cross or on one of the many antennas.

He is classed as an uncommon or rare bird. Our Osprey in Cholla do not migrate as they do in other areas. They nest on the rocky ledges of cliffs or at the top of strong old trees.

During the nesting season, we seldom see more than one bird at a time. Both the male and female stay close to the nest, sharing in the hatching and raising of the fledgalings. In the later part of June, we again see them perched on the high points around the Bay. It is fun to watch the young birds learning to fish and to light on the antennas. They are as large as their parents but awkward in the beginning.

The Osprey fishes for his food by diving, talons first, into the water. He seldom misses. He comes surging up out of the water with strong wing beats, shaking himself to remove as much water from his feathers as possible and never losing his grip on his fish. He alights on the rocks or an antenna to eat his catch. Then he preens his feathers in preparation for the nest dive. He also can be seen hunting and catching small rodents.

His call is a series of loud clear whistles that can be heard at great distances. He can fly at great heights and seldom sails or glides except during migration.



In finding our way around on the water, one of the first things we need to be able to determine is our distance traveled.

For finding distance, we first need to know our boat speed. The practical way to do this is to run our boat over a known distance, preferably a measured mile, at different throttle settings and record the time required to make each run. We use this time and distance to determine speed.

To digress for a bit, we should consider some terms used in discussing speed and distance on the water. The unit of measurement is the nautical mile (6076 ft.) instead of the statute mile (5280 ft.) used on land. Also we do not use the term miles per hour, instead we say KNOTS. One knot is one nautical mile per hour. We will discuss the source of the nautical mile in a later article.

We can find either the speed (S) or the distance (D) traveled by knowing the other, and the time traveled by using the formula: Distance = speed x time. (D = S x T)

The type of boating we normally do involves relatively short distances, so we keep our time in minutes, but we express our speed in miles per hour or knots. Therefore we must convert our formula as follows:

$$60 \times D = S \times T$$

 $D = S \times T \div 60$
 $S = 60 \times D \div T$
 $T = 60 \times D \div S$

After finding our boat speeb at different engine RPM's, we make up a speed curve and post it near the throttle.

Now, knowing our speed and with a record of minutes traveled, we can figure the distance we have traveled. Or, knowing the speed and distance, we can figure how long it will take.

If we want to go to 24 mile reef and we have determined that our boat travels 20 knots at our best cruising speed of 3000 RPM's, how long will it take?

 $T = 60 \times 24 \div 20 = 72 \text{ minutes}$

We are at Bird Island, 27 miles from Cholla and it takes us 90 minutes to get back. What is our speed?

 $S = 60 \times 27 \div 90 = 18 \text{ Knots (Kn)}$






