DERBY RULES

1. Each contestant participating in the Derby must have a valid Derby Ticket before starting to fish. You must have a valid Mexican Fishing License and Boat Permit. All fishing must conform to Mexican Law. One Derby Ticket per person is good for four (4) weekends of the Derby. Fish must be caught with hook and line.

2. Derby Entries will be accepted on weekends only, starting May 27th, 1978. Scales will be open Saturdays and Sundays, 10:00 A.M. until 6:00 P.M.

Saturday: June 17th - Fish must be weighed and registered by 5:00 P.M. - - ABSOLUTELY NO EXCEPTIONS.

3. Judging: Judging of fish for prizes shall be done by Judges appointed by the Derby Committee with an equal number from each Chapter.

4. Prizes: There will be a Grand Prize winner for men, women and juniors 15 years of age or under. Any fish that wins a Grand Prize will not win any other Class Prizes. Additional prizes will be awarded for First, Second and Third Place and for First, Second and Third Junior Place in each category of fish. Prizes will consist of Trophies, Cash and Merchandise.

5. Presentations: Awards will be presented on the evening of the 17th of June, Last Day of the Derby, following the fish fry to be held at the Fish Fry Building.

NOTE: To encourage the release of Sailfish alive, a prize will be given to each person catching a Sailfish. You will be on your honor to state that the fish was brought to the boat and the fish was released at the leader.

6. Classes of fish eligible for prizes will be as follows:

Grouper	Pargo
Pinto	Skip Jack
Black Sea Bass	Flounder
Sea Trout	Sailfish (See Note)
Pompano	Cochi
Mackeral	Ladyfish
Yellow Fin	Sardinero
Dolphin	Shellfish (No Shrimp)
Red Snapper	Leatherfish

7. Jack-Pot:

Jackpot tickets will be sold prior to and during the Derby and will be available to anyone wishing to purchase them. It is not necessary to participate in the Derby in order to purchase a Jackpot ticket.

Cash will be awarded to winning Jackpot ticket holders. Winning tickets will be drawn at the Awards Ceremony. Winners Do Not have to be present. There will be several drawings of \$100.00, \$50.00 and \$25.00.

8. Donation of Fish: As you know, it is our custom to invite our Amigos, the citizens of Puerto Penasco and Cholla Bay to our Fish Fry. All fish donated will be prepared and served at the Fish Fry. Any food that is not served will be given to Mexican Charities in the Puerto Penasco and Sonoita areas.

On April 23, when there was a good Spring -5 low tide at 7:30 in the morning you may have seen me and a group of eight high school biology students from Las Cruces, New Mexico, out in the front part of Cholla Bay looking for sea life. If you haven't run into us, maybe you met a group from New Mexico Highlands University, New Mexico State University, Arizona State University, University of Arizona, University of California, or others, that are in Cholla Bay and Penasco to study sea life. The clear warm water from the south, the extremely low and high tides, the relatively calm water, and the great variety of marine environments, have made Cholla Bay a favorite place to study marine biology.

The purpose of this somewhat regular column is to introduce some of the seashore life and answer, if possible, the question, "What is that thing and what is it doing here?"

(CON'T.)

The drawing is of Cerithedia mazatlanica. I'm sure you thought that was what I was going to say. This is a technical name. It is no more foreign or strange sounding than many people's names are when you first run across them. If a person's name was Humberto Bagjohnivitch, that is what you would call him, so if a snail's name is Cerithedia mazatlanica, that is what you should call him.

The real experts say there is no "correct" way to pronounce technical names, so if you make a reasonable attempt and say all the letters, you can't be wrong. Usually they are pronounced as though they were in Spanish. I would divide this one Cer-i-thed-i-a maz-at-lan-i-ca and accent the middle syllable.

Anyway, the shell I drew is about like you would find on the shore in the back part of Cholla Bay. It is a pretty brown and white, with white bumps that tend to line up in three rows lengthwise on the shell. Besides what I have shown, there tend to be lengthwise ridges which can give the shell a checkerboard look. It is very often used in necklaces, driveways, and makes a nice shell to take back to friends who can't get to Cholla.

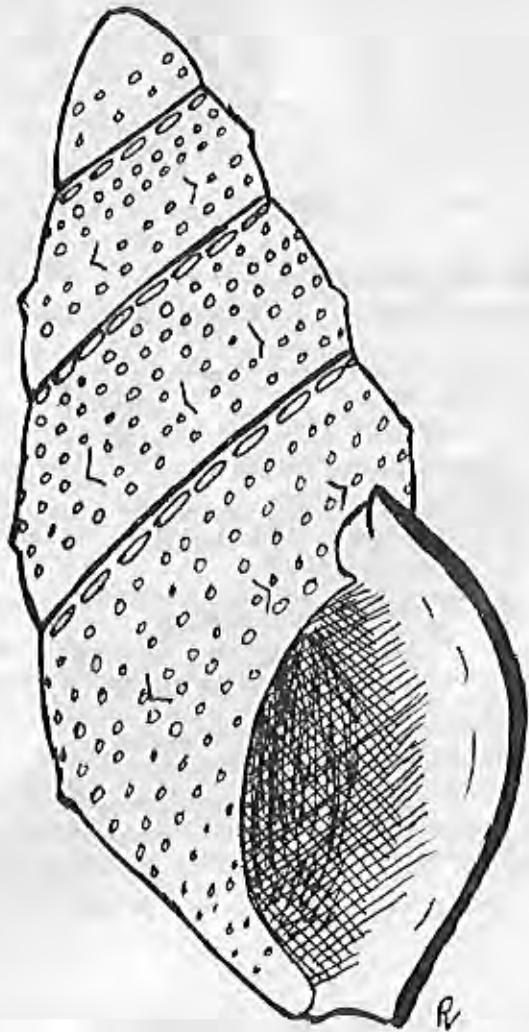
The common name for the group this snail belongs to is, Horn Shells. There is one that looks almost the same found around San Diego. They ought to be called Mud Snails because that is where they live. Unfortunately, another group got that name first. If you have the urge to find them alive, and you may also lose that urge when you hear where they live; try to wear some clothes that mud won't hurt, find the channel that opens to the green back part of Cholla Bay, and on the mud banks back there you

can find them by the thousands feeding on microscopic plant life on the mud. When they are alive, the shells are almost black, with lots of lengthwise ridges, but the white bumps still show. The same one lives at Lobos, Kino, and most of the Sea of Cortez.

The number one most obvious animal in Cholla Bay has to be this one. When the tide is out, in front of the radio shack, there are so many of these they make it look like there is black gravel on the flat bottom rocks. Even running over them doesn't seem to hurt them much. They make walking in Cholla Bay without something on your feet, a painful experience.

Last time I made a point about calling creatures by their right names. This time I am a little in the corner, because this one has a name even I can't remember. The first part of the technical name, the genus name, is not so bad. It is Cerithium. (cer-i-thi-um) But, the species name must have been made by someone who had something against all those who might try to say it. It is stercusmuscarum. (ster-cus-mus-car-um) A check in the book "Composition of Scientific Words" by Roland Wilbur Brown showed me that stercus-means dung, and -moscas means fly, Flyspecks on the rocks?

It is closely related to the animal from last time, Cerithidea mezatlanica, and the common name for both is horn shell. Both get food by eating small plants, but Cerithium prefers the rocks and fast flowing water. Both of them are found in the back part of Cholla Bay, one up in the mud, like we said last time, and Cerithium down in the fast flowing water on what rocks there are.

The most outstanding part of the shell to me is the mouth. If you really take the time to look at it, the shape is as graceful and flowing as the drawing shows. It has a small, groove-like opening at the very base, and nice white trim inside the mouth, but it is black down inside.

The shell of Cerithium is used often by hermit crabs, so any one you find with little red legs is a crab. Usually if they are stacked on top of each other on the rocks, they are crabs.

The same one lives on the Baja side, and is reported along the coast to Peru.

If you really want to get serious about identifying shells at Penasco, the classic, most accepted reference book is "Sea Shells of Tropical West America" by A. Myra Keen, Standford University Press, 1971. The rather stiff price, \$29.50, is not enough to cover the cost of the book. It's publishing was supported also by grants and gifts. A paperback that has helped me a lot is, "A Field Guide to Pacific Coast Shells" by Percy A. Morris, which was \$3.95 when I got mine.
