
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
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C. B. S. C. PHOENIX CHAPTER GENERAL MEETING

You wont believe this, but I've often seen schools fo Mackeral off Pelican Point so huge that they strectched from as far as you could see north to as far as you could see south. I've also observed feeding schools such a savage frenzy that in their speedy chase to inhale helpless Baitfish they've actually banged into the side of my outboard as they'd burst thru the surface in a frantic lunge for prey. These tremendeous schools began to deminish in the early fifties. Now, in the late 70's, about the only way you can be assured of tangling with a herd of these sharp toothed rascals in to sashay on down to Bird Isle. Most fishermen look down their noses at Sierras, classing them as good only for bait. I'm here to tell you, that you'd have a tough time finding a more worthy antagonist if you use tackle to match the size of your buarry. A 5 lb Sierra is a big bruiser, and a 10 pounder is a real giant, while the average size mackerel runs from about 1 to 3 pounds. If you like to fish for sport, try this on for size. Arm yourself with a freshwater bass casting (or spinning) rod, use line no heavier than 10 pound test, get(or make) several short wire leaders (a must, as a Sierras tooth bones are as sharp as razors) and an assortment of shiney or chromed spoon type lures. The most efficient method (unless you spot terns, pelicans or boobies diving into a patch of water) of finding a school of these hustlers is to troll at a fairly fast clip (5 to 7 mph.) till you luck onto a school. Usually you'll get either a double or even triple hookup of you're dragging that many lines. Once you locate the school, cast a lure in the vicinity, allow it to sink for several seconds, then retreive it rapidly -- as fast as you can crank. The chances are excellent that you'll get a strike. If the fish are in the 1 to 3 lb class, you'll have a ball on the 10 lb outfit. If they happen to run as heavy as 5 lbs, you'll be lucky to land 50% of your

hookups, and if you happen to be fortunate enough to luck on to a school of BIGGIES -- over 5 lbs., baby watch out! It took me 20 beathtaking minutes to finally land an 8 pounder off the rocks between Pelican Point and Sand Beach several years ago--and I hooked him on 12 1b test line. Babies of this size can really smoke a drag on some of thier prolonged runs. The point of this whole mess of mis-mash is to try and convince you that sport fishing for Sierras is really worth the effort -- and if you take the time and effort to thoroughly clean them within a half hour after snaking them from the water, then cozy them up to ice, you'll be pleasantly surprised at just how tasty their firm white flesh can be, after cooking over a bed of hot coals. A few tips: Be sure and use a bal bearing swivel slabspoon-Dixie Jet -Kastmaster - Small Diamond Jig - Bagleyspoon-Weber Mr Champ. Best trolling lure--still the reliable Tony Accetta spoon. You're liable to stumble onto a school of Sierras practically any where during the summer months, so be sure and have a spin-rig all set up stashed aboard--it just might make the difference between a successfull trip or a Skunkey-Poo.

The Red-Billed Tropicbird

The Tropicbird is one of the six families of aquatic fish eating birds with all 4 toes webbed.

The 6 families are the Tropicbirds, the Pelicans, the Frigatebirds, the Gannets and Boobies, the Gormarants, and the Anhinga.

There are 3 species of the Tropicbirds -only one do we see in the Cholla area -- the

red-billed tropicbird.

As he is a pelagic bird he will be seen out in the water -- seldom close to shore. You may see him in the nesting area at Bird Island--or at a cliff area against the coastline.

The adults, as the pelican and gulls, are alike in sexes. They resemble large terns with greatly elongated tail feathers. Their bills are stouter and slightly decurved. They feed on fish, squid, and crustaceans. Like the tern they dive into the water for fish.

They are white with a barred back--black tipped primaries on wings. The bill is red. The immature bird has a yellow bill. They

lay one egg.

In one of Jaques Cousteau's films the Tropicbird was shown. That explained the awkwardness of the bird that was bothering me. His legs are extremely short and stubby. So much so that his breast seem that of a Pouter Pidgeon. It is almost immpossible for him to take flight from land. He must launch from a ledge--as he does when nesting -- or a heighth for effective flight. His flight as he comes up from the water is as if his feathers had become over saturated with water. Also I thought he was losing his feathers or had been hung up in

a feathered lure. Instead it was 2 long central tail feathers.

Look for him when you are out in your boat fishing -- he is classed as a rare bird.

1979 DERBY RULES

- 1. Each contestant participating in the derby must have a valid derby ticket and a valid Mexican fishing license before starting to fish. All boats must have a valid boat permit and must fill out a launch slip prior to entering the water. Fish must be caught with hook and line.
- 2. Classes of fish eligible for prizes:
 - a. Grouper
 b. Pinto
 j. Skipjack
 c. Black Sea Bass
 d. Sea Trout
 e. Pampano
 f. Mackeral
 g. Dolphin
 di. Pargo
 j. Skipjack
 k. Flounder
 l. Cochi
 m. Sardinero
 f. Leatherfish
 g. Dolphin
 o. Sailfish (see note)
- h. Red Snapper

 3. Judging and prizes:
- a. Judging of fish for prizes shall be done by judges appointed by the derby chairman, with equal representation from each chapter.
- b. Fish will be judged according to weight (except sailfish see note).
- c. There will be a grand prize winner for men, women, and juniors 15 years of age or under. Fish taking a grand prize trophy will not be eligible for any other cash prizes; additional prizes will be awarded for first, second and third place, adult class; and first, second and thir place, junior class, in each catagory of fish (except sailfish - see note).
 - d. Prizes will consist of cash and trophies.
 - e. NOTE:
- (1) In the interest of sportsmanship and to prevent unnecessary waste, the following special rules apply to sailfish:
- (2) Awards will be presented for the first sailfish registered only, regardless of weight, for each division, men, women and juniors 15 years or under. Sailfish will not be eligible for grand prize trophy.
- (3) In addition a special "Sportsmans Trophy" will be awarded to the person catching and releasing the most sailfish. The sailfish must be brought to the boat and released at the leader. This must be witnessed and verified by at least two (2) persons. Since this is an honor system type of judgement, we trust everybody will act in the best interest of true sportsmanship.

- 4. Registration and weighing of catches: The scales will be open for weighing from 10:00 A.M. until 6:00 P.M. each day of the derby, except Sunday, September 2, scales will close promptly at 5:00 P.M. Derby days are as follows May 26, 27 and 28; June 16 and 17; July 21 and 22; September 1 and 2.
- 5. Derby tickets:
- a. A derby ticket entitles the purchaser to fish all nine days of the derby may be purchased prior to or during the derby for the sum of \$10.00 per adult or \$5.00 per junior. Daily derby tickets may be purchased on the day you wish to fish only for the sum of \$2.50 per adult or \$1.50 per junior.
- b. In either case, a valid derby ticket must be in your possession before you start to fish.
- 6. Jackpot tickets: Jackpot tickets will be sold prior to and during the derby and will be available to anyone wishing to purchase them.
