



As some of you know, we are living in Sanaa, The Yemen Arab Republic, which is about 130 long, mountainous miles from the Red Sea. We finally received our Blazer from the states and managed to get it registered and licensed. (Not a fast or easy thing to do here)

We left Sanaa about 6:00 A.M. on Thursday, March 31st and headed west. Sanaa has an elevation of about 7500 ft. Approximately 20 miles out of Sanaa we reached about 9500 ft. We had breath-taking views and unbelievable hair pin curves for approximately 100 miles (with cars taking their half out of the middle around each one), then descended finally to the Tehama (desert) and sea level for the remainder of the trip. We drove south for about 70 more miles, then down a gravel road to the west about 20 miles and finally the Red Sea came into view. What a beautiful sight!! Especially after missing Cholla Bay so much.

As soon as the vehicle came to a stop on the beach, we got into swimsuits and headed into the water. It felt good after driving through the hot Tehama. Then we picked up a few shells, got back into the Blazer and went about 3 miles futher down the beach to a beautiful spot with groves of palm trees, straw huts and gazeebos where we were to camp.

We pitched out tent under a couple of palm trees, got ourselves organized, and got back into the sea. Here the water was quite calm, as it was a sort of cove. We went occasionally back to our original spot to swim since there were breakers there and it was more fun jumping over the breakers.

We camped there from Thursday early afternoon until Saturday about noon relaxing, swimming, shelling and just having a good time. Ken went out fishing on Friday in a small fishing boat, but not far enough to get any big fish. Got a few small ones. We were with a group of about 15 people from here in Sanaa. Some had gone a day earlier and found the camping site.

Since we were close to the equator (about 14° latitude) you can imagine how hot the sun was However, we had a nice breeze most of the time and the palm trees helped immensely. The weather was just beautiful. We came back to Sanaa a little sunburned, but happy to have had the wonderful experience of visiting the Red Sea.

We took many pictures, but don't have any developed as yet. If we get some good ones, will try to get them printed in another issue of the CHATTER.

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DAY TWO - FRIDAY, MARCH 18, 1983

We went to sleep under stars and woke up with the rain. Our chef was up at 2:30 A.M. starting the fire, the coffee and the breakfast in the rain. Everyone else was a little later in getting up but eventually we were all gathered either at the fire or in the 22 foot horse trailer trying to keep our eggs and pancakes dry.

Now we're all wearing ponchos made out of six foot clear plastic bags and look like a prophylactic parade (How come we're not laughing at Hauptman's nice, warm, dry, yellow rainsuit anymore?).

We set our odometer back to 0 and headed out at 7:05 A.M. This terrain was beautiful cacti and a half way decent road. We rode 20.2 miles before we took a beer break.

If you've noticed during this writing we have introduced people as incidents happened. We're taking this opportunity to introduce you to a really mean guy. started out with an engine problem, right from the beginning of the trip, everyone was concerned...one ATC kept dying...with all of our mechanics no one could come up with an answer. At 8:15 A.M. the second day 20.2 miles on our odometer we waited for the injured ATC, it's driver and the 2 mechanics that lagged behind. Finally, one-half hour later, the injured ATC shows up, clean and sharp as ever. "Where are the medics that helped?" we asked. After the mechanics arrived, we headed out on a smooth but snaky road.

At 10:15 A.M. and 51.1 miles we left this beautiful area and waited for our support crew to take us across the border. After a while a decision was made that this spot was not conducive to pack the bikes on the trucks, so we rode to Gringo Pass and started the job.

At 2:30 P.M. (67.2 miles) and a few beer breaks in between, there came a fork in

NAVIGATOR'S NOTEBOOK

In finding our way around on the water, one of the first things we need to be able to determine is our distance traveled.

For finding distance, we first need to know our boat speed. The practical way to do this is to run our boat over a known distance, preferably a measured mile, at different throttle settings and record the time required to make each run. We use this time and distance to determine speed.

To digress for a bit, we should consider some terms used in discussing speed and distance on the water. The unit of measurement is the nautical mile (6076 ft.) instead of the statute mile (5280 ft.) used on land. Also we do not use the term miles per hour, instead we say KNOTS. One knot is one nautical mile per hour. We will discuss the source of the nautical mile in a later artical.


We can find either the speed (S) or the distance (D) traveled by knowing the other, and the time traveled by using the formula: Distance = speed x time. (D == $S \times T$)

The type of boating we normally do involves relatively short distances, so we keep our time in minutes, but we express our speed in miles per hour or knots. Therefore we must convert our formula as follows:

 $60 \times D = S \times T$ $D = S \times T \div 60$ $S = 60 \times D \stackrel{?}{=} T$ $T = 60 \times D \stackrel{?}{=} S$

After finding our boat speed at different engine RPM's, we make up a speed curve and post it near the throttle.

Now, knowing our speed and with a record of minutes traveled, we can figure the distance we have traveled, or, knowing the speed and distance, we can figure how long it will take.



If we want to go to the 24 mile reef and we have determined that our boat travels 20 knots at our best cruising speed of 3000 RPM's, how long will it take?

 $T = 60 \times 24 \div 20 = 72 \text{ minutes}$

We are at Bird Island, 27 miles from Cholla and it takes us 90 minutes to get back. What is our speed?

 $S = 60 \times 27 \div 90 = 18 \text{ knots (Kn)}$

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
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
