The Chatter

If the paving of Route (8) from Sonoyta to Rocky Point in 1941 had a profound impact on the economy of northern Sonora, then certainly the opening of Route (2) from San Luis R.C. to Sonoyta in 1956 can claim it's share of credit to the rapid development of northwest Sonora, that we have all witnessed over the past two and one half decades.

But perhaps the opening of Route (2)'s greatest contribution was in the field of Archaeology: Soon after it's completion wood haulers from San Luis were breaking trails up the washes-higher and higher - in search of ironwood (the World's most perfect fuel wood) and mequite.

Although the region had been visited by explorers before, few had ever had the stamina or perserverance to penetrate this harsh and bloody ground reputed to be inhabitated by rapacious and merciless savages. One was Wm. T. Hordaday - for whom the fish-guide land mark Sierra Harnaday is named - in 1906. By then the Pinacatenos were extinct. But few people, other than the cattlemen in the area, were aware of it. And their belief was based upon the fact that "butchering" of their cow-critters had ceased. The Seris that had survived had been driven off the mainland to Isla Tiburon, but were still making forays as late as 1939, when in that year this writer was on a cattle buying spree at the Sykes & Waddell Rancho northwest of Hermosilla. The Yaquis had retreated to

the headwaters of the Yaqui River and were never fully conquered. All the other tribes had been absorbed into a fuedal system in which they were virtually serfs to the Cattle Barons.

Very little is definetly known about the Pincatenos, or the neighboring tribes from the time of Father Kine in 1701 until 1851 when Yellow Fever practically wiped them out. Only four families of the Pinacatenos survived. Shortly thereafter a few families of Arenenos joined them to fill the void of tinajas (about 42 altogether) and the dunes to the south and west of the mountain. This group continued the strike-and-run war with the ever expanding and enchroaching ranches of the stockmen until 1896, when a war party killed two sleeping vagueros at Quitobuquito (which today is visible from Route (8) just north of the Intermational Boundry fence eact of LosVidros, and is actually in Arizona and retreated into the vastness of the lava flows.

Two uncles of Alberto Celaya (who pioneered the L.P. Gas business in Penasco, and now retired) joined a posse from Sonoyta which took their trail and finally overtook them in the dunes west of the Tinaja de los Papago, and exterminated them, all but one little girl, who was taken to Sonoyta and grew up there.

But to get back to the wood haulers trails: Scientists at the University of Arizona and Hermosilla were becoming increasingly aware of the ease with which this Pandora's Box of archeological lore could be reached, and soon a 4WD trail was open as far as the Tinaja de Tos Papagos, and beyond.

Nowhere in the Southwest - and few places on earth - was there such a Bonanza! Where every mark which man has made in the pavements and the flows since Pluvial times, and every imperishable artifact dropped by him, remain in situ, and intact until disturbed by the surveyors that followed, and who were able to overlook the entire occupied history of a site from a single vanatage point, and were also able to reconstruct the archaeology of the Sierra Pinacate. Except in the steeply pitched arroyas, the level lavas with their thin overburden of windblown sands and silts are extremely resistant to erosion, and the silts themselves are protected against cutting by the ubiquitous "desert varnish".

In a future column I propose to attempt to describe the fuedal life on a "Hacienda" in northwest Sonora, in it's closing days about 1939 A.D.




