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

Our condolences also to the family of John Lazear, who died the 4th of November and was burried November 8th in Winslow, AZ.

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

Marcelo Alvarez started the Cummins diesel and we headed into the first wave of our voyage to San Carlos. The time - 1:10 A.M., Monday, July 7, 1980. We wondered if anyone in Cholla turned in cool beds and thought "There they go."

As the lights of Penasco faded from sight, we really begin to appreciate the night around us. Never was there such grandeur in the sky. Constellations we had never observed before seemed to welcome us on our journey. Then, at first light the sea around us came alive. A whale blew us a greeting, dolphins seemed to be everywhere and sail fish skipped about tempting us to try our outriggers. What a day to remember!

Up to now the only thing that mars our trip is the concern the men have because the marine radio will not transmit. All day they have tried to reach Betty. We had agreed to call at five every afternoon and again at eight in the morning.

We anchored and spent a restful night at Isla Patos (Duck Island) just at the north tip of Isla Tiburon. were up and away at dawn and were ready to round Point Willard when our Cummins sputtered and died. We were shocked, a Cummins never let anyone down. were relieved to find that we were only out of diesel. Thanks to our lucky stars, our VHF contacted the BARBIE DOLL in San Carlos. He told us to put up a white flag and a shrimp boat might come to our aid. Our white sheet will forever bear the scars of this day. the mean time, ho would see that we get help from Kino.

Believe it or not, the Propemex D.F. 25, a spectacular tuna boat out of Ensenada came to our rescue. They soon had us in tow, to where we wondered, at a speed our EMMA LOU ANDALE had never dreamed of going. Guapos jovenes were posed on deck. Their brown bodies

gleamed in the morning sun. Their short, short cut offs, their mod hair cuts would make a senorita (and maybe a senora) look twice. The best part that I observed concerning these young men was sensored by Rolando.

By 10:30, the JO-DANDY and the SAND-PIPER, two Bayliners from Kino came alongside with 20 gallons of diesel. Our tow rope let go of the Propemex tuna boat and pulled away but Marcelo yelled "Dirty girlie books", and that tuna boat reversed itself so suddenly that we thought it would ram us, but they stopped just in time and all hands reached for the PLAYBOY magazines. The Cashions had told us they would assure us our welcome.

The Propemex tuna boat was soon out of sight but I was gravely reminded of how Mexico has given us gum, chocolate and vanilla and we are giving them, in return, girly books to pollute their young minds. Que Paso?

We anchored off a sprawling sandy shore in Kino and had no trouble obtaining 75 gallons of diesel. It was hauled to shore by truck, transferred to a long boat and brought to us over very choppy water. Putting diesel from five gallon cans into our boat is becoming a fine art with us. We were surprized that the JO-DANDY and SANDPIPER did not charge us a dime for coming to our rescue. They were from Pecos, Texas, maybe that is why they are so big hearted. Anyway, I later wrote and thanked them.

By five o'clock, we are headed for San Carlos. We had expected to spend the night in Kino, but the school of hard knocks is going to teach us another lesson. This is the way it came about. A fellow by the name of Richardo met Marcelo on shore, said he needed a ride to San Carlos to pick up a boat. He said that he had made the trip many times and knew the way in the dark. Marcelo took him at his word but Richardo too soon became an albatross about our necks. He began by putting on Rolando's cap, hung the binoculars around his neck, took possession of a large beach towel and demanded food. He couldn't tell us which way was up much less the way to San Carlos.

When we are four hours from Kino, it is pitch dark and not a shore light

to be seen. We decide it is time to stop before we run into something. A sudden storm from the south became constant. Our anchor will not reach bottom. We put out another anchor and had the faith that one would catch so we wouldn't drift too far.

We were all tired, except Richardo, he was asleep wrapped in our beach towel with a life jacket for a pillow. There was nothing to do but wait until dawn. I said my prayers, turned our lives over to the care of God and went to sleep.

At first light, we pulled anchors and were on our way. The sea was so smooth that I fixed breakfast with full speed ahead. I am getting good at juggling pots and pans. On this occasion, we had home made waffles, straight from our freezer, heated up to a turn. I hadn't planned on a guest so we were a little short changed.

By 10:45 o'clock we have passed Pta. San Pedro and rounded Pta. Dobles and entered into a breath taking sheltered cove. San Carlos, we have arrived! Beautiful homes are high above us on the sheer cliffs of the peninsula that stretches out toward the Marina.

Limpia, limpia, limpia - the water and the shore line are so beautifully clean. We are soon settled into a slip with plenty of artesian water. No one ever told us how very beautiful San Carlos is. It is protected from storms by the small entrance that makes it more like a large lake. Such large yachts, they could pass for small ships and were moored in the outer entrance. Graceful sail boats reminded us of the Marina Del Rey in San Diego. I could enjoy this for the rest of the summer.

Marcelo is all excited about meeting so many old friends. Rolando is determined to make the marine radio work. I doubt if either one of them appreciate the grandeur around them. Anyway, business before pleasure, so they go to see the Capitania de Puerto and our troubles begin.

It seems that the papers we spent a full day in Penasco to get just right, were not acceptable here. We were out of the free zone. We were advised to load up with diesel and water and high tail it out of there. But the fellow wanted to do the proper thing and I

wanted so much to linger a while here in this heavenly place, so we paid, paid and paid at every turn. Besides, Rolando and Marcelo had to spend three days in the hot immigration office in Guaymas. They had to get there every day by public bus until Eldon Annis loaned them his rented car.

In the evenings, Rolando made another effort to get the marine radio to work as we had not been able to contactholla since our departure. We checked in San Carlos, no one had tried to check on us.

The last straw came when the immigration office suggested that we should leave our cruiser and return to the United States by train until the matter was straightened out. No way, we said, and realized now more than ever that we were very fortunate to have Marcelo with us.

Finally, at one o'clock Friday afternoon Rolando and Marcelo returned from Guaymas with a promise that for 100 pesos an hombre would bring our papers all signed and in order. We try to relax and wait.

To pass the time, we take a tour in Eldon's rented Ford. We found an interesting community, villas with launderettes, grocery stores and curio shops. Everything is very high in price except Mexican bananas.

At a little after the appointed hour the hombre arrives with the papers and we pay again for the last time, we hope. We prepare to go.

I must mention the pretty city bred pelicans living here at San Carlos. Not a gleaming feather was out of place as they sat on posts or floating barges. When a boat returned from the fishing grounds, these huge birds seemed to either glide over like ballerinas or they would gracefully lift wide wings just above the water and without a ripple, station themselves and await their meal. Watching those pelicans was worth the whole trip.

Saturday morning before day light, we started out on our return journey. We were led to believe that if we didn't go when our papers indicated, we would have to go through this immigration thing all over again.

As we slowly came out of the San Carlos marina and rounded Pta. Dobles,

we came upon a rough rolling ocean. The 50 gallon barrel of diesel that we had added to our supply started bearing starboard. Rolando tries to keep it in the center and I try to help by standing port side so that between the two of us, we keep that barrel and the boat at even keel. Life jackets are put on. I put food and water in the dingy, just in case. Marcelo's steady hand at the helm gives us courage.

At 9:15 we anchor in a cove called Cerro Bocana. We are secure here. We eat breakfast and wait out the storm. A tuna boat shares our haven with us. When a large craft such as this turns sales in - it must be a storm.

We are soon invaded by swimming muchachos. No Engles, so we have a chance to practice our Spanish. These swimming wonders use our bow as a spring board to practice their diving. Around they go, up the back of the boat down the side, then the dive.

Besides ninos; pigs, peacocks and herds of goats with many young kids, shared this small Cerro Bocana. I ask Marcelo if he knew where the ninas were as there were none in sight. In fact I didn't even see a young girl in San Carlos. Long boats brought the men of the village home early because of of the storm.

When the evening was still young, there seemed to be a gathering of people. Some on foot, some in cars or trucks. Marcelo explained that it was Saturday night and everyone around came to enjoy the cool beach.

Coal oil or gas lights flickered here and there but soon all was still. We slept. But not until after we realized that our VHF had given up the ghost. Now we have no contact, even with a shrimper.

Too early the next morning, we seem to be racing up the coast. We steer wide to get past shallow shouls. The sea seems tired and is content to gently roll.

Now we have no radio contact what so ever so Marcelo wants to go back by Kino and telephone his wife, Carmeleta, because he is afraid she will worry about us. The call went right through and we were soon on our way.

A sliver of a moon goes down as we slowly enter the calm waters of Patos Isla once again. Fish abound here but

we are too tired to get excited about them, so we just enjoy seeing them come to our light.

Very, very early we glide out into a smooth ocean. We take advantage of this lively morning and have an early breakfast in case there is a change in the weather. When the galley is ship shape, I go aloft to watch the day. However, I am disturbed because Rolando is hoarse and seems to have a fever.

All of a sudden, as can happen on the Sea of Cortez, a northwester whips up to 20 MPH and the waves roll and break. At noon, we are glad to anchor at Lobos. We were secure as Lobos has a good natural harbor. We decide that we will surely come here again.

Rolando has a temperature of 1030. As I try to bring it down with cool towels, the Mexican boys again use our boat as a spring board. What wonderful swimmers and divers they are. There could be Olympic material right here on our boat.

FROM THE SKIPPER OF THE EMMA LOU

Knowing that many of our CBSC members might be thinking of a cruise, a list of my mistakes on our trip to Guaymas might save some headaches!

1. Get proper papers, especially on the boat! Rocky Point is in the free zone. Cost is \$4000 pesos plus 3 days running between San Carlos and Guaymas to get clearance to leave if your papers are not correct.

- 2. Be positive about the amount of consumption per hour of your engine. We had a harrowing experience when we ran out of fuel at the southern end of Tiburon Is. We found that our tank held 100 gallons and not 120 as the brochure reported.
- Double check your radio for distance and after warm-up. We had many lonely and wondering hours after both radios quit.
- Never run your engine while at anchor to charge the batteries. We did this and it cost us 10 hours of prescious fuel.
- Know your first fuel stop and be sure you have more than enough to get there.
- Have some pre-arranged stops for check points in case of radio failure. This happened to us and it drives you up the wall wondering if someone is looking for you.
- 7. Most important thing of all! HAVE A BUDDY BOAT

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
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
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
