

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

I am also sure that things are needed for the Christmas raffle. If you have any thing, please bring it to the meeting. THANK YOU.


Please don't forget the Club Dance that will carry the"50's" theme on October 26th at the Western Saddle Club.

Because of the National Elections in Mexico, J.J.'s Cantina had to close down from Friday through Monday in July. So our Search and Rescue, Scuba Diving Team Bill Schramm and Mike Riggs put on a Bar-B-Que on the new veranda for anyone who wanted to come. Texas Joe used the down time to overhaul the Cantina's generator so that we could continue to see our favorite T.V. programs via satiellite. Everyone missed the spectacular fireworks display that Lou and Shelly Bock usually had at their cabin.

Rumor has it that in the near future, Butch and Billie Wilda, will take up Scuba diving! Question, how does one go about breaking a leg under water? If there is a way, they will find it!

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In the many years I have been coming to Cholla I had never gone across Adair Bay to San Felipe, so on June the 26th at 8:00 A.M. the trip began. The Sandman's Dream, a 28 foot Fiberform boat left Cholla Bay for a trip across Adair Bay and to go on down the Baja California Coast to the Bay of De Los Angeles. There were 8 people aboard. Tony and Mike, co owners of the Sandman's Dream, Simon, our guide and skipper from San Felipe, Tony Jr, Gary and His son Brian, a friend of Tonys, from Phoenix, then Valena, my daughter and me. We took a 240 degree heading from Cholla, about one hour and forty five minutes, out of Cholla, the fuel filter clogged, filters were changed, then there were batteries problems. Being that batteries were dead, the battery charger was started and soon the batteries were charged enough to start the boat engines, we were on our way again. It was about 22 miles from Cholla. About 10:40 A.M. we stopped again to change filters on the other engine and then underway again shortly after. Twelve o'clock noon, we had to stop again and change a fuel pump, now we are North of Consag Rock about 22 miles from San Felipe. It took about one hour to change the fuel pump and clean filters again. After changing gas filters and cleaning filters, then disconnecting the large gas filter we had finally gotten about 12 miles from San Felipe, time 3:35P.M. Tonite we anchor in the harbor, the gas will be drained from the tanks, hoping to eliminate the gas problems. Six thirty we make it into the San Felipe Harbor and anchor, Simons brothers meet us there, we get what we need for a nights stay and Simon took us to the La Rivera Hotel in town. We rent two rooms, onr for the two boys, my daughter and me and the other for Mike, Tony and Gary. We ate dinner at the El Nido Restaurant down the road from the hotel, after dinner, Gary, the 3 kids and I went back to the Hotel, Simon, Tony, and Mike went to the boat. Simon's brother had been pumping off the gas. They all worked on the boat most of the night. They cleaned the gas tank with alcohol, then wiped out as much sledge as they could.

The morning of the 24th, we all went to breakfast at the El Cortez Motel Restaurant. Then
we went back to the boat to get a change of
clothes, swinsuits and towels, as Tony told us
we would be spending another night in San Felipe.
Tony, Mike and Simon took us back to the Hotel.
Gary and the boys played checkers and gin rummy
Valena and I went swimming. Later on in the
afternoon Tony and Mike took us into the main
part of town. It is similar to the old part of

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Rocky Point. There are several shops, cantinas, stores, etc. We bought a few things then stopped at a Taco stand and had fish and shrimp tacos for lunch. From there we went to Ruhens which is on the north end of San Felipe. We had Coco Locos, which is a tequilla, run and coconut milk in a half of a coconut. Ruhens is also an R.V. park with spaces for trailers and ramadas. We saw a real strange boat launcher, (our launcher men in Cholla would get a real chuckle if they had seen it.) San Felipe had a beautiful long beach front, clean and well kept. Tony and Mike dropped us off at the Hotel and they went back to the boat, and worked on the boat until 9:30P.M. We ate dinner at the El Cortez Restaurant, then back to the Hotel and to hed.

June 25th, we were up about 6:00A.M., checked out of the Hotel, down to the harbor and on the boat and ready to get underway again. We are heading for Puertecitos, about 15 miles out of San Felipe and about 8 miles from the shoreline. Simon throws his net and nets a school of sardines to use for bait, and another mile or so we stop to fish, and to take care of more engine problems. Tony and Simon worked on the boat while the kids and Mike and Gary fish. They caught what Simon called a bone fish and corbina. The bone fish have yellow gills, look somewhat like Macherel. Bone fish is good bait, and corbina is good to eat, also rock bass and a couple of baby pinto's were caught. The guys repaired the engine problems and we head for Puertecitos to gas up. The wind has picked up some. Coming around the rock point and into the half moon cove of Puertecitos, we get ready to get as close as we can to the boat ramp to gas up. The boat is pulled next to the rock wall and Simon's brother and his friends are there to help put gas in the boat. After the boat is filled we pull out and go around to North Beach, which is on the north side of Puertecitos. We anchor, make a call to Cholla Radio to check in for the night. We fix dinner, play cards and go to bed.

June 26th - we head out of North Beach, just after sunrise and a couple cups of coffee, to the Golden Reef to fish. Mike had shot off a few firecrackers off the bridge of the boat last evening and this morning he shot off some on the stern of the boat and woke everyone up. Some alarm clock! Fished about 3 hrs. on the Golden Reef, had lots of bits. Valena lost a grouper or a good sized fish. Tony also lost a nice sized one. There were lots

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of yellowtail breaking the water, but no one caught any. On our way to Pumis Island we watched a hugh herd of porpoise, maybe eighty or so coming towards us. They turned and swam alongside the boat for about a mile. We anchored at Pumis Reef, the 6th island out of Puertecitos,- we caught rock bass, trigger fish, chiwillies, beautiful orange fish. There were several good hookups, one of which just about pulled Valena out of the boat. But it went in the rocks and she lost it. The water around Pumis Rock is crystal clea and you can see at least 15 or 20 feet down to the bottom - it was beautiful! It is about 5:45P.M., the water is beautiful, just as smooth as glass, we are still having battery problems, due to one bad alternator, not serious though. We will spend the night in Gonzaga Bay. Seven o'clock in the evening, we are anchored in Gonzaga Bay, the bay is quiet, the water looks like a mirror. Mike and Simon clean the Trigger and Chiwillies, We will have fish for dinner tonight. Everyone is relaxing and having a few rum and cokes, we try to check into Cholla Radio this evening. We either couldn't hit the repeater or our batteries are too low. Simon talked to a friend in San Felipe and they will relay our message. While Mike and Simon were cleaning the fish, they tossed the remains in the water. Simon discovered all the little fish feeding, so the kids got their rods with small hooks, we baited the hooks and the kids are bringing fish in right and left. The kids caught 50 or so bait fish that looked like minature macherel. We will use them tomorrow for bait. The kids were tired and they went to bed. I went swimming and then Simon and Mike decided to go swimmming. It was very refreshing after a hot day. Then everyone went to bed.

June 27th - I woke up before dawn this morning. I watched the sun rise. I thought of getting my camera because it was such a beautiful sunrise, but everyone was asleep and I would have to disturb someone. The sun rose between two mountains and the reflection across the ocean was beautiful with the orange sky and dark color of the water and mountains. Tony was up, so I got up and we started breakfast, of course-coffee and fried bacon and scrambled eggs. Simon checked in with Augustine, the boat was made ship shape and we were ready to get underway. The plan is ready to fish at Pumis Reef and then to the Golden Reef and to Puertecitos to gas up and on to San Felipe to spend the night. We trolled around Pumis Rock, the ocean is calm, no breeze, but its a bit hazy today. No bites on the Golden Reef and a shrimp boat is anchored on the reef, so we trolled for yellow tail but no hook ups. We go to Puertecitos, anchor and call to see about gas - no gas - so we bought 5 gallons of fuel from a



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a friend of Simons. We have 50 gallons of fuel and 20 gals. aboard. It is about 1:20 P.M. and we leave Puertecito's for San Felipe. The wind has picked up and it will be a bumpy ride. About halfway to San Felipe the wind seems to calm. It is 4:00P.M. and we are in San Felipe Harbor getting ready to anchor by the dock. A rubber raft is used to get to shore. Valena and I decided to put our bags in the raft and swim ashore - everyone else paddled the raft to shore. A taxi picked us up and took us to the Hotel La Riveria. Where we stayed before. Simon and his brothers get gas for the boat and get it filled. Tony and Mike stayed with the boat. We cleaned up and the kids went swimming. I'm catching up on the log for the last day. We go to the El Nido to have dinner. I ate another good steak and the kids had shrimp, the guys ate steak and then back to the Hotel and to bed. The plans are to meet Martine at the 22 mile reef around 9:00A.M. tomorrow.

June 27th - After a good nights rest we are up early in the morning and get to the boat before 7:00A.M. Everyone and our belongings are aboard and we are underway a little after 7:00A.M. Heading out of San Felipe Harbor straight for Consag Rock after about an hour and 20 miles. Later we are trolling around Consag Rock. Mike catches a needle fish-while we're trying to catch bait to fish with at the 22 mile reef. Mike catches a Sierra macherel and it was a nice sized one. About an hour and a half later we decided to head on across taking a 60 degree heading. It should take us about an hour to get from Consag Rock to the 22 mile reef. Simon and I are on the bridge looking for landmarks. We see the Peak of the Pinacate Mountains first, because it is hazy, the land marks aren't good. We see the Sierra Blancas, the range of mountains between the Pinacates and Penasco. I thought at first this range of mountains was Penasco until we were about 35 miles from Cholla and then Penasco could be seen to the right of the Sierra Blancas. I kept looking for the double dunes, but couldn't see them. Simon saw two little dots ahead and to the port side, called Martine on the radio and he said he could see us too, so we head towards the boats. Martine, Hector, Danny and Crystal are fishing on the 22.mile reef. We anchor and join them. Valena drops her line in the water and with in a few minutes she pulls in a nice Sardinero. Valena baits her hook and puts her line back in the water, and again she brings in another Sardinero Shortly after that Brian brings in a Sardinero. In a few hours we all decide to pull anchor and go to the 16 mile reef. We stayed at the reef a short time then because we were all tired and

and we headed for Cholla. After a few problems with the motor dying while trying to get the Sandmans Dream on its trailer, we were again back home. The tired Skipper and Crew are out of the water and off the boat in front of J.J's Cantina, up the stairs for some cold refreshment and to see if we still have land legs. In spite of all the problems, I would go again. It was an interesting and beautiful trip. Super great people aboard, we had alot of fun. Thank you so much Tony and Mike for an enjoyable trip and for letting my daughter and me be a part of a great crew.

Another trip is planned soon, trying to get to the Sandmans Dream original destination, the Bay of De Los Angeles. Maybe this time, the Sandman's Dream will come true and complete the full trip.

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

COOK 5

TACO SALAD

1 lb ground beef

1 envelope (1 1/4-oz) taco seasoning mix

3/4 cup water

1 med head lettuce, torn in bite-size pieces (4 cups)

1/2 cup sliced black olives

1 cup (4 oz) shredded sharp cheddar cheese

1 large tomato, cut in wedges

1 small onion, thinly sliced and separated in rings

Avacado slices

Coarsely crushed taco or tostada shells

Taco sauce

Brown ground beef. Drain fat. Stir in seasoning mix and water. Heat to boiling; reduce heat and simmer uncovered, 15 to 20 minutes, stirring occasionally.

In a salad bowl combine lettuce, olives and cheese; toss well. Top with meat mixture, tomato, onion, avocado slices and broken taco or tostada shells. Serve with taco sauce. Serves 4 - 6.

GREEN CHILI

3 lbs pork roast cut in 1/2-inch cubes. Cover with water and simmer 1 hour.

Add: 1 large can Mountain Pass taco sauce or Ortega green chili salsa

2 4-oz. cans chopped green chili

Simmer 4 or 5 hours. Season to taste with salt. Thicken with flour. Roll into burritos with flour tortillas using a generous amount of grated cheddar cheese and two or three tablespoons of refried beans.

MOCK RELLENOS

3 cups grated zucchini squash

2 small cans chopped green chili

3 eggs

1 cup grated cheese

3 heaping Tbsp flour

salt to taste

Fry slowly so squash cooks like pancakes in a small amount of oil.

CHIMICHANGAS

2 - 3 lbs roast beef, cooked and shredded 1 small can diced green chili sait, pepper, garlic, oregano to taste 1 can beef gravy

grated cheese, optional

1 doz flour tortillas

Combine beef, chili, seasonings and gravy and heat in a skillet. Warm tortillas in oven about 5 minutes. Heat 1/2" deep oil to 4000 in large skillet or electric fry fan. Spread 2 or 3 spoonfuls of meat mixture over lower 1/3 of each tortilla (sprinkle on a little grated cheese if you wish). Fold bottom edges of each tortilla up over filling. Fold both sides towards center and roll (from the bottom edge)into a cylinder. Secure with a tooth pick. Fry two at a time in the hot oil about 2 minutes until golden and crisp. Drain on paper towels. Serve hot over a layer of shredded lettuce. Top with green chile salsa, tomatoes, guacomole, and sour cream. Garnish with olives.

REFRIED BEAN ENCHILADA CASSEROLE

Brown 1 1/2 lb hamaburger and chopped onion

Drain and add: 1 can (15 1/2-oz) refried beans)

1/2 tsp salt 1/4 tsp pepper

Soften tortillas in grease. Layer tortillas, meat mixture and enchilada sauce, ending with sauce. Bake at 350° 30 min.

Enchilada sauce: Melt:

4 T butter

Stir in: 1/4 cup flour

1/2 tsp salt

1/4 tsp pepper 2 cups milk Add:

1 10-oz can enchilada

sauce

Cook and stir till boiling. Boil 1 minute.

Stir in:

1 1/4 cup cheese

4 drops bottled hot pepper sauce

EASY CHICKEN ENCHILADAS

2 7-oz cans chicken or

1 fryer, cooked

1 can cream of chicken soup 1 can cream of mushroom soup

1 can milk

1 can chili without beans

1 4-oz can diced green

chilies

1 pkg flour tortillas

grated cheese sliced olives

Mix together in saucepan, soups, milk, chili without beans, and green chilis. Heat. In 9 x 13 dish, layer torn up tortillas (bite size) chicken and soup mixture. Then top with grated cheese and olives. Bake at 350° for 30 minutes.

ENCHILADAS

Heat together: 2 cans cream of chicken soup

1/2 cup sour cream

2 small cans diced green chili

1/2 tsp salt

Soften 12 corn tortillas in hot oil.

Dip into chicken sauce. Put in filling and roll.

2 cups cheese

1/2 cup onions

Cover with remaining sauce. Bake at 350° for 30 minutes.

TAMALE PIE

1 cup chopped onion

1 tsp salt

1 cup chopped green pepper

2-3 tsp chili powder

3/4 lb ground beef 2 8-oz cans tomato sauce dash pepper 1 1/2 cups grated cheese

1 12-oz can whole kernal corn

Cook onion and green pepper in a little hot fat till just tender. Add meat; brown lightly. Add rest of stuff except cheese. Simmer 20-25 minutes until thick. Add cheese; stir till melted. Make corn meal topper:

3/4 cup yellow corn meal

1/2 tsp salt

2 cups cold water

1 T butter or margarine

Stir corn meal and salt into cold water. Cook and stir till thick. Add butter; mix well. Stir into hot meat mixture. Bake at 375° 40 minutes.


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
