As the originator of the Cholla Bay Sportsmen's Club it is with pleasure I write of the clubs intentions, and activities of the past sixteen years.

The general purpose of the club is to aid and as sist in the improvement of conditions at Cholla Bay, and to provide and participate in research, studies, and plans with respect to the public use of Cholla Bay, and to aid and assist, and cooperate with individuals, business industries, and State of Sonora, and it's political subdivisions, the federal government of Mexico, and it's agencies in fulfilling the need of better public relations between our club members and citizens of Mexico. One of the purposes of our club is to donate and provide funds and equipment to assist in advancing, and furthering sanitary conditions, help with the roadway, have a ship to shore radio, have a search and rescue team with boats and planes. The Cholla Bay's Club has in the past sixteen years fulfilled all of their intentions. In the past the club has furnished hundreds of polio shots for the children of Puerto Penasco, and Cholla Bay. The club has furnished the families of Rocky Point and Cholla Bay with many tons of food and clothing. This past year we gave hundreds of pairs of shoes for the children, and have more ready for delivery. This past year thirty bunk beds, and mattresses have been given to the orphans at Sonoita, Sonora, Mexico. We have also given 150 cases of refried beans to the orphans at Sonoita. In the year of 1959 when a terrible flood struck the interior of Mexico the Cholla Bay Sportsmen's Club had many collection stations for food, clothing, blankets, shoes and money for the relief for the people of the community where the disaster occurred. The club took three large truck loads of these materials to the border of Sonoita. The Mexican officials would not let us cross so the supplies were left at the border

The year of 1962 when I was president of the club we gave over a ton of beans and flour, also other supplies to the people of Rocky Point. The wives of the Lions Club passed out the food to the needy. In the year of 1962 the club also refurnished and rebuilt a Cadillac Ambulance, and turned it over to the Lions Club at Rocky Point. This was a gift from the members of Cholla Bay Sportsmen's Club. The Cholla Bay Sportsmen's Club has furnished three school buses for the children at Rocky Point over the past several years, also have a Christmas Party each year for all the children of the Cholla Bay area. In the past sixteen years we have fed hundreds of families at our annual fishing derby. We have also furnished thousands of dollars worth of medicine for the people where it was needed. and have plans to do much more. On July 21st, 1972 the Cholla Bay Sportsmen's Club took 125 cases of refried beans, 20 bunk beds, and 125 desks to Sonoita and Rocky Point. This is all donated by the Cholla Bay Sportsmen Club. The orphans home at Sonoita has several sponsors, but they could use many more. Any item the home could use would be appreciated by all the kids at the home. Since 1962 the Cholla Sportsmen's club has owned a ship to share man's club has owned a ship to share many to share many to share the share man to share the share man to share the men's club has owned a ship to shore marine radio, also a citizen band radio is installed at Cholla with an also a citizen band radio is installed at Cliona with an operator on duty whenever a boat is out that is equipped with a radio in the boat. The club has contact with the U. S. Coast Guard at the coast for a fast rescue anytime it is needed. We have a well organized search and rescue boat squad for immediate action at anytime. The club has airplanes that are available in the air with-in an hour after notification of the need for a search. Lives have been saved by the Cholla Bay Sportsmen's Club search and rescue team. I personally have rescued eleven people from almost certain drowning. Since our search and rescue team has been in action no lives have been lost. We are proud of the good we have accomplished in Mexico, and proud of the wonderful Mexican people who have made our stay in Mexico enjoyable



of Sonora. The Cholla Bay Sportsmen's Club grate-

fully acknowledges the unusual privilege of being al-lowed to maintain the "Ship to Shore" radio station at Bahia "La Choya". The license indicates the station

is for safety communications with tourists boats, club

member's boats and charter boats owned by citizens of Mexico. A "watch" or listening schedule is maintain-

ed only when the launching permits indicate a boat equipped with radio is checked out and no checking

out over the radio is permitted. The watch is on 2182KHz, the international calling and distress frequency. A second frequency, and the only other one, 2555KHz is for all messages after contact is made on 2182KHz.

The 2555KHz frequency is extremely important to all users of the station, in that is a "clear channell" assigned exclusively to Cholla Bay Radio. The proper and best method of contacting the station, is to call on 2182KHz. Normally there will be at least a thirty

second delay before the operator can answer due to the "warm up" time needed for the transmit section of the Club's radio. When calling, the station's name should be first and the name of the boat second. The words "Cholla Bay Radio" repeated at least two

times followed by the boat's name and two calls spaced about fifteen se conds apart will be more understandable. The least number of words, that will get the facts to the operator, spoken slowly and clearly will save time and eliminate misunderstandings. It should be clear to everyone that the station is for emergency commun-

ications and the use of the radio and operator for any other reasons, should be held to the very minimum.

the request for launching machines and other services should not be made to the Club's radio station. The

"range" of the radio station, is over 100 nautical miles and boats cruising to the Baja side of the Gulf of California or down the coast, can communicate on a

scheduled basis, (twice that distance on 2555KHz) the conditions of the crew and the position of the

boat. Power for the radio, lights, beacon and beach control public address system is drawn from a twelve

volt battery bank. Battery charging is done with a 500 watt. direct current generator, fueled with butane.

The station's radio and power system is maintained by a licensed radio technician and the Club has made a considerable investment of money in the equip-

ment and the building to house the facility

Unless some danger to life property is involved,

October 9 Friday Desert walk. Emphasis on desert ecosystems, insects, 7:00-10:00 a.m. reptiles and mammals.



I f you could choose just one fishing lure to use in salt water, which one would best serve as an all-purpose fish attractor?

It would have to be a lure which could catch fish literally from top to bottom — attracting both slow moving bottom feeders and quick darting topside species. It would also be a lure which, ideally, could be jigged, trolled, cast or fished in combination with natural bait.

Admittedly, that's a lot of requirements for a single type of lure to match. No single lure choice for a variety of fishing will prove as effective as having a broad selection of lures. But if a fisherman were limited to just one lure, which one would be his all-around "ideal" choice?

My pick would be the simple yet highly effective leadhead jig.

It's a lure design that dates back at least into the last century, when someone first wrapped natural feathers around a crude, weighted lure head and fooled a fish into thinking it was pouncing on a free meal.

Today, leadhead jigs — sometimes called bucktail jigs on the Gulf and East coasts — come in a variety of shapes and sizes. Some of them sport skirts of natural feathers from vinyl or soft plastic bodies, all of which partially hide a large, single hook.

One of the most popular and fish enticing of the various leadhead jigs available on the market today is really the result of its adaptation to saltwater use from freshwater fishing.

Originally designed and marketed to catch freshwater bass, so-called "soft plastic" lures such as the Sassy Shad and Mr. Twister not only proved to be virtual overnight marketing successes, but eventually were tried by ocean anglers, too — and with excellent results.

Here on the West Coast, several local manufacturers have emerged to help supply the demand for leadhead jigs or soft plastic bodied lures, their products colorfully named Scrounger, Shabby Shrimp, Scampi, Kelp Kritter and Mojo.

Basically, these lures consist of a molded lead head and front shoulder into which a large single hook is attached during the lead pouring process. The lure also has a molded shoulder section around which the soft plastic body is attached.

Manufacturers use a soft plastic material for at least two reasons: It is extremely flexible, helping produce a lifelike lure action; and its texture feels like something natural to eat when a fish strikes the lure. The fish is likely to hold on to it a second or two longer, before the angler sets the hook.

These soft plastic jigs come in a broad selection of sizes and colors to match various fishing conditions and different species.

Generally, ocean anglers use the onehalf to two ounce sizes for a variety of species ranging from surface swimming bonito to bottom hugging bass. One lure maker, in fact, advertised that its product had caught more than 60 different species of saltwater fish — and the number was still growing. The jig is so versatile that it can be used off Baja California to catch dorado, or off Washington to hook ling cod.

Some of the lure's most popular colors have proved to be "root beer," silver flake, fluorescent red, hot orange, squid and "motor oil," although companies generally offer up to two dozen choices. Often, darker colors work best in the early morning or on overcast days, while the brighter, more colorful colors are most attractive on clear, sunny days. Some manufacturers offer two plastic body styles, a single tail style trailing back from the plastic lure body, or a split or twin tail aft section designed for the lure.

While each tail type seems to have its "hot" fishing days, I've found that the slower sinking twin tail, with its greater wiggling action, generally works better for calico, sand or spotted bay bass, plus a variety of shallow water rockfish, while the single tail is a good bet for surface swimming bonito, barracuda and yellowtail.

It's the design and shape of their super soft and supple tails which give the lures their basic, swimming action. In addition, anglers can impart action to the lures by a combination of rod tip movements and retrieve speeds. One lure maker, Scrounger, boasts of a built-in, fish enticing action produced by the lure's patented, oscillating collar. The collar's no gimmick, I'll add: I've used Scroungers and they do a little "dance" that's highly attractive to fish.

The easiest way to use these lures is with a steady retrieve. At other times, however, a pull-and-flutter retrieve may prove more attractive to the fish.

Another retrieve method for these popular jigs is the one from which their name is drawn — vertical jigging. Vertical jigging is especially effective when rock fishing for the various bottom dwellers found in deep water.

Soft plastic leadhead jigs can also be used in combination with natural, dead baits; most often, a piece or strip of squid is pinned on the lure's hook and used as an added enticement to a fish's sense of smell. If necessary, however, the plastic body can be removed from the weighted, lead head jig, and the head and molded hook alone can be used with larger pieces or chunks of squid, mackerel, herring or whole anchovies, when bottom fishing for rockfish.


