SICK BAY Phoenix Chapter


Walt Kirkwood has been ill, but his family says he is doing much better. We wish you a speedy and full recovery, Walt.

But Cholla cast it's spell on Don and Verlene, and like the rest of us, he put up four walls and a roof, and they settled into the way of life Cholla Bay offered.

Don was interested in every thing that went on at the Bay, and was ready to jump in where ever he could help. There wasn't much he couldn't do with a boat, and he would go out in just about any weather to help get a boat in.


OPEN LETTER TO THE CHOLLA BAY FISHERMEN

This article won't apply to all you old salts, who know everything there is to know about the Sea of Cortez, but is addressed to our weekend sport fishermen.

Sportfishing is no longer the 10 kilos of bait, launch your boat and come back with a boat load of fish. It has become a specialized sport of lures, down riggers, outriggers, depthfinders, lorans, rapids and exact knowledge of water temperatures, feeding habits and "Hot" areas.

Our fishermen take their time (usually 3 days), and their money (gasoline, bait, motels, and booze) to spend the trip in frustration. We have a number of men here in the bay whose livelihood is dependent on a successful fishing trip for you. Hiring a professional fishing guide is not an admittance of weakness or lack of knowledge on your part, it is a method of updating your knowledge on fishing techniques and the current areas of good fishing. the extra expense (average \$40 per day) is negligent compared to the overall cost of the trip and in most cases will make the difference between a successful trip and several days of boat rides.

Over the next several months, we will try to introduce you to some of these men and their backgrounds, through a series of articles on the local fishing guides. We sincerly hope that the information will be of some use to you and may even lure some of our discouraged fishermen back to the bay.





Helpers will meet in front of the OBSC Building at 10:00 A.M., Saturday, February 18th.





At about 5:30p.m. we had just finished stuffing ourselves with turkey -when Augustine announced over the C.B. that all boats from Cholla Bay were in. Which was a relief because the winds were picking up and it was getting cold.

Just at sunset on VHF a call came in from a boat named Whiskey Dog. They were dead in the water, as they had run out of gasin their main tank and were unable to change to their auxilary tank because of a faulty switch. their location was 300r 4 miles north of Bird Island.

Search and Rescue organized three boats and crews: Hustler, Seabreeze and Sunworshipper to assist Whiskey Dog. Their plan was to take them fuel. Sunworshipper was last to launch so Clive had som distance to travel to catch Hustler and Seabreeze. He had following seas.

All three rescue boats met at the first estuary and proceed together to find Whiskey Dog. They had to shoot off several flares to find Whiskey Dog. I only heard Augustine's transmission, my handheld VHF was unable to pick up the boats.

When the rescuers finally located the Whiskey Dog they transferred 5 gallon fuel tanks by floating them to Whiskey Dog tied to a rope. this was necessary because of the rough seas. Whiskey Dog then started his engine and headed to his port in the 1st estuary (Espinozas!)

All during the rescue operations Brown Bug (Louie Bock), Ellen Coughlin Sue Kudus and Belle Taylor were in the radio shack shack standing vigil. Von Frazier and I were doing the same in our cabins. I retured to the radio shack shortly before our rescue team returned.

We are all greatful for the caring and efficiency of Augustine Leon in these Imergency situations.

Augustine has an excellent sence of humor, when we were all in the radio shack worring about our men out at sea in the windy conditions--Augustine amused us with antecdotes of family life in Mexico.

Our men had a bouncy trip against the seas on their return. They said the biggest seas were from Rocky Point past Sandy Beach, especially rough at Pinto Point and Pelican Point.

The winds were from the north so it was difficult getting on the launcher. Thank you Tico! When all the boats were on their trailers it was a relief for all.

We hooked up to the Blazer and trailered our Sunwhorshipper back to #403 and hit the sack at 3:30a.m.!

It's good to know this was a well planned and successful operation - Thank you all! Noel 16

Desire for English inspired saltwater

Saltwater fisherman Hector Munro remembers Rocky Point 40 years ago.
"It was a fishing area, not a tourist area."

ector Munro is a tall, distinguished-looking man of 53. He is quick with a smile and friendly.

He also is probably the best saltwater fishing guide in northern Mexico, specifically the northern Gulf of California.

I say this not from my experiences, which are limited. But Arizona veteran outdoor writers such as Bill Valentine and Bob Thomas sung his praises. Valentine, also a saltwater expert, was quick to cite Munro's expertise.

A talk with Munro is fascinating. His English is good, and he is sharing his experiences with those visiting the Arizona National Boat Show at Civic Center, which runs through Sunday. He is working in the Randall Marine booth.

Munro spent his early years around Kino Bay, but moved to the Puerto Penasco, or Rocky Point, area when he was 13

"My father was a fisherman all his life," Munro said. "He had a commercial boat. Really, we were nomads on the Sea of Cortez (Gulf of California). There were no roads, so we moved by boat as the fish moved.

"There were no roads, so there weren't many Americans. It was a fishing area, not a tourist area."

That was in the late 1940s and early '50s. Munro followed his father in commercial fishing. There were shrimp, white sea bass, sea trout and sharks.

"We sold the fins to the Chinese," he said of the sharks. "I don't know what they did with them. But we sold the livers to a company in California that made vitamins out of them."

The money was good, but Munro wasn't happy.

"There was no future," he said. "It was hard work and kind of boring — especially shrimping. You had to run the nets every two hours day after day."

About 1960, when more tourists hungry for a saltwater experience began visiting Rocky Point, specifically Cholla Bay, Munro became a guide.

"The main thing that made me decide to go to sport fishing was that I wanted to learn English," Munro said. "We only got seven years of school, and no English was taught then. I wanted to learn.

"I also wanted to be helpful. The Americans didn't speak Spanish, and few of us spoke English. They were lost. It was difficult for them to find help. I wanted to do it.

"Guiding didn't pay as well as commercial fishing, but it was exciting."

Munro lives in the Cholla Bay area, which is comprised mostly of American citizens. Currently, he has no boat of his own, but guides for other captains.

For instance, a boat with captain rents for about \$60 a person for each weekend day. On weekdays, it's \$40 per person. For another \$50 a day, you can add Munro, which can be a wise investment for those wanting to catch big fish.

Munro said the fishing year is broken up into two segments. One runs from November through April. Fewer fish are caught then, but there's a chance for a big one.

During that period, anglers catch two species of white sea bass (the California and the totoaba, a much larger fish that lives only in Sea of Cortez) and the huge black sea bass (up to 400 pounds).

In the spring, summer and fall, there are three or four kinds of grouper, sailfish, dolphin (the fish), red snapper, skip jack and others.

"There is fishing all year," Munro said.
"There aren't as many fish in the winter, but they're bigger."

Although the Sea of Cortez is one of the most fertile fisheries in the world, Munro has seen a general decline. He attributes that to Japanese fleets that use nets miles long to catch everything.

"The United States in a friendly way needs to encourage Mexico to protect its fishing," Munro said. "The head of our

fisheries is a political job. The person doesn't always know a lot about fish."


But he made it clear that he is not taking a confrontational position. He would like to see compromise and a reasonable solution.

He said two species, groupers and pintos, actually are growing in numbers.

"That's mainly because our commercial fishermen all have turned to shrimp," Munro said. "Fishing for those two is very good. And even if fishing overall isn't as good as it once was, it still is very good."

He got me excited. I might have to forget about largemouth bass, crappie and striped bass for a time.




