Fishing Derby Update


The 1997, 42nd annual CBSC Fishing Derby dates have been set. This year the derby will be bunched closer together starting in late March and ending in early May, hopefully before the hot weather sets in.

The dates for this year's derby are as follows; Friday March 28th to Sunday March 30th, Friday April 11th to Sunday April 13th, Friday April 25th to Sunday April 27th. Friday May 9th will be the last fishing day of the derby. The fish fry and awards ceremony will take place on Saturday, May 10th.

This year a fly-fishing category has been added, if you have never tried saltwater fly-fishing this might be a good time to give it a whirl. This might also be a good chance to pick up extra points for the derby in a new category.

Ed Mueller has volunteered to be this years Derby Chairman and John Perrotta has volunteered to head up the kitchen crew at the Fish Fry. John will also be this years announcer at the Awards Ceremonie. As always, lots of volunteers are needed to help put on the clubs biggest fund raiser of the year. HOW DEEP IS THE OCEAN?

The average depth of the world's oceans is about 10,000 feet. The deepest region of the ocean, called the hadal zone, lies anywhere below 18,000 feet. However, the very deepest spots in the ocean floor - trenches such as the Marianas Trench in the Pacific - reach 30,000 feet, more than 5 miles deep.

More than 1,000 species of bottom fish are known from deep-sea bottom trawls. However, few deep-sea bottom fishes have ever been seen alive.

In 1960, when Jacques Piccard and Donald Walsh made the first dive to the bottom of the Marianas Trench in the submersible *Trieste*, they saw the world's deepest living fish, a foot long flatfish, swimming in the mud along the 35,800 foot bottom, the very deepest part of the ocean.

Imagine how your arm would feel after a day of bottom fishing at the Marianas Trench? I don't know about you but, I'm a little sore after a long day of fishing the 200 foot reefs out of Cholla.





JUST FOR THE HALIBUT

This is the time of the year that the halibut and flounder start showing up around the Rocky Point area. These fish can get up to around 40lbs. and can be caught in depths anywhere from 5 to 200 feet of water. There are different ways to fish these fish, and here are a couple of methods that might be productive.

If you are fishing from shore, try casting a 3/4 to 1oz. shinny spoon or the same size scampi and drag it along the bottom. A good place to try fishing from shore is to find a spot where a sandy bottom meets a rocky shore. There are lots of spots like this around, try scopeing out potential spots during the low tides.

If you have a boat, there are obviously a lot more places to try and a few more options on how to fish for halibut. Halibut tend to hunt food around the sides of the reefs where the sand and reef come together. Although halibut can be caught over any sandy bottom, the edge of some type of structure seems to be best. There are many methods for catching halibut, here are a couple of suggestions. Drift or anchor with anchovies or small mackerel on a basic live bait rig, consisting of a three-way swivel with a short dropper line tied to one eye with a weight on the other end and a four-foot leader with a 2/0 live bait hook tied to the other eye. Live bait can easily be caught by using a Yozuri bait rig. Soft plastic lures, such as scampi's on lead jigheads also work well when cast and retrieved, or drifted along the bottom. Like with any fish, a sharp hook is a must when fishing for halibut. When a halibut hits, set the hook and work the fish in with smooth, even lifts of the rod. When you get it near the surface, don't pull it's head out of the water or it'll go wild. Instead, ease it within range of your gaff or net and make your move. And when you get your catch home, get ready for some of the best eating fish the sea has to offer. Just remember you don't have to head all the way to the 18 or the dunes to catch good size halibut.



Steamed Halibut

1/2 pound carrots, peeled & julienned
1/4 pound snow peas, cut into 1/4 inch strips
8 scallions, halved, then cut into slices
lengthwise
1 1/2 pounds halibut steaks

1 1/2 pounds halibut steaks salt and pepper to taste 6 Tbs. butter, melted 2 tsp. fresh thyme, or 1 tsp. dry lemon wedges

Bring some water to a boil in a pan or steamer with a rack and lid. Layer the carrots, snow peas and scallions evenly on the rack. Place the halibut steaks in a single layer on top of the vegetables. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover and steam for about 5-7 minutes, or until fish is opaque and flakes easily with a fork. While the fish is cooking, mix the butter and thyme together and set aside. When done, transfer the vegetables and fish to a warmed platter or serving dishes and pour the butter-thyme mixture over. Garnish with the lemon wedges.

Phone Use Tips


Here is a couple tips for calling into or out of Puerto Peñasco.
