First of all what is a Leather Fish? There is a category for this fish in the fishing derby, but I can't seem to find any pictures or any descriptions of this fish. If anyone has any pictures, descriptions or possibly another name for this fish, please send it to the chatter.

Another question I have is what is the difference between shrimp and prawns? Is it the temperature of the water that they are caught in? Or maybe just what people call

them in certain regions of the country?

And one last question that I can't find an answer for is... Why can I not find a tide clock for the Pacific side of the US but, they are available for the Atlantic? I have searched all kinds of catalogs and made numerous phone calls and no one has an answer. I have also called the Howard Miller clock company that makes a tide clock for the Atlantic and they couldn't tell me why they don't make one for the west coast.

The tides gain approximately 1 hour every day, this is true in San Francisco as in Cholla. Of course the height of the tide is different in different areas but, the duration is approximately the same. And I believe this is true on the east coast. If this is true then why don't they make a tide clock for the west coast, or would a tide clock for the Atlantic work here?

Anyway, browsing over last years derby results brought up an interesting idea. Take one day of the derby to search for each and every one of the species of bass. Maybe that way you could snag the All Around Fisherman Award. With three girls in the boat, I'm sure we'll spend most of our time in the junior division. But maybe, I'll get just one day for Moby.

With the derby right around the corner, now would be a good time to make sure all the equipment is in top shape. Test the reels (drag & line), the poles and most especially the boat. Might ought give the boat a new water pump or two. Give her a good old fashioned tune up too, you'll be glad you did about 20 miles out. I just completed mine, new water pump in the outdrive, serviced the bottom end with new oil and serviced the trim motor with new oil. It took only one day and it will be good all year.

Now just a few statistics to prim you for the derby. Did you know... the largest known white sea bass was caught off San Felipe in 1953, weighing in at 84 lbs. Largest Halibut (Atlantic) was caught 50 miles off Thatcher Island in 1917, weighing in at 625 lbs. In California, biologist examined a 435 lb. Black Sea Bass and determined that it was between 72 and 75 years old. Blacks grow to be over 7 feet in length and 600 lbs. in size. Is that enough to get you ready for the derby?


So you think you're a good fisherman?

They average 3-10 lbs., but can grow to 30 lbs. Pargo are a good fighting fish that takes chunk baits fished on the bottom and are very good eating.

Talk at the meeting centered around the hopefully, soon to arrive electricity in Cholla and the new poles the phone company is putting up. The ole fishing village seems to be


becoming quite the suburb!



Arizonans spend 3 days lost at sea

ROCKY POINT, Sonora, Mexico... Lost at sea.

This age old saga of missing sailors was relived last weekend when three Arizonans were lost in Wind-roughened waters off this Mexican fishing village.

For three days, while a massive air, land and water search was mounted for them, they bobbed helplessly on huge ocean swells and had little food and no water.

When found Sunday, they were within sight of the rocky headlands of Cholla Bay.

The trio, boat skipper Jim Wade of Tucson and Norman Mayfield and his wife, Dorothy, of Apache Junction, had just two beers, two apples and "part of a pear" during the three days at sea.

"We took tiny sips out of one beer, and when you guys took us in tow, I popped the second can in celebration and toasted you." Wade told rescuers.

The three, in their late 50's and early 60's, were cold, weary and hungry but otherwise unharmed.

I participated in the search at the invitation of the Cholla Bay Sportsmen's Club and was on the boat that rescued the threesome.

Lou Bock, director of search and rescue for the Sportsmen's Club, said hope for the survival of the missing boaters was waning when they were spotted from a plane piloted by Ralph Smith, a Kansas City businessman who has a home in Cholla Bay.

The drama began on Friday when Wade and his two passengers... casual friends he had met at a Rocky Point trailer park... decided to go fishing.

Wade, a veteran angler who keeps his 24-foot boat at Cholla Bay, filled out the required trip information at the Cholla Bay radio shack.

He listed his fuel at 25 gallons... an error in calculation, he later admitted.

He said he also failed to check his radio, and it was not until he was at sea that he discovered a loose wire that prevented him from calling Augustin Leon, Cholla Bay Sportsmen's Club radio shack operator.

And he did not have a supply of drinking water, extra food or flares to signal for help. The batteries on the boat ran down, and he was unable to operate the boat's running lights at night.

"I'm sorry, fellas," he told searchers upon returning to land. "I won't ever go out again unless I have full tanks and I know everything is working."

Wade was last seen 18 miles out when he told a fishing buddy in another boat that he was returning to Cholla Bay. The friend said he would fish for awhile and then follow.

But Wade's boat ran out of gas. His friend did not see him and assumed he had made it to port.

When Wade failed to show up by dark, Leon notified Bock, and a search was launched.

"I went out in my boat to look for them, but I couldn't see any lights out there," said Bock, a Tucson builder. "It's very dangerous to be running out there at night because the Mexican shrimp boats are spreading their nets, and they can't always see a small boat, especially if it has no lights."

Wade said he managed to reach shore Friday night, but the water was too shallow to land, and the beach was deserted.

Wade anchored in about 25 feet of water, some distance from dry land, a necessity because the widely fluctuating tides of the upper gulf can expose miles of mud flats, grounding unwary vessels.

At daybreak Saturday, the winds started kicking up, and soon Wade discovered that his boat was dragging its anchor.

"We must have dragged anchor for more than a mile before I lifted it up," he said. "I told the Mayfields it was better to drift anyhow because the wind would take us to the shipping lanes, where we'd have a better chance at being seen by a boat."

At daylight Saturday, Bock, Hector Monro and I went out in Bock's boat, but rising swells made it difficult to see, and we returned to Cholla.

Bock then contacted Smith, who keeps a twin engine plane at the Rocky Point airport, and asked him to go up and look for the missing boat.

Smith, who was on search and rescue missions while in the service, flew a pattern in the area where the boat last was seen.

That afternoon a land search using four-wheel-drive vehicles and dune buggies was mounted. We patrolled the beaches as far as 50 miles north of Cholla without sighting anything.

Smith, using his last reserves of fuel (there are no refueling facilities for planes at Rocky Point, and pilots must keep enough gas in their craft in order to fly out to a bigger airport), flew a search pattern around Bird island, south of Rocky Point.

That evening, Cholla Bay Sportsmen's Club member Bill Funkhouser called a friend, Jim Pierce, who operates a crop dusting business in Buckeye, and asked him to truck down an emergency supply of aviation gas.

Pierce put 180 gallons of gas into drums, put them in his pickup and raced for the border.

Meanwhile, the club using its new \$8,000 VHF radio net, had contacted boats throughout the upper gulf and asked them to be on the lookout for the missing boat.

Bock was a picture of frustration. "I don't know what else we can do," he said, pounding on a map of the upper part of the Gulf of California with his fist.

"We've pretty well covered where they should be, and there must be 50 boats out there in the rest of the gulf looking for them.

"Oh, I hate not being able to do something. I just hate to lose. But what else can we do? What else?"

Sunday morning, Smith flew a mission again and searched north to El Golfo. He reported seeing nothing. Then, while returning to Cholla to gas up and fly a search pattern far out in the gulf, Smith saw the missing boat about 10 to 12 miles off Cholla in an area that had been searched the previous day.

"When we flew down low over it and saw that everyone was OK and waving at us, everyone in the plane let out a big cheer."

Smith returned to the field to refuel and then again went aloft to guide the rescue boats to the missing sailors.

A Guest's Guide to Boating Etiquette

As a guest aboard a friend's boat, here's a helpful list of do's and don'ts to make the experience a good one for everyone involved.

1. Buy the fuel: Whether they run on gas or diesel, boats burn a lot of fuel. A guest should ask the captain how many greenbacks went through the mill for this outing, then offer to pay the fuel bill.

Whenever you go out on a friend's boat pay offer to pay 100% of the fuel or split the cost with the other quests. The boat owner is already covering the cost of wear and tear, storage, monthly payments, marine insurance and a long list of other fees. Buying fuel is little enough to ask of a guest who has come along for the ride.

2. Bring lunch: The skipper gets to the boat early, sets things up and runs the boat. The least a guest

can do is offer to feed him or her.

3. Help the skipper by doing what is asked: Guest generally want to help, but they improvise too

much. Stand by and let the skipper give instructions.

4. Stay out of the skipper's face: A boat is a small space. The person running it often has a lot on his or her mind, such as weather, waves and where the fish are. Give the skipper some space and don't subject him to a constant barrage of questions. Let the answers unfold over the length of the cruise and let the skipper concentrate.

5. Don't touch that dial: Electronics are the captain's turf. Don't fiddle with the dials, punch buttons or try to make things beep. If guest want to learn about them, they should ask, not fiddle. Even better,

why not read a manual while running out to the fishing grounds?

6. Remember that docking is serious business: Whenever a boat is being docked or being loaded onto a trailer most guest tend to start gathering their personal belongings. This proves distracting, and it starts the weight shifting all over and makes docking or loading difficult, at best. As a guest, either man your designated position while docking or loading or sit still.

7. Keep in mind that cleanup is also serious business: Salt destroys metal, and a good skipper wants to keep a clean boat. Washing the boat is not on par with washing the car, it's preventative maintenance. Guest should offer to help at the end of the day and realize that the chores must be

done quickly and efficiently.

8. Help out with the "invisible" work: Waxing in the spring, winterizing in the fall, bottom painting and countless other jobs that keep a boat fit. Whenever you go fishing or cruising often with someone, offer to help with the invisible work that may become necessary later on.

9. Please reciprocate: When the skipper shares his expertise at the helm with a guest, a guest should

share his or her expertise in another area with the skipper.





TECH TALK

What is a Differential GPS

By now most of us have heard of or know how a GPS works. If not, here is a quick explanation. A GPS receiver receives a signal from a high-altitude satellite. By measuring the timing of the signals sent by the satellites, and by knowing the orbital parameters of the satellites, a GPS receiver can determine your location to an accuracy within 100 meters and your altitude within approximately 160 meters.

A Differential GPS increases the accuracy of a GPS receiver from roughly 50-100 meters to as little as 1-10 meters, and improves speed accuracy to 0.1 knot, regardless of S/A (Selective Availability). To achieve this accuracy you must usually connect a separate Differential Beacon Receiver (DBR) to the GPS, though some of the new units now have DBR built-in. This receiver decodes low frequency signals in the 300 kHz range sent from Coast Guard and Army Corps of Engineers beacon transmitters, then applies corrections for known errors in the satellite signals to the GPS readings.

Actual GPS position accuracy improves with the DBR's ability to remain locked onto the broadcast correction signal. This enables it to apply the maximum amount of corrections to the GPS position calculations. Due to the low frequency of the beacon broadcast, the ability to receive correction data varies due to local radio frequency interference, time of day and weather conditions. Better receivers use dynamic filters to vary as interference changes, allowing better rejection of unwanted signals. This sophisticated filtering approach also provides improved range and DGPS reliability compared to analog receivers using simple


notch filtering.

The issue of Selective Availability has been somewhat addressed by the White House in that they have stated that SA will likely be removed within the next 8 years, between 2000 and 2006. When this takes place, GPS accuracy will increase to approximately 15 to 30 meters from the current 50-100 meters. Since this is still nowhere near DGPS' accuracy, we expect continued expansion of the U.S. and World beacon networks. In fact, the US Government recently committed to complete DGPS coverage to the continental US by the year 2000. 




Knot Tying Tips:

When tying a knot in monofilament line, always wet the line to reduce friction. Water will lubricate the line. With less friction, your knots will be tighter and stronger.



Improved Clinch Knot

Pull line through eye and double back making five turns around the standing line. Holding coils, pull end through the first loop and then through the big loop. Slide tight and clip ends.




For sinkers or other terminal rigs away from line. Form a loop. Then pull one side of the loop down and make eight turns. Reach through center and pull loop through. Hold loop with teeth and pull both ends tightly.



Palomar Knot

Consistently the strongest knot to hold terminal tackle. Double about 4 inches of line through eye of hook. Tie an overhand knot and then slip hook through the loop. Tighten and clip closely.



Provides loop connection for attaching leaders or other terminal tackle. Double end to form a loop and tie an overhand knot. With the loop open bring the end through once more. Tighten and clip.


