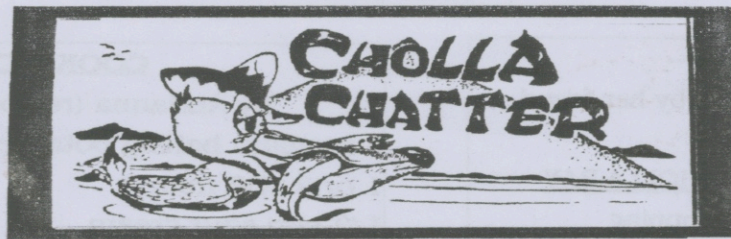

COOK'S CORNER

- 4 medium baking potatoes
- 1 or 2 TBS milk
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 1 tsp. onion salt
- 2 bacon strips, cooked & crumbled
- 1/8 tsp pepper
- 1 lb. fresh asparagus, cut into 1 in. pieces & cooked
- 1 cup grated cheddar cheese

Bake potatoes at 400 degrees until soft - about 1 hour. Cool potatoes until you can handle them. Cut a thin slice off the top of each potato and discard. Carefully scoop out pulp while leaving shell intact. In a mixing bowl, mash potato pulp with milk, sour cream, onion salt and pepper until smooth. Fold in asparagus. Stuff shells. Place in ungreased shallow baking dish. Sprinkle with cheese and bacon. Return to the oven for 20 to 25 min. or until heated through. Serves 4. These can be made ahead of time and kept in the refrigerator covered for several hours. May also be frozen for future use.

Unfortunately, excessive alcohol consumption was the root cause of the confirmed deaths. I had reports that the jails were full of spring breakers, and that the American youth were fighting in the jails, resulting in extensive injuries. It sounded like a very dangerous environment. It was easy to assume that all youth were Spring Breakers, and innocent people were vulnerable also to the consequences of the disrespectful masses. I wish the concept of Spring Break could be reframed, as it is a time of dread for the local people who are subjected to such massive out-of-control behavior. The extra efforts of the police were effective in controlling much of the danger, and their work is much appreciated by all ... except perhaps those arrested and jailed by them.

ANIMAL CONTROL

You may think this is the same subject, but it isn't... A very special thanks to the efforts of Dan Berkovitch and his friend Carlitos for distributing fliers and for inviting local families to bring their pets to be spayed and neutered. Dan and Carlitos then went to the homes and picked up and delivered the pets for surgery. Without their wonderful assistance, the success of the program wouldn't have been possible. There are also many others to thank: Dave Bennett generously donated the use of his garage as a clinic, which made the environment very pleasant for the doctors. Nancy Phelan coordinated supplies, and her friend, the visiting veterinary professor Allison Barnhill performed surgery the entire day. Also performing surgery throughout the day was Javier, the veterinarian who owns ChoChoy's Veterinary Clinic by the bank, Banorte. He suggested that we do this monthly in order to encourage the vaccination, spay and neutering of pets. We are still faced with the difficulty of catching the strays, but continue to work on this issue. There were 8 females and 2 males which had the operations on Sunday, March 14th. Javier is in Puerto Penasco Thursdays through Saturdays and is in Tijuana the rest of the week. He graciously stayed the Sunday of our clinic, and has agreed to stay an extra day once a month in order to help with our efforts. Debbie Grabski was part of the support staff throughout the day, and managed the financial end, compensating people as needed. We were able to donate to Nancy Phelan's tireless efforts with her animal shelter and adoption program in Puerto Penasco.

Nancy's friend Allison donated her time, as did Dan and Carlitos. I think we could begin referring to all these people who helped as Saints, as it was an amazing day of success and cross-cultural camaraderie. Special mention should also go to Janine and J.D., Dave Bennett's daughter and grandson who stood by and assisted all day as needed. We will need more financial donations for future clinics, supplies, medicine, and compensation for work performed. We can always use the assistance of residents to catch strays, and will have some nooses and muzzles to help with this. Money can be left at the cafe or it can be given to either Kathy Barnard or Debbie Grabske.

The next clinic will be held on the 3rd Sunday of April, then again on the 3rd Sunday of May.

Spring is here, and the breezes are balmy, reminding us all that LIFE IS GOOD, deserving respect, reverence and awe.

MY FIRST TRIP TO ROCKY POINT

Back in 1970 I was living in Phoenix and going through a kind of bad period in my life. You know, the kind of situation that makes you feel crazy. I had a week off from work, and only one 8 year old boy at home that week, so I decided to finally check out the beach town I'd heard so much about - ROCKY POINT!

It seems a regular car trip did not suit that crazy mood I was in, and I found a place that would rent me a motorcycle to make the trip. Now, I had NEVER ridden on a motorcycle before, and certainly hadn't driven one, so, a small one I figured would do nicely. They delivered me a Honda 90, which is about one step up from a bicycle in size (and power). My trusting little boy and I practiced riding it around a nearby school yard a few times, and then we took off. We had a couple of changes of clothes and bathing suits in a little soft bag tied to the back.

I had only a vague idea of how far Rocky Point was from Phoenix, and some idea of the towns we would pass through, but it didn't matter much because I discovered that the speedometer and odometer on this little rented machine was broken and so I had no way to judge how far we had gone or how fast we were moving. (I suspect we averaged about 30 mph). This made me a little nervous, so rather than be caught out in the desert at night, we stayed the first night in Gila Bend. The next day we got to Ajo early in the afternoon, but since I didn't know what I'd find at the border, we stayed the second night in Ajo. The next day we reached the border, but I was nervous about how long it would take to reach Rocky point, so we stayed the night at the motel in Lukeville.

We made it to Rocky Point on the 4th day of our trip, and checked into the old Playa Hermosa Hotel, which used to be on the beach front, near where the Plaza Las Glorias is today. Since the journey had taken so long, we only had a day or so left to enjoy our destination, but we had a lot of fun and then - fortunately - got a ride for ourselves and the motorcycle back to Phoenix.

Trip to Rocky Point, continued—

I came back a year later with the man I would marry, who introduced me to Cholla Bay. We chose a lot there to some day build a house on. It was the same lot our house stands on today.

My adventure on the Honda 90 with my 8 year old son riding behind me to Rocky Point was only the beginning of my adventures here. Remind me to tell you more sometime.....

A Whale of a Trip

On March 1st Don and I left Cholla for San Ignacio, BCS, to go whale watching, using public transportation. Dave Bennett took us to town to catch a ride to Hermosilla with Glenda Maud, where we took a bus to Guaymas to board the ferry to Santa Rosalia. This worked very well except we had 6 hour wait for the ferry.. We purchased our ferry tickets, 500 pesos each, and wandered around until we were able to board the small ferry at 8:00. It could only hold a couple of produce type trucks and a few vehicles. The seating area (no cabins) was below the deck where vehicles and cargo is carried. There were enough seats and few enough passengers that we could put up the arms of three seats and lie across to sleep. We had a very smooth ride and arrived in Santa Rosalia about 7:00 a.m. as per schedule and went to Hotel Frances where we had reservations for that night.

San Ignacio is about 60 miles north of there. It is inland, but the Laguna where the grey whales come to have their babies every February and March is about 30 miles away on the Pacific side of Baja. We caught an early bus the next day, hoping we could get out whale watching that day as we had decided we would return by ferry on Friday night.

We were unable to make connections that day with any of the companies that provide transportation to the Laguna, but that was fortunate, because it rained that afternoon and the reports we got were that they saw lots of whales but couldn't get close. The whales become quite active in the rain, we were told.

We made reservations for the next day with Manuel at the La Pinta where we were staying. There were to be six, but four didn't show, so we had to pay the full \$100 (usually \$120 split among at least 6) to get to the Laguna. As we had come to go whale watching we decided that we had better go and as it turned out we are certainly glad we did.

There are several different "camps" or stations around the Laguna which have permission to take people out in pongas, the only type of boat that is allowed for this purpose, strictly enforced by the Mexican government. Also, the number of boats and the length of time that they can stay out is limited. We went out with Antonio's Ecotours, run by the Agular family. There were seven of us in the boat,

as some had driven out in their car. Daniel, our guide, headed out at top speed for about 25 minutes, then slowed to look for whales. We saw lots of them and got pretty close but they were not interested in being touched. After about 45 minutes of being "rejected", Daniel headed out further to where we could see the waves breaking over the inlet to the Pacific. There were no other boats out this far. After about 3 or 4 tries, one mamma and her baby became interested. They began swimming around and under the boat, coming up to have a look. Finally the mamma came up close to me and I was the first one to touch and pet it. What a thrill! This is what I had wanted to do for years! Everyone in the boat was able to touch, rub and pet them. I was looking over the side of the boat when the baby came up and "blew" in my face, and then just lay there and let me pet and rub it. It was so "neat" that these huge wild creatures would let us touch them. They would lie on their side, with their big eye looking up at us. The baby seemed to like to show off, doing rolls and curls in the water close by. Soon other whales started coming around and there were about 6 or 8 nearby. That is a lot of Whale! We stayed there about 45 minutes until Daniel said we had to leave. Seven very happy people returned to camp for a delicious fish and shrimp dinner.

We decided not to try to go out the next day, as we were still on a "high" from our experience and didn't want to chance a let-down. We returned to Rocky Point by cab, ferry and bus, very happy we had gone and determined to do it again next year!!!
