FISH PRINTS

Ron Engle-Wilson and Jim Warnecke from the Arizona Game and Fish will give demonstrations on the Japanese art of Gyotaku (fish prints).

Enthusiastic fishermen have always searched for ways to record a large or unusual catch, and the Japanese are no exception. But while taxidermy was being developed in Europe and the United States in the 1800's, our counterparts across the Pacific were taking a different approach. The Japanese fishermen found that by applying ink to the side of a fish they could produce marvelously detailed impressions of their catch on paper. They called this practice Gyotaku (guyotak-oo), and eventually developed it to the level of fine art.

Recently, Gyotaku has been catching on in the US, particularly in Hawaii and parts of the west coast. Many anglers have found that a framed print makes a handsome alternative to having a trophy fish mounted for hundreds of dollars. Even better, you can make your own prints quite easily, and the fish doesn't go to waste....you can eat it after you print it.

This should be a fun and interesting meeting...don't miss it, and bring the kids.







EL RANCHO CORTEZ...#95 LA CHOLLA

On May 25th 1996, Scheherazade (Desert Princess) set sail for its maiden voyage across the Sea of Cortez. After many hundreds of hours (and that many dollars) captain Peter Toftoy readied this Bristol 25 sloop, Salvaged from United Castings in Maricopa, AZ, into a sea worthy craft...or so the crew hoped.

Peter and two sons, Adam and Ryan sailed with renowned Cholla Bay sailor Bruce Tegge and crew Pat Jorgenson, on their 25 foot sloop "Adrienne". The two boats sailed for San Felipe, 65 miles due west of La Cholla. Sailing through a moon lit night, skirting a rather intrusive rock, Scheherezda completed the cruise in 18 hours, an hour or so behind the Adrienne. The trip over proved a true test of both vessels and crew, encountering several mechanical problems and an uncooperative trailing dingy.



The Scheherazae is anchored in San Felipe's large and safe breakwater, as the crew heads for town.

Once anchored at San Felipe, the five sailors went to town where they spent time eating, drinking, walking the boardwalk and watching the West Coast NBA finals.

With winds from the south, the two boats were unable to sail south to their desired destination, Refugio. So after 2 days in San Felipe, they sailed east for La Cholla. The trip back proved smoother sailing for Scheherazade than the trip over, with the exception of initial rough seas and the dinghy's relative inability to handle them. The boats saw numerous porpoise crossing the bow, and schools of rays heading towards the south. Crew member Adam also landed an impressive 12 inch Sea Trout. With good winds from the south, Scheherazade reached La Cholla in less than 15 hours and spent its last night anchored off Tucson beach.

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



Teenager #2 becomes adult - moves to Colorado, but still returns to Cholla Bay every chance she can.


Teenager #3 becomes young adult. Tragic death, but ashes are scattered over the area he loved - Cholla Bay and the Sea of Cortez.







The CLUB pays the salary of the Cholla Bay Radio Operator, is prepared to direct Search & Rescue operations and when necessary can assist with some arrangements for the emergency transportation of critically ill or injured.
