# Fish-Hook Injury

A common accident among anglers, and one for which most are ill-prepared, is that of a fish hook injury. Although the novice may become impaled anywhere, the back, scalp and fingers are the usual sites of injury. These wounds are seldom serious but are always very annoying, and because hooks are often rusty or otherwise contaminated, there is concern about tetanus or wound infection. The simplest way is to advance the hook until the barb projects beyond the skin surface, cut it off with wire cutters, and then back the wire out of the wound. Following hook removal the wound should be liberally washed with water and then rinsed with alcohol. See your physician for a possible needed tetanus shot.

Not uncommonly, the angler is impaled by a treble hook, and this circumstance can pose more complications. If possible the remaining free portion of the lure should be removed by cutting the implanted hook from the lure. The latter can the be removed as described above. Occasionally these hooks can become so imbedded that they require surgical removal. In such an event the wound should be rinsed with alcohol, the hook fixed with adhesive to prevent further movement, and the angler sent to a physician who can remove it surgically. Hook wounds are always a nuisance and may interrupt the day's outing, but rarely do they represent a serious hazard.

# A Yummy Yummy Recipe

from Tere

1 can apricots (29oz) drained

1 can pineapple (29oz) drained

2 pkgs. orange Jell-O

1 cup combined juice (drained from fruit)

Dissolve gelatin in hot water, add juices. Save the rest of the juices for the topping. Fold in fruits and let set until congeals. Spread with the following topping.

½ cup sugar

3 tbs. flour

1 cup fruit juice

1 cup whipping cream, whipped

3/4 cup grated cheese

Combine sugar and flour. Blend in beaten, gradually stir in juices. Cook over low heat until mixture thickens. Cool, fold in whipped cream and spread over the gelatin then sprinkle with cheese.

### Shrimp Butter

Shell 1 pound shrimp, dry the shells in the oven for a few minutes, and pound them in a mortar until they are pulverized as finely as possible. Melt 1/4 pound butter in the top of a double boiler with 2 tablespoons water and the pulverized shells, and cook for 10-12 minutes without allowing the butter to boil. Strain off the liquid. Add a little boiling water to the shells and strain.

Pour the combined liquids through a cloth into a bowl of ice water, and set the bowl in the refrigerator until the butter hardens on the top. Skim off the butter and pack it into a jar. Cover it and store it in the refrigerator. Use as you would regular butter on your favorite fish recipes, vegetables, shellfish, rolls, etc.

#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

Sharks sometimes do intentionally bump an object with their snouts before deciding whether to eat it. By doing this they are exploring the object, but they are not exactly tasting it. Sharks senses are different from humans. They actually have more senses than we do, but some on which we rely heavily, such as touch and sight, are not as important to sharks.

Shark's vision varies from species to species, but it is not their strongest sense, especially up close. So sharks that bump may only be feeling something they are not familiar with and can't see well.

Sharks rely mostly on smell to locate prey at a distance. Sharks have very keen sense of smell and can detect blood in water in concentrations as low as 1 part per million. They also rely on their lateral lines to detect motion in the water, such as vibration, waves and changes in pressure caused by a prey swimming.

But the most interesting sense the shark uses to find prey at close range comes from a system know as the Ampullae of Lorenzzini, the small pits or dots visible on and under the shark's snout. These gell-filled pits are actually very sensitive sensory organs which can detect the minute electrical fields given off by living creatures. In fact, authorities say sharks can detect electrical fields that are far more faint than those detected by any other animal.

Metal in salt water also creates electrical fields, which is why sharks often bite propellers, ladders and underwater cameras. Some people think sharks are stupid because they do this but, according to sharks, if it gives off an electrical field it might be alive and therefor food.

## Thinking about towing your boat to Mexico?

One of the first things to consider is, to be prepared for a mechanical emergency. If you own a dual axle trailer, consider carring two spare tires. Because of the proximity of the wheels on a dual axle trailer, both tires might be damaged by running over the same debris, such as shattered glass or nails. Don't forget to buy at least one tire repair kit (in case you need to remove a nail or screw and patch a small leak without removing the entire wheel), and a couple of emergency air canisters to inflate a tire. Both products are available at most automotive shops.

A complete hub assembly (prepacked bearings with grease, seals, and lug nuts) should be kept in a plastic container inside the tow vehicle in case of a damaged wheel bearing. Also, make sure your jack is strong enough to lift both trailer and boat, and that you have at least two wooden chocks. Keep a tire gauge handy, too.

Other important items include a winch handle in case you burn out an electric winch, electrical tape, spare auto fuses and trailer bulbs, and a few red Cyalume lightsticks. If a trailer light burns out and you don't have a replacement, tape on a couple of the activated glowsticks. Their red glow should get you to where you are going, and you might just avoid a ticket.


It is also a good idea to carry a spare set of automotive belts, radiator hoses and clamps for your tow vehicle, along with a quart of oil, a quart of tranny fluid, a few gallons of coolant and water (in case you have to change a ruptured hose), and a good flashlight. Also a cellular phone is a good idea, even though it will only work in the states. If a problem occurs closer to Rocky Point, a VHF marine radio can be used to summon help on channel 26.


If you plan on launching from Cholla you will need to fill out a launch slip (available at the radio shack). The launch slip is for safety purposes, it lets the radio operator know where you plan on going, what time you plan to return, number of people on board, amount of gas on board, etc. There is no charge for the launch slip, but it must be returned to the radio operator upon return to shore.

Don't forget you will also need a Mexican boat permit. The permits are valid for one year and are fairly inexpensive. Permit cost for boats less than 23' is \$19.90. Boats less than 30'...\$39.90. Boats larger tha 30'...\$59.70. If you plan on fishing you will also need a Mexican fishing license for everyone on the boat. There is a weekly license as well as yearly license available. As of this writing the one week license is \$12.15, if you plan on fishing more than one week a year, the yearly license is a better deal at \$24.30. The boat permits and fishing licenses are available from Augustin at the Radio Shack in Cholla Bay (at the bottom of the launch ramp). If you would rather get your license and permits in advance there is only one place in Arizona that carries them, Angler & Hunter Travel in Mesa, 602-962-1976, ask for Mike Kannapel. Angler & Hunter Travel does charge a small application fee for these permits. Permits are not always available in Cholla or Peñasco when you're ready to head out on the water so, to be safe it might be a good idea to get your permits in advance.

Remember to watch the weather, carry the proper safety equipment, sign in and out at the Radio Shack and carry a VHF radio (monitor ch26, emergency ch16). Good luck fishing, and enjoy the sights of Cholla Bay and Rocky Point as seen from the water.

# When are Fishing Licenses and Boat Permits Required In Mexico?

A fishing license is required for any individual regardless of age who wishes to fish in fresh or salt water in Mexico. This rule applies to all people fishing out of boats or fishing underwater while skin diving. A fishing license is not needed when fishing from land.

A boat permit is required in Mexican waters for all inflatable, cartop, trailerable or non-trailerable boats as well as any dinghy or additional boat aboard the vessel regardless of size or construction that will be used for sport fishing and that are registered as pleasure craft. Permits will not be issued for any commercial applications or sightseeing where anyone will be charged a fee.

All passengers, regardless of age aboard a boat in Mexican waters that is engaged in fishing must have a Mexican fishing license in their possession regardless if they are fishing or not.



This fish is found throughout the Sea of Cortez both inshore and offshore. They are deep bodied, greenish-gold on their back with red on their lower sides and about 8 dark bars across the body. They average 3-10 lbs., but can grow to 30 lbs. Pargo are a good fighting fish that takes chunk baits fished on the bottom and are very good eating.



Red Snapper (Hauchinango)

The body and fins are bright red with a pink to white belly. They prefer deep water around 250 ft. and feed mainly at night. The average weight is 2-5 lbs. but do get up to 15 lbs. Red Snapper takes baits fished near the bottom and yo-yo'd jigs. Excellent eating.
