More on Mexico:

Last month I featured what you could take across the border and what you need to keep an eye on. This month we'll take a look and the dreaded vehicle situation. Information from the Tourist Board of Mexico is stressing Insurance. Liability Insurance to be exact. No matter what kind of vehicle you drag over the border, it can't be said enough. . . Insure it. I've heard it a thousand times, "I'm not too worried about losing the quad or the rail and I can handle the risk". WRONG! If you are in an accident, you can be arrested and jailed until the situation is rectified. This is real hard to fix when you are physically incarcerated. Somebody is going to have to fix the situation for you, obviously. This means burdening somebody. Insurance helps this out a whole bunch in Mexico and will shorten delays. If you had a minor injury, it could turn into a major injury sitting in a Mexican jail.

At the Border: The border patrol want paperwork proving some kind of ownership on your toys. A document showing something and they are none too happy with a receipt. You can get a document made up on ATV's, sandrails, and other forms of vehicle classification at Gringo Pass for about \$10

each piece. Trailers, cars and trucks should have registration and title documentation (don't leave home without them). Harsh penalties can be imposed for drinking and driving, believe it or not. Lots of folks do it though and seem to be oblivious to the severity of the punishment in Mexico. Rules apply there too and a check with the Mexican Consulate will really drive it home for you, if you are among the hard to convince. Lots of people don't think of the consequences using drugs in Mexico and getting caught. This is based purely on the influx of drugs coming across the border. How does 5 to 10 years in a Mexican jail sound? One man recently said that an 8 month stay in a Mexican jail was enough to change his entire life. This has prompted him to actively work on the



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rights of others incarcerated in Mexico.

If the jails were fun, we would all want to go...

Just a reminder!


The radio handle books are out and available to members, ask at your meeting and the purchase can be made for \$3.00. We commend Dave and Kelly Adams for taking on this enormous and time consuming task of putting this together for the benefit of the club. Most people don't realize how important the radio is...it's in place to SAVE LIVES and make the waters safer! Lots of folks use it as a "telephone" system and that's kinda a shame. It's also embarrassing that some people haven't impressed on their children that the radio is not a toy. The VHF radio system is in place for MARINE purposes and it's all our responsibility to treat it that way. Lots of us have heard people ordering water, asking about sports scores, calling friends about meeting places, partyline traffic and a whole host of "other chatter". As a boat owner and user, concerns about safety come into play here. It is considered a much higher priority to have the well being of folks on the water put first over the ones needing it to shower in. To quote the RadioHandle Directory: Use CB channel 3 to call your friends and order water. If you must hail someone on Ch 26, PLEASE go to an off simplex channel (12, 68, 70 etc). In Spanish, it's called "cambio". Change in English. To go off the main line can be the difference of getting help on the water and being in distress. A casual attitude about the radio and it's intent may cause someone on the water to pay a very dear price, and everyone is urged to "think" before you pick up the microphone on your radio.

Phoenix Chatter



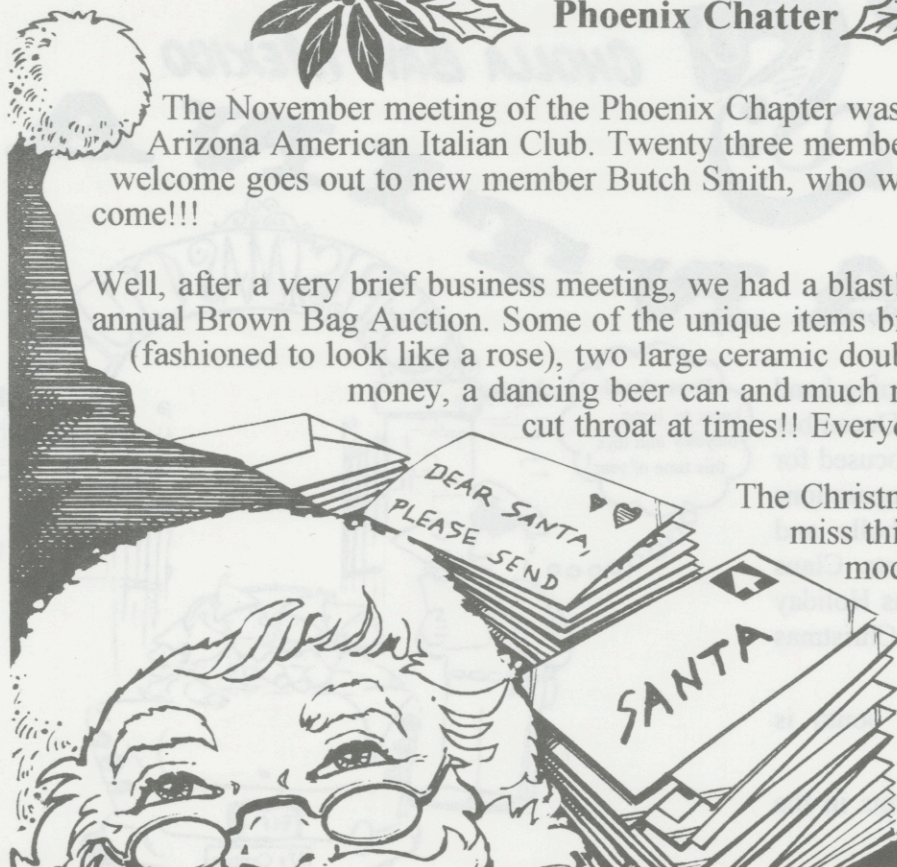

A Dark Sky Above Cholla Bay

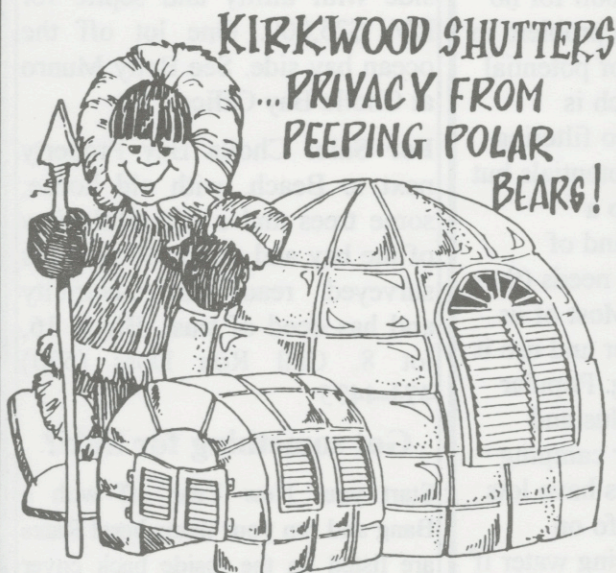
One of the nicest things about being in Cholla Bay is being able to see the night sky, and all the stars. Being able to see the stars epitomizes the escape from the city, and it's illumination of the man made environment. Despite the fact that the City of Puerto Penasco does not employ shielding technology for their streetlights, severe degradation of the dark sky has not occurred yet. But I am worried about the future. Occasionally a portion of the

Cholla Bay tidal flats is illuminated from a bayside home. Most times, this is an inadvertent consequence of lighting a beach area in front of their home. Lighting the tidal flats seriously degrades the night vision of anyone looking out from a position nearby. It is even worse when the offending light bulb is visible, creating glare. It is especially frustrating if you are actually on the tidal flats, making it almost impossible to see anything, let alone enjoy a nighttime stroll. New developments across the Bay are coming. New people are moving into Cholla, who may be so used to the city, that the concept of a dark night sky may be unfamiliar. They will bring with them security lighting. With inexpensive electric power soon to be here, I'm sure that some people will want to have security lights on even when they are not in Cholla. The nights may

that is creating a problem. Both Tucson and Phoenix have ordinances to govern outdoor lighting and pollution. With Tucson's proximity to the observatories on Kitt Peak, Tucson residents may be more aware of the problem than those living in Phoenix. It may be up to the Tucson contingent to lead the way. I have some suggestions that can be used to minimize your own outdoor lighting impacts. First, most of us have done without security lighting up to now. Before you make the decision to add security lighting, ask yourself if it is really necessary. If you feel that crime is a problem, and that security lighting will prevent crime beyond what our excellent police force is able to do, make sure that it is shielded, so that it does not illuminate surface areas off of your property. Don't keep the light on continuously, especially when you are not at the Bay. Use of a motion detector to turn it on would be preferable.

Make sure that any outdoor lighting that you install is shielded and only lights up your property. A good rule of thumb is that if you can see the light bulb when you are off the property, you are seeing energy being wasted. To prove this, the next time you are on an airplane at night, look down at the light above the city. The light bulbs that you see are lighting more than the surface areas, and what is shining up into the sky, is wasted light and wasted energy.

be numbered, when you will be able to go out in the middle of the night, and get the sense of being in an "urban wilderness". Ubiquitous lighting over Cholla could become a constant nighttime intrusion. If we want to continue to have dark skies over Cholla Bay, enforcement of a recently passed ordinance may be just one possibility. People who want a dark night sky will have to minimize their own lighting, and apply peer pressure if they are aware of a situation

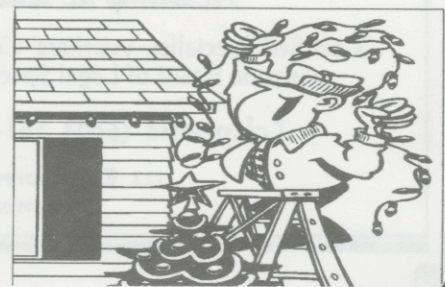


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Water Odor?

Why does the water smell? Water coming out of the hot water heater leads to an unpleasant smelling shower and it's a

common problem in La Cholla.

Many of us are temporary visitors and experience the problem when opening up the cabina for a weekend usually after a long spell of vacancy. Does yours have an odor? Bacteria

begins to grow in the tank and needs to depart! Most of us set the water heater to 125 - 135 degrees. This won't kill the bacteria. Raising the temperature to 140 to 145 degrees will and the smell will go away along with the bacteria. If you are concerned with the water in the water tanks on the roof, 1oz of regular chlorine bleach per tank will take care of any bacteria growing in the tank. If you are concerned about the levels of chlorine in the tank, a simple pool

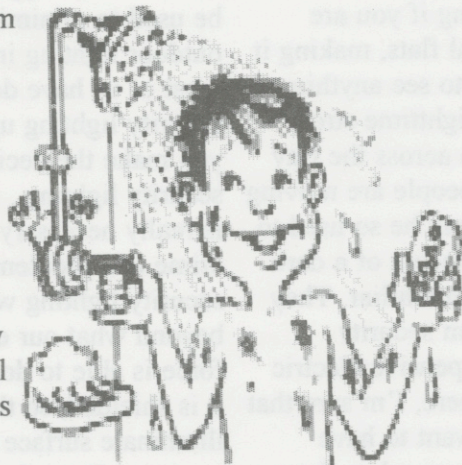

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testing kit can keep you informed about those levels (the goal here is to achieve 2 parts per million). Hopefully, nobody is drinking the water coming out of the tanks but if you wanted to in an

emergency situation: You can drink the water and feel sorta safe if you boil the water at a hard boil for no less than 3 minutes. One problem in Mexico is the presence of potential viruses in the water which is unlikely in the US. Micro filtering can take care of those potentials but you really need to talk to a professional about the kind of system that can fill your needs (they can get a little pricey). Most of us just buy the bottled water and use it for cooking and drinking. Popular

Surplus and other camping stores have lots of info on filtering water if you are interested in looking into doing it yourself or if you have questions.

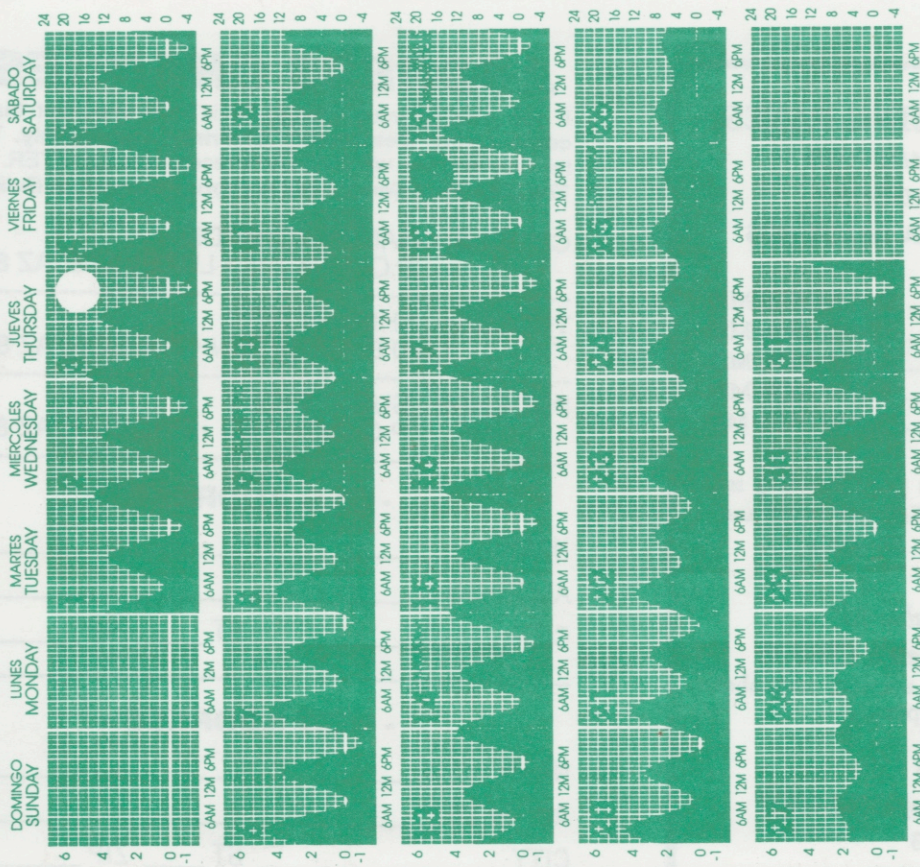
