1/2 cup KlorianTeriyaki Jaste & Glaze


2 Tbsp. burgundy wine

There have been over 115 visits to the library since it has been reorganized. Please use and enjoy your library.


SICK BAY

WHAT IS A WHALE?


LIVING IN THE OCEAN

Whales are large, magnificent, intelligent, aquatic <u>mammals</u>. They breathe air through blowholes into lungs (unlike fish who breathe using gills). Whales have sleek, streamlined bodies that move easily through the water. They are the only mammals, other than <u>manatees</u> (seacows), that live their entire lives in the water, and the only mammals that have adapted to life in the open oceans.

LIKE ALL MAMMALS:

- .. Whales breathe air into lungs,
- .. Whales have hair (although they have a lot less that land mammals, and have almost none as adults),
- .. Whales are warm-blooded (they maintain a high body temperature).
- .. Whales have mammary glands with which they nourish their young,
 - .. Whales have a four-chambered heart.

THE BLUE WHALE is the largest animal that has ever existed on earth. It is larger than any of the dinosaurs were. They are also the loudest animal on earth.



CETACEANS are a group of mammals that includes the whales, dolphins, and porpoises.

SIZE

The biggest whale is the blue whale, which grows to be about 94 feet (29 m) long - the height of a 9-story building. These enormous animals eat about 4 tons of tiny krill each day, obtained by filter feeding through baleen. Adult blue whales have no predators except man.

The smallest whale is the dwarf sperm whale which as an adult is only 8.5 feet (2.6 m) long.

SWIMMING AND OTHER WATER ACTIVITIES

Whales have a streamlined shape and almost no hair as adults (it would cause drag while swimming). Killer whales and Shortfin Pilot whales are the fastest, swimming up to 20 miles per hour.

BREACHING: Many whales are very acrobatic, even breaching (jumping) high out of the water and then slapping the water as they come back down. Sometimes they twirl around while breaching. Breaching may be purely for play or may be used to loosen skin parasites or have some social meaning.

SPYHOPPING: This is another cetacean activity in which the whale pokes its head out of the water and turns around, perhaps to take a look around.

LOBTAILING: Some whales stick their tail out of the water into the air, swing it around, and then slap it on the water's surface; this is called lobtailing. It makes a very loud sound. The meaning or purpose of lobtailing is unknown, but may be done as a warning of danger to the rest of the pod.

WHALE SONGS: Complex whales's songs can be heard for miles under the water. The humpback's song can last for 30 minutes. Baleen whales sing low-frequency songs, toothed whales emit whistles and clicks that they use for echolocations. The songs are thought to be used in attracting mates, to keep track of offspring, and for the toothed whales, to locate prey.

LOGGING: Logging is when a whale lies still at the surface of the water, resting, with its tail hanging down.
While floating motionless, part of the head, the dorsal fin or parts of the back are exposed at the surface.

Fishing has been slow, but has picked up this past weekend. There have been about 20 boats launched so far during the 1st week of February.

Joe Anacleta caught a nice mess of large calico and red snapper. Another boat, that didn't sign out, went some 50 miles south and brought back a 300 lb. black sea bass and a 90 lb. mako shark. There was a rather dramatic search and rescue involving the sailboat O'Susanna, owned by CBSC member Rich Grachus. He was about 5 miles from Bird Island, when he had a steering problem and could only go around in circles. He also was unable to make clear radio communication with Villa. After a day and a half, Craig, who lives at Rojo's old boat yard, went up on the mountain and was able to communicate. Then, Bart, of Lobo del Mar was able to locate Rich and bring him into Cholla and his boat has now been repaired. Thus,

good efforts of cooperation resulted in a happy ending...

We would like to commend Rosario for the many jobs he does at the boat ramp, on the radio, helping people with their boats and giving tourists and others fishing help and information... Hum Babe!!!



Unclaimed \$250 Pull-Tab Ticket

Since March 2005, at various club events, many of our members and their friends have purchased the \$1 Pull-Tab Tickets, and many have won instant cash prizes ranging from \$1 through \$65. And several luckier folks have won the \$100 and \$250 prizes. We sold the last 500 tickets (Blazin' Cherries series) at the OBSC New Years Eve party, where over \$800 in prize money was paid out. However, there remains exactly \$325 in unclaimed prize money, including a single ticket worth \$250. Everyone please check your pockets, purses and drawers for these winning tickets, and tell your friends to do the same. We'll hold this money available until April 1, 2006, at which time all unclaimed prize money will be deposited into our General Fund. Background: Last February, our Secretary, Diane Aliano, introduced to us a new way of fundraising. Pull Tabs have been around for ages, used primarily by non-profit membership and fraternal organizations.

Since they're legal in some states and overlooked in others, we obtained a shipment from a gaming company in Idaho. Over a 9-month period, with Pat Goodin's help, Diane sold all 3,960 one-dollar tickets in the series, without losing a single dollar in these fast-paced transactions. The total of payouts is preset at \$2,949 (about 75%), so CBSC's built-in profit was exactly \$1,011. This money (plus all unclaimed prize money after 04/01/06) will go toward the acquisition of our clubhouse parking lot. Thank you, Diane, for a job well done! RESTAURANT NEWS: Xochiti's Cholla Cafe has new hours and new menu items. In addition to our delicious breakfast and lunches served from 6a.m. until 2p.m., (thanks to my wonderful staff), we are now open from 4p.m. to 9p.m. (Closed Tuesday and Wednesday). The evening menu includes gourmet pizzas, wings and a variety of salads. Due to popular demand, Monday night is spaghetti and meatball night. We also have a new manager in the evenings, Bill Schoen, who is just delightful. Sara, who has always made our large tortillas, now makes the pizza crusts, using a recipe from a very popular pizza restaurant in Colorado. Another friend honored us with her secret salad dressing which we use on the Creek salad. It is so good, we could serve it as a beverage. The pizza sauce is yet another secret family recipe. You can dine in, or we deliver in Cholla Bay, to the Reef campgrounds and to the Condos between Cholla Bay and Puerto Penasco along Sandy Beach. Just to keep things interesting, I am trying to arrange some Spanish classes to be held on Thursday nights. There has been a lot of interest expressed from Cholla residents for both a beginners and intermediate class.

ACTIVITIES OF INTEREST: There are always fliers in the restaurant promoting a movie put on by CEDO on the first Thursday of the month regarding nature and the environment. The event is aimed at local youth, and it is a beautiful experience to watch the interaction between the facilitators and the children who attend. Some of the finest mornings have been spent with groups of us bathing and picking fleas off adorable puppies, and finding homes for them. People have been very generous with donations, and we will happily continue to accept them (donations, not puppies) at the restaurant, for medical needs, spaying and neutering.

POLICE CONCERNS: We have a wonderful police force protecting our homes in Cholla Bay, and attending to emergencies. They have been very responsive when needed and pride themselves in being professional, caring and friendly. We are very fortunate, as they are like the old fashioned neighborhood police who know everyone, and everyone is becoming familiar with them. Unfortunately, there have been several reports of harassment on the road by one or perhaps two policemen on our local Cholla force. If you are stopped, be deliberately obvious about obtaining the name of the officer from his badge (which is hanging around his neck). If the stop is legitimate, you will be asked to follow the police to the station in town, and pay the fine there. Do not pay the officer who stopped you. If you need support or a translator, try and bring a friend with you. The situation is difficult, as there are stops which are legitimate, often inebriated drivers who can be beliligerent and "never in the wrong". On the other hand, the situations involving the few officers who take advantage of tourists by using intimidation to extort money from them, needs to be stopped and is being addressed by the Homeowners board. We need to know when these incidents occur, and by whom. You can report them to a board member or to myself in the restaurant, and I will pass the information along. Our local police chief can't respond to the problem without specific information, so please help resolve this problem if you experience abuse.

CHOLLA FUN: Come on out to Cholla Bay, hang out at the restaurants, taco stands, and JJ's, and enjoy the good life. It is a wonderful eclectic community.
